Description of Site: *(Please describe the type of Agency setting and services offered)*

HOME, Recovery & Wellness (R&W) team, provides forensic field-based outreach, engagement, support, and treatment to individuals with severe and persistent mental illness who formerly experienced unsheltered homelessness and are currently or formerly conserved. Services are provided by addressing basic needs; conducting clinical assessments; providing street psychiatry; providing linkage to appropriate services (including mental health services substance abuse treatment and shelter) and neuropsychological testing.

HOME serves individuals 18 and over who are experiencing or formerly experienced chronic unsheltered homelessness and who have profound mental health needs and associated impairments. These vulnerable and disengaged individuals struggle with securing appropriate food, clothing, and shelter due to their mental illness. In addition, they may have critical deficits in hygiene and communication and are generally highly avoidant of services. They are unable to live safely in the community and require specialized mental health services to secure

Schizophrenia Spectrum Disorders, Mood Disorders, Substance-Related and Addictive Disorders, Co-Occurring Disorders, Posttraumatic Stress Disorder.

What specific (perhaps unique) training opportunities do students have at your agency?

Practicum students have the opportunity to work as part of an **interdisciplinary treatment team** providing community-based mental health services to adults experiencing serious mental illness, homelessness, and co-occurring disorders. Training emphasizes both clinical and systems-level competencies essential for work within Los Angeles County's public mental health and housing systems.

Students will:

- Participate in **street psychiatry outreach** and **clinical field rounds** focused on assessment, diagnosis, and treatment planning.
- **Carry a caseload of approximately 8–10 clients**, providing ongoing case management and individual mental health services under supervision.
- Receive **weekly clinical supervision** from a licensed **PsyD Field Instructor** and participate in team-based case consultation.
- **Collaborate with psychiatrists, clinical pharmacists, registered nurses, and nurse practitioners** to coordinate medication support services and integrated care.

- **Participate in the coordination and implementation of psychiatric hospitalizations** as part of multidisciplinary treatment planning.
- Administer and interpret a range of **neuropsychological and risk assessment instruments**, including:
 - Gain experience **navigating Los Angeles County’s housing system** and supporting clients through placement and stabilization processes.
 - Develop working knowledge of the **Lanterman-Petris-Short (LPS) Conservatorship process** and related legal and ethical considerations.

This practicum provides hands-on training in **multidisciplinary collaboration, trauma-informed care, forensic assessment, and recovery-oriented treatment** within a complex community mental health environment.

Students will work as part of a multidisciplinary team which includes Community Health Workers, Peer Specialists, and other individuals with lived experience.
