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Land Acknowledgment

The County of Los Angeles recognizes that we occupy land originally and still inhabited and cared for by the Tongva, Tataviam, Serrano, Kizh, and Chumash Peoples. We honor and pay respect to their elders and descendants — past, present, and emerging — as they continue their stewardship of these lands and waters. We acknowledge that settler colonization resulted in land seizure, disease, subjugation, slavery, relocation, broken promises, genocide and multigenerational trauma. This acknowledgment demonstrates our responsibility and commitment to truth, healing and reconciliation and to elevating the stories, culture and community of the original inhabitants of Los Angeles County. We are grateful to have the opportunity to live and work on these ancestral lands. Developed over many months of collaboration with leaders from local Tribes, on November 1, 2022, the Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to adopt a Land Acknowledgment for the County of Los Angeles.

About LA County

LA County was established as one of California's original 27 counties on Feb. 18, 1850, just months after California was granted statehood and roughly two years after California became American territory under a treaty ending the Mexican-American war.

The County's original boundaries encompassed an area along the coast between Santa Barbara and San Diego that included present-day Orange County and parts of Ventura and Riverside counties. That map changed dramatically over the years, with LA County at one point stretching all the way east to the state's borders with Nevada and Arizona. By 1889, when Orange County was established, LA County occupied an area that roughly mirrored its modern-day boundaries. LA County now covers 4,084 square miles of land area, including Santa Catalina Island. It is bordered on the north by Kern County, on the east by San Bernardino County, on the south by Orange County and on the west by Ventura County and the Pacific Ocean.

It is the most populous county in the US, with more than 9.7 million residents—a number exceeded by only 10 states—and approximately one-quarter of all California residents live here. It is a charter county and its governing body is the five-member Board of Supervisors, created by the Legislature in 1852.

The County has a multi-billion dollar budget that is funded by federal, state and local revenues. Unlike the State or any of the 88 cities within LA County's jurisdiction, the County does not have the broad authority to assess taxes, but it generates local revenues through both property and sales taxes. It uses its overall budget to provide a wide range of programs and services to its residents. Traditional services mandated by State law include public healthcare and health protection, public social services, child welfare, law enforcement, managing elections, property assessment and tax collection. Other services include affordable housing, economic development, libraries, parks and recreation, arts and cultural programming, and anti-racism and justice reform efforts. More specialized services include flood control, water conservation and agricultural enforcement. In all, the County has 38 departments and a dedicated workforce of more than 100,000 employees to carry out this important work.

There are 88 cities within the County, each with its own city government. Roughly 65% of the County–more than 2,600 square miles–is unincorporated. For the more than one million people living in those areas, the Board of Supervisors serves as their "city council" and County departments provide municipal services like fire and paramedic services, animal care and control, water, road maintenance and trash collection.

Unlike federal and state governments, which rely on a separation of powers, the Board of Supervisors has executive, legislative and quasi-judicial powers. It sets policy and appoints all department heads other than the assessor, district attorney and sheriff, who are elected officials. Each member of the Board is elected to a four-year term by the voters in their respective district and is subject to a threeterm limit. Under the State's Brown Act, with limited exceptions, all meetings of the Board are open to the public, and we welcome your participation in County government.











Board of Supervisors Responsibilities

The governmental powers of the County of Los Angeles are exercised through a Board of Supervisors, through agents and officers acting under the authority of the Board, or by authority conferred by law. Provisions of the Los Angeles County Charter call for a five-member Board of Supervisors, each of whom must be an elector of the district represented, must reside therein during incumbency, must have been such an elector for at least one year immediately preceding election, and be elected by the district. The Board of Supervisors fulfills three major powers in County government: executive, legislative and quasi-judicial.

In an executive capacity, the responsibilities of a County Supervisor to constituents who reside in unincorporated areas are similar to those of a mayor of an incorporated city. The supervisor is required to administer all local governmental services. In its legislative role, the Board may adopt ordinances and rules, both to control the administration of County government and to regulate public conduct within the unincorporated areas of the County. Acting in a quasi-judicial capacity, the Board acts as an appeals board on zone exception cases of the Regional Planning Commission. It sits for hearings on County improvement districts and on appeals in licensing matters.

The Board of Supervisors is responsible for the adoption of an annual budget outlining the expenditures of all branches of the County on a fiscal year basis. It also serves as the governing body of many special districts, including Flood Control and Fire Protection Districts. The Board supervises the activities of the Chief Executive Officer and all County Departments, determines County and special district policies and sets salaries of County personnel.

Each supervisor has the responsibility of selecting residents to serve on the various County commissions and committees. In addition to the duties specifically assigned to the Board of Supervisors by law, each Board office acts as a liaison between the public and the many branches of government.

The Department of Animal Care and Control (DACC) operates seven animal care centers (ACC) located in the cities of Agoura Hills, Baldwin Park, Carson/Gardena, Castaic, Downey, Lancaster and Palmdale. These ACCs provide safe, humane care for animals that are lost or no longer wanted by

their owners. The ACC staff and volunteers work tirelessly to reunite lost pets with their owners or find new homes for homeless pets. Animal Care also has a variety of programs and refers to a variety of programs to help county pet owners. The Department employs sworn animal control officers who serve as a key component of the community's public and animal safety program. Our animal control officers enforce state and local animal laws and respond to requests for service seven days a week, 24 hours a day. These officers protect communities from dangerous animals; rescue sick, injured or lost animals; investigate animal cruelty, abuse, neglect and illegal animal fighting; enforce local and state animal ordinances and support local law enforcement officials. DACC also partners with LA County first responders to assist residents and their pets, rescuing animals from wildfires, flooding, earthquakes and man-made disasters.

