Integrated Plan: Budget Fiscal Years
2026/27 – 2028/29



▶▶ Prop 1: Behavioral Health Funding Changes

Prop 1 changes how counties can use behavioral health tax revenues, allows for SUD only investments, and requires more oversight.



Modifies Tax Revenue Use

Adjusts rules for the 1% millionaires' tax



Requires New Oversight

Adds new reporting and monitoring requirements through a 3-year budget process



Establishes 3-Year Plan

Uses the Integrated Plan to capture county behavioral health spending

Key takeaway: Prop 1 strengthens oversight and supports long-term planning.

▶▶ BHSA Budget Template

Purpose of the Template



Standardized Planning Tool

- Helps California counties to project, plan, and report BHSA expenditures for behavioral health services over a three-year, ensuring alignment with the BHSA requirements.



Promotes Transparency & Accountability

- Covers Housing Interventions, Full-Service Partnerships, and community support services, and tracks the use of state and federal dollars.



Best Estimate Planning

- Provides best available estimates at the time of preparation subject to change due to updates in estimated revenues, expenditures, or policy changes at the local, state, or federal level.



Detailed Spending Breakdown

- Shows BHSA-funded behavioral health spending across DMH and SAPC
- Includes only projected BHSA allocations (projected allocations or existing balances from other funding source not included).
- Breaks down estimated BHSA spending across funding components.

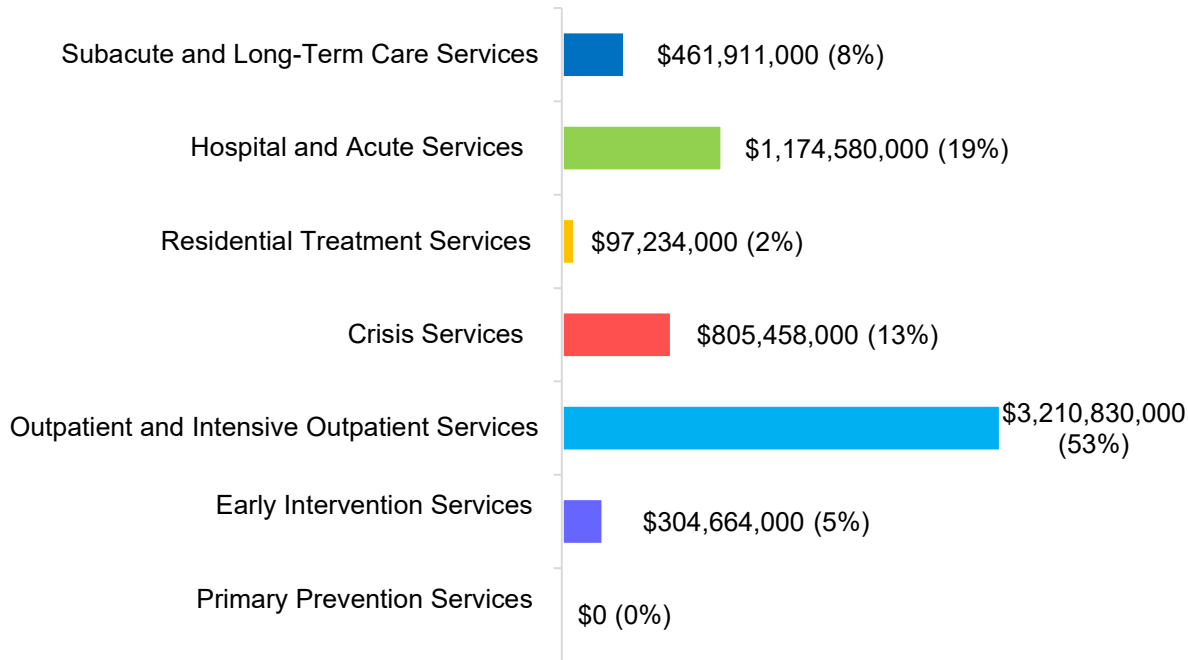

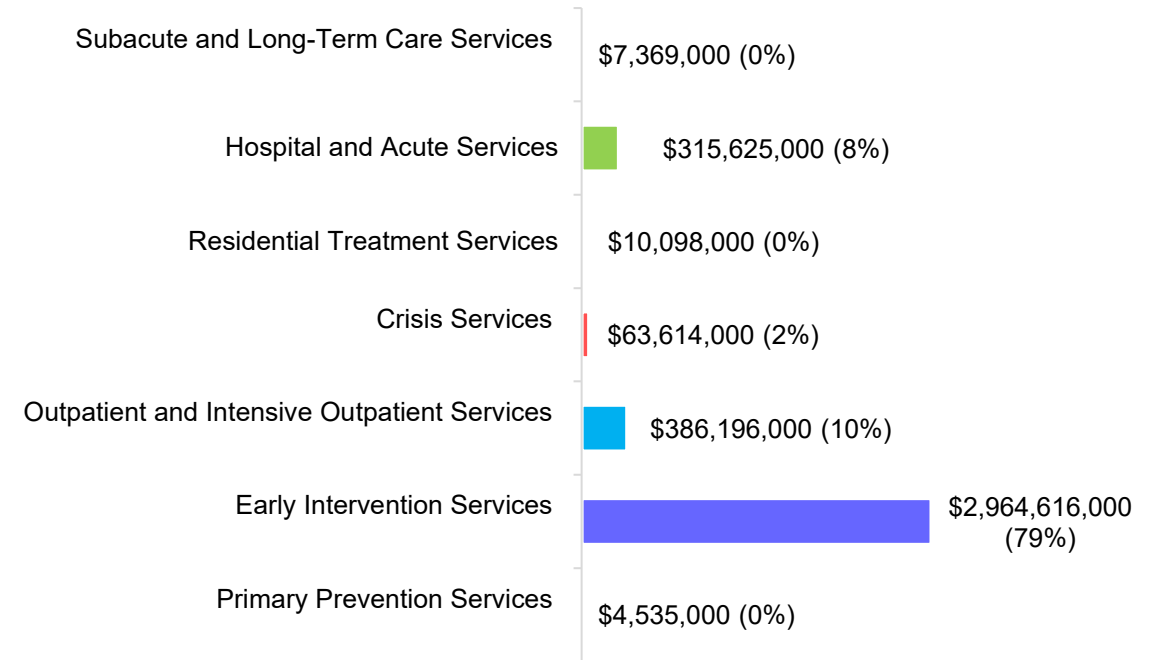
Adults/Older Adults Funding Overview

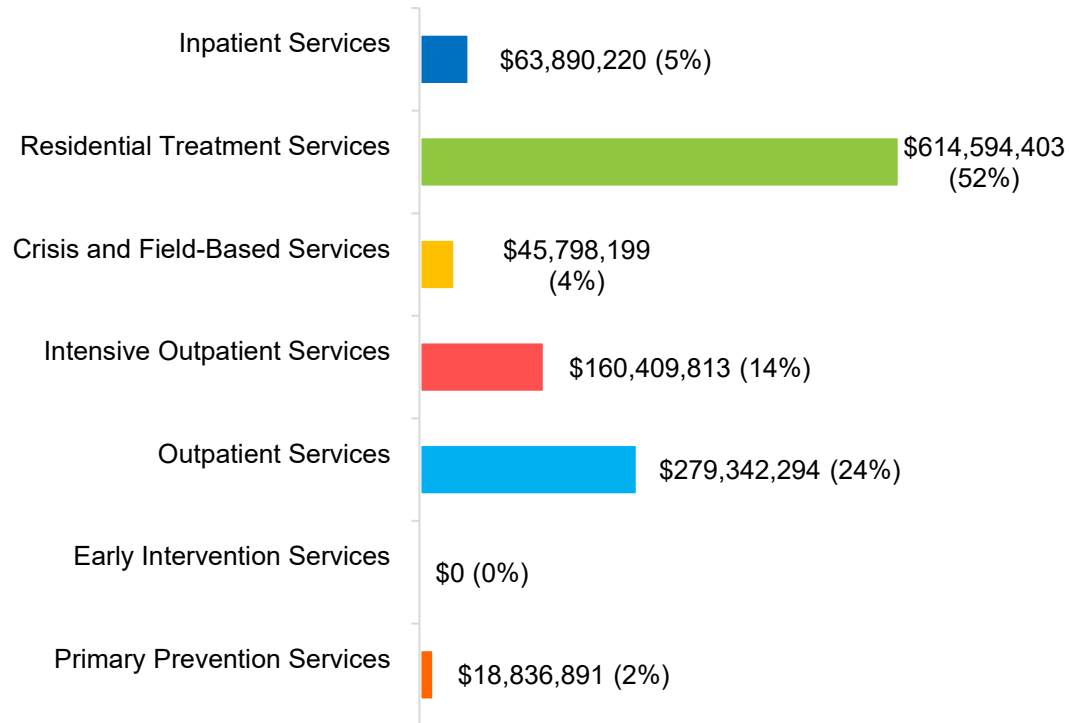

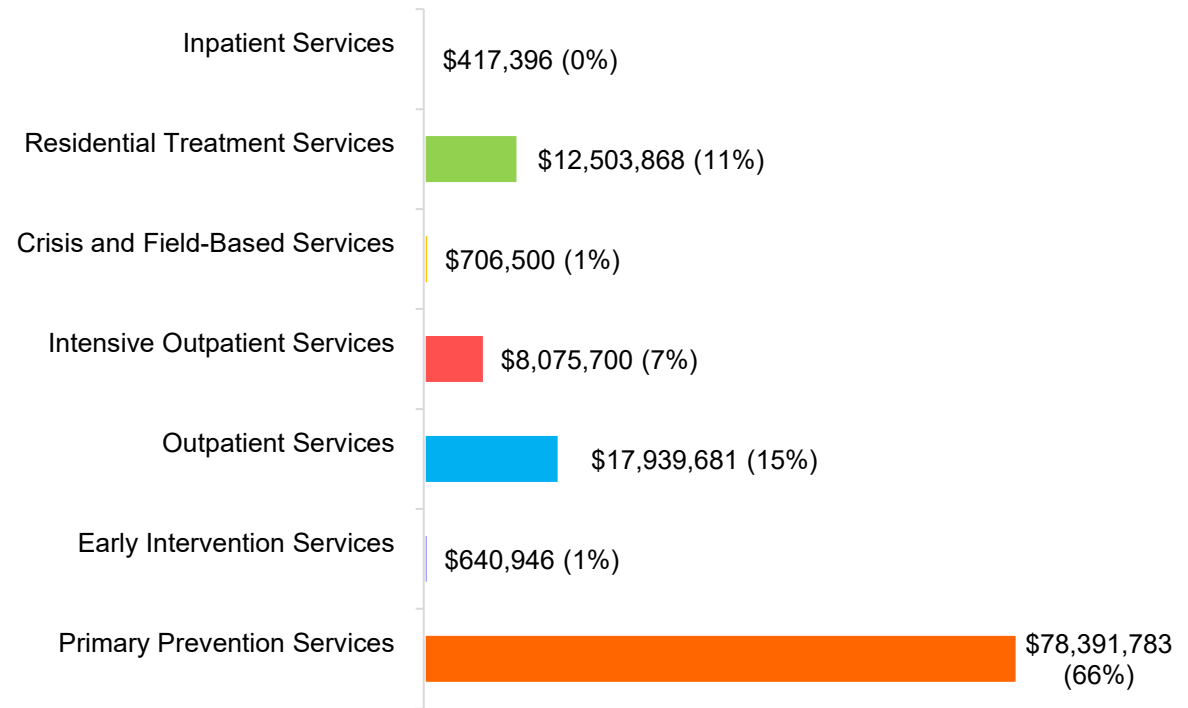
Adults/Older Adults Funding Overview

Total Cost Over 3 Years: \$1,182,871,820



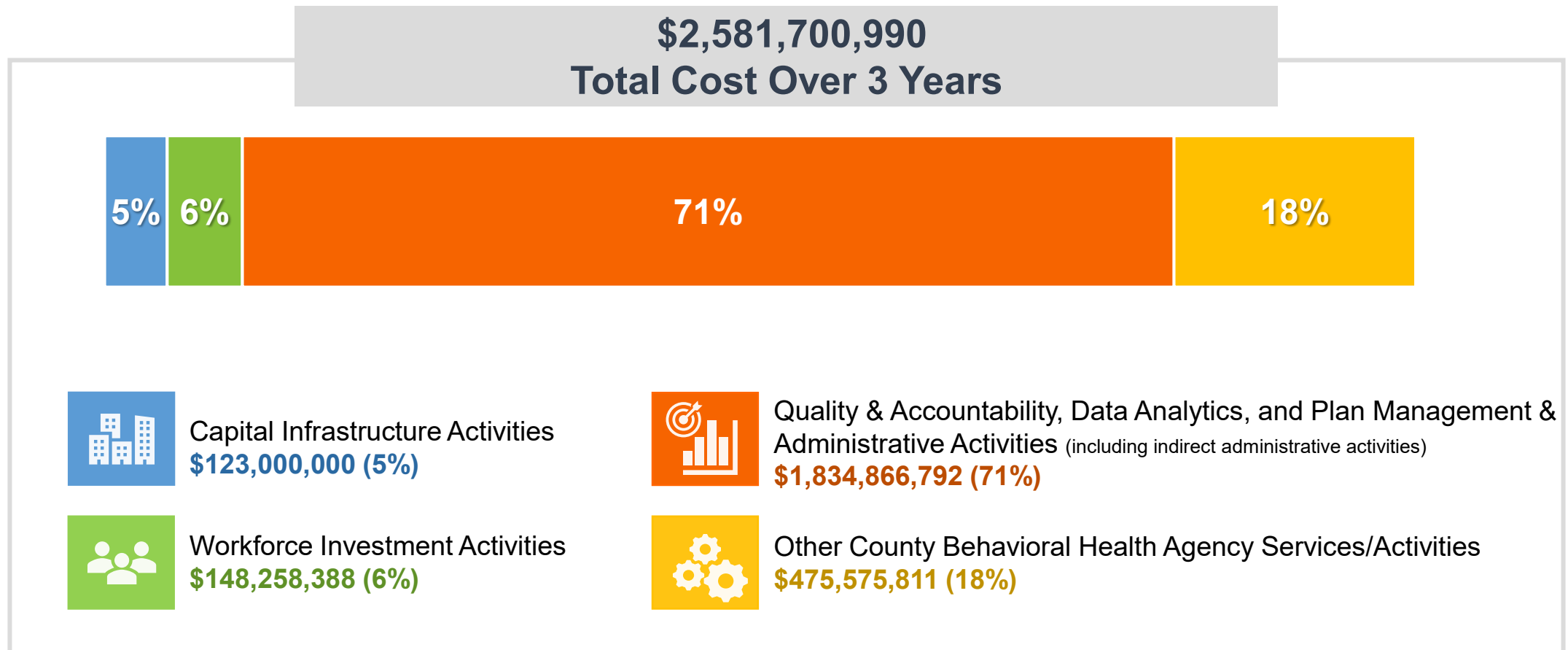
Children & Youth Funding Overview

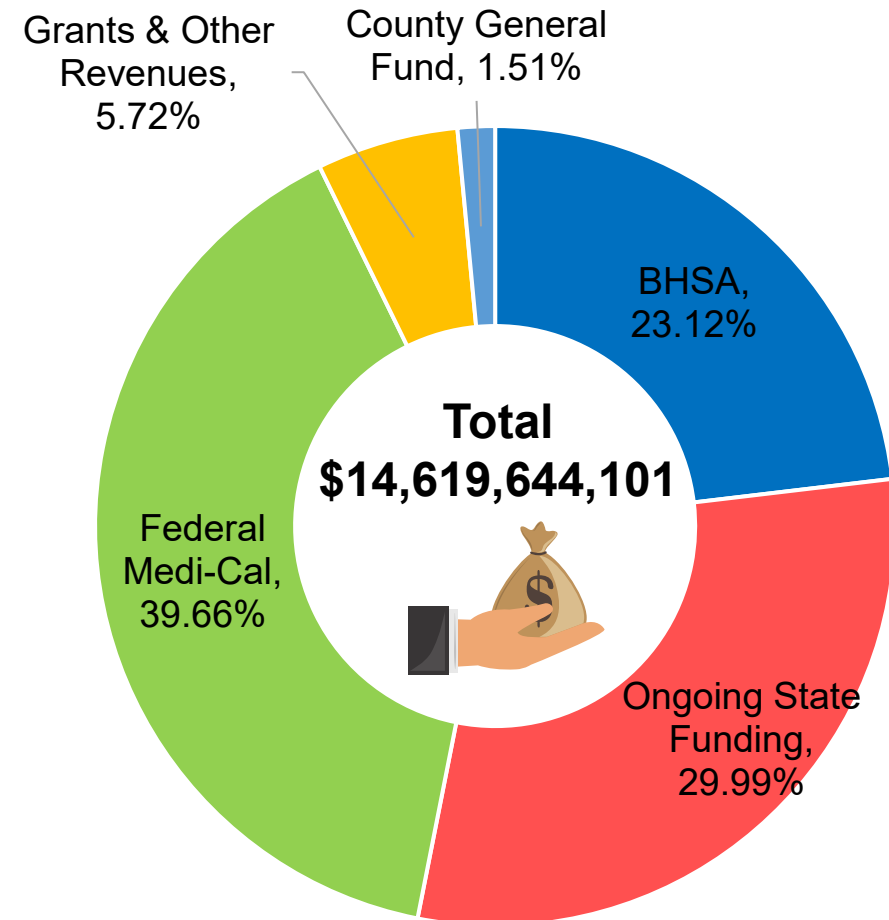

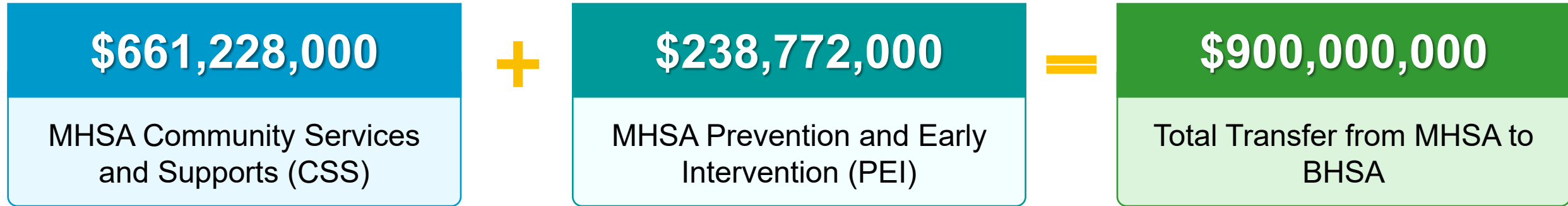

Projected Cost Over 3 Years by Funding Source

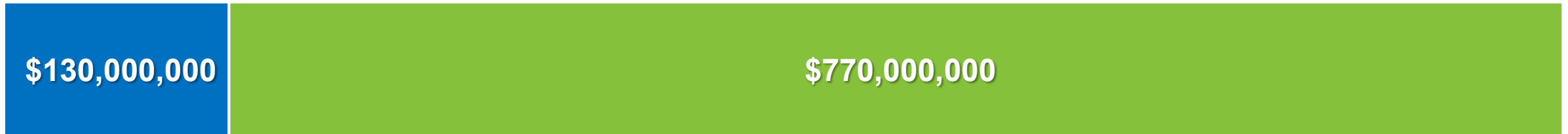

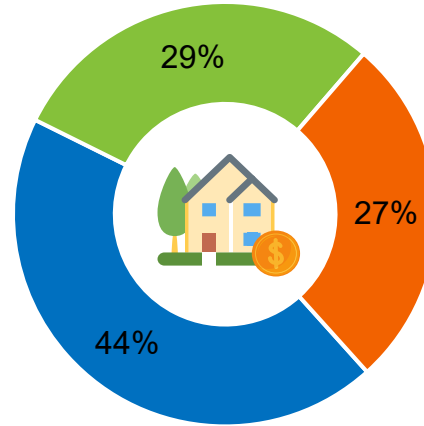

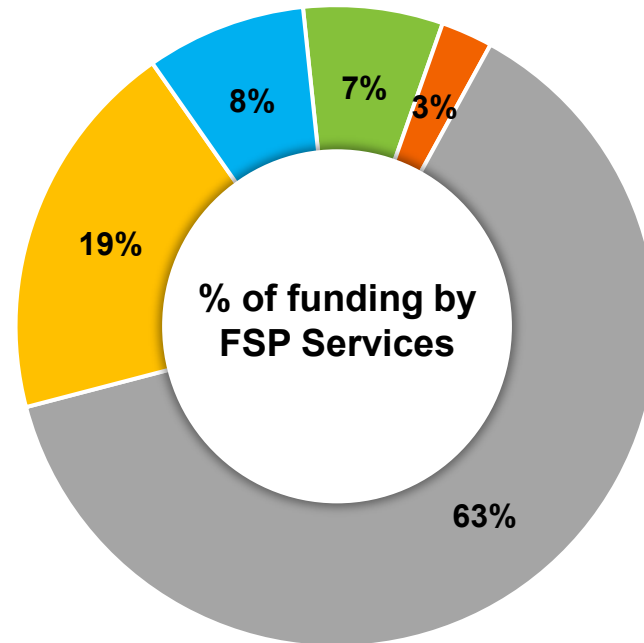

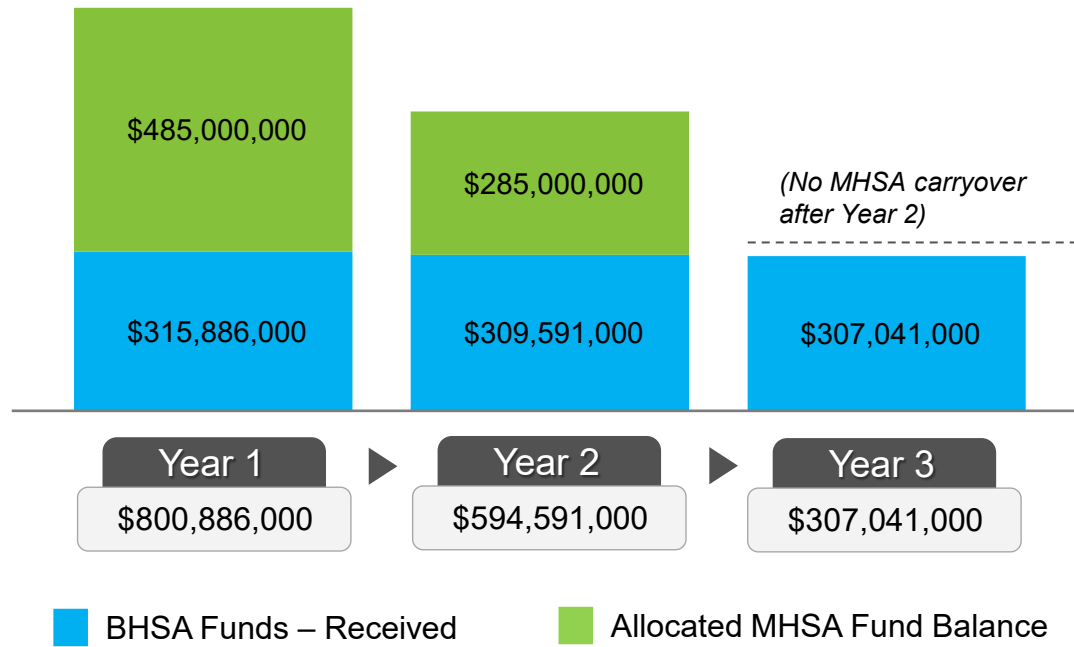

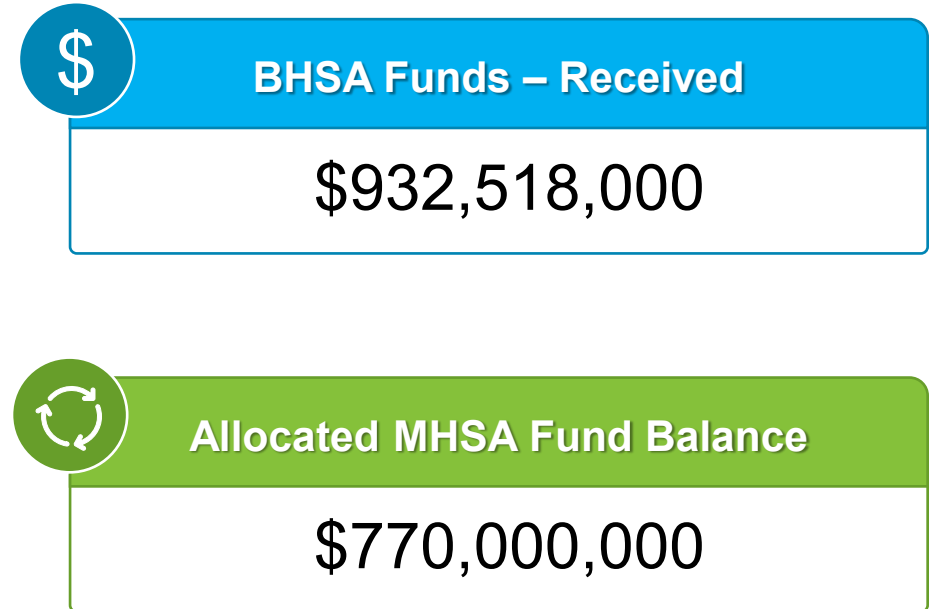

Total Estimate Behavioral Health Services and Funding Received & Allocated by Year

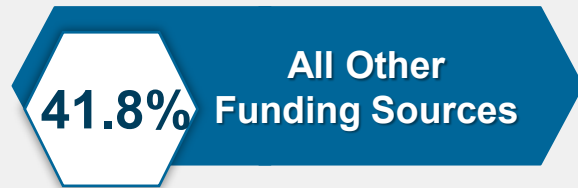

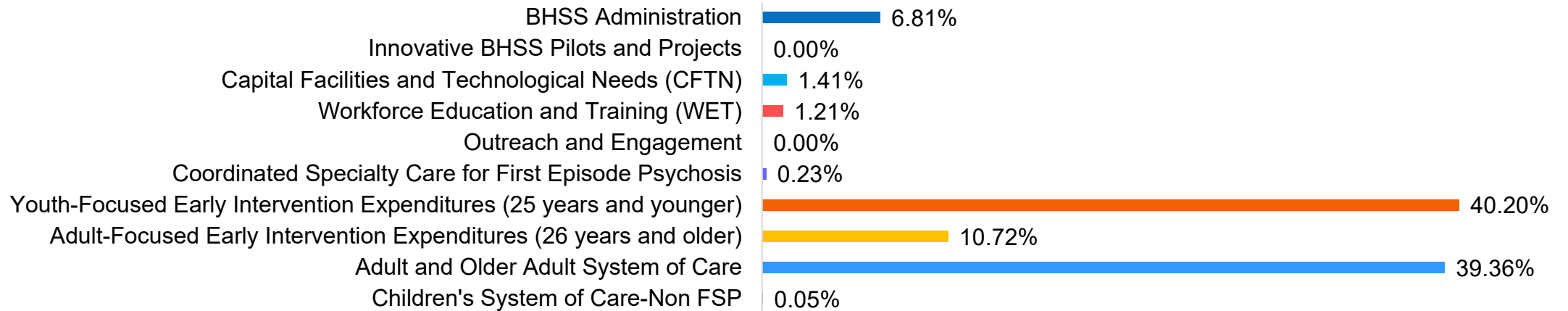

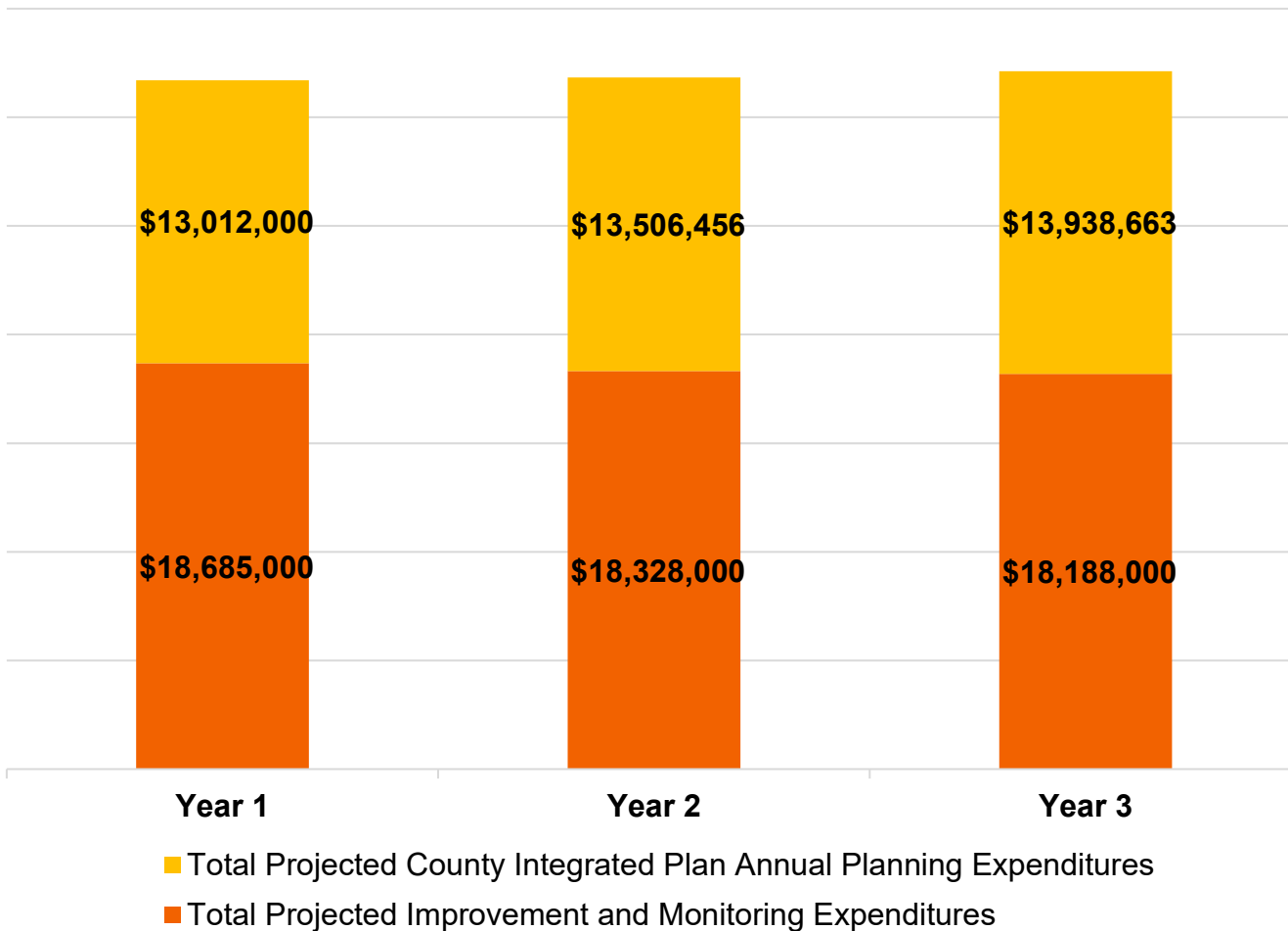
Projected Expenditure Breakdown

▶▶ Summary of Budget Changes: MHSA and BHSA Full-Service Partnership (FSP)

Beginning July 1, 2026, shift dollars from MHSA OCS to BHSA FSP