Lost and Found: Residents who have lost a pet may visit the seven animal care centers to reclaim them. Residents should also check animalcare.lacounty.gov as pictures are uploaded in real time.

Adoption: Animal Care and Control operates seven care centers, where community members can find a pet for adoption. (Visit our website to self-schedule your adoption appointment for our designated hours online at animalcare.lacounty.gov. Adoption walk-ins are also available Sunday thru Saturday from 2 p.m. -5 p.m., except on Wednesdays from 2 p.m. -7 p.m.)

The mission of the Los Angeles County Department of Arts and Culture (Arts and Culture) is to advance arts, culture and creativity throughout LA County. Arts and Culture fulfills this mission by providing grants and technical assistance for nonprofit organizations; professional development opportunities for artists, educators and nonprofit arts organization staff; commissions for new artwork and management of the County's civic art collection; implementation of Countywide arts education initiatives; equityfocused research and evaluation; career pathways in the creative economy; and cross-sector creative strategies with County departments and agencies that address civic issues. All of this work is framed by the County's Cultural Equity and Inclusion Initiative, and a longstanding commitment to fostering equity and access to the arts.

Arts Education Collective (Arts Ed Collective): The Arts Ed Collective is the regional initiative dedicated to making the arts a core part of every child's growth and development. Established by the Board in 2002, the initiative today includes a robust coalition of 74 school districts, 5 charter school networks, 13 different County agencies, and hundreds of community-based organizations, teaching artists, educators, philanthropists and advocates. Through programs and activities that expand arts teaching and learning, strengthen partnerships and collaborations, and increase public awareness about the importance of arts education, the Arts Ed Collective aligns efforts across the County to achieve the shared goal that all young people engage in the arts all year, every year, because the arts are fundamental to human growth and development.

Arts Ed is also committed to systems-reform efforts that emphasize a coordinated approach for positive youth development. The aim is to embed the arts within multiple systems of care to promote healing, personal growth and overall well-being among County youth (and families) impacted, or at risk of becoming impacted, by the justice system.

Arts Internship Program (AIP): Established in 2000 by the Board, AIP provides undergraduates with meaningful experience working in nonprofit arts organizations, while also assisting organizations to develop future arts leaders. As the largest paid internship program in the nation, with a mandate to include community college students, AIP provides opportunity for students who might not otherwise have a pathway into arts leadership and careers in the creative economy.

Civic Art: Provides leadership in the development of high-quality civic spaces by integrating artists into the planning and design process at the earliest possible opportunity, encouraging innovative approaches to civic art, and providing access to artistic experiences of the highest caliber for the residents of LA County. Manages the County's civic art collection, comprised of historic and contemporary civic artworks located on County properties.

Cross-Sector Collaboration: Arts and Culture partners with County departments, agencies and the private sector to develop creative solutions to civic challenges and increase access to culture. The Creative Strategist-Artist in Residence (Creative Strategist) program, for instance, places artists, arts administrators or other creative workers in County departments to work alongside staff, project partners and community stakeholders in a collaborative process to develop and implement artist-driven solutions to complex social challenges.

Grants and Professional Development: Provides funding support to organizations through the Organizational Grant Program and the Community Impact Arts Grant, ensuring cultural services and opportunities are accessible to residents of all ages. Grantees can also take advantage of technical assistance and management development programs relating to the organization's needs.

Research and Evaluation: This division helps ensure Arts and Culture's programs are rooted in facts, based on evidence and build on promising practices from the field. The division reports on aspects of the arts ecology including salaries and benefits in arts nonprofits, the relationship between arts education and creative employment, cultural equity and inclusion, and creative career pathway resources for young people in LA County.

Beach Use Permits and Harbor Use Licenses are required on LA Countyoperated beaches or in Marina del Rey for the following: (1) any commercial use; and (2) any use for an organized gathering with more than 50 people; or (3) any use involving any hired services (regardless of group size). The types of activities or events can include camps, school field trips, beach clean-up, weddings, parties, memorials or sporting events. Under the authority of Article 13 of the Constitution of the State of California, the Board of Supervisors created five assessment appeals boards to sit as the local Board of Equalization for the County of Los Angeles. Effective January 2021, the California Revenue and Taxation Code § 1621 was amended to allow expansion of the number of assessment appeals board to address the high volume of appeals received each year.

The function of the Assessment Appeals Board is to conduct impartial hearings on appeals filed by property owners who are seeking a reduction in the assessor's valuation of their property. Based on the evidence presented at these hearings, the board determines the fair market value of the property assessment. The board is required by law to hear and make a final determination on an appeal within two years of the timely filing of an application.

Time for Filing:

- **Regular Assessments:** Filing period for the regular assessment (annual tax bill) for real and personal property is July 2 to Nov. 30 of each year.
- **Supplemental Assessments:** Filing period is within 60 days of the mailing date printed on the supplemental assessment notice or tax bill, or the postmark date of the notice or tax bill, whichever is later.
- Roll Change/Adjusted/Escape Assessments: Filing period is within 60 days of the mailing date printed on the roll change/adjusted/escape assessment notice or tax bill, or the postmark date of the notice or tax bill, whichever is later.
- **Misfortune or Calamity Reassessments:** Filing period is within six months of the mailing date of the assessor's proposed reassessment notice. If the final filing date falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, an application that is mailed and postmarked on the next business day shall be deemed to have been filed timely.
- **Online Filing:** Applications filed online require authentication of an electronic signature in accordance with the procedure set forth by the Clerk of the Assessment Appeals Board.

Hearing Process: Based on the evidence presented at the hearing by the applicant and by the assessor, the Assessment Appeals Board determines the fair market value of each property for which an application for equalization is made. The board may increase or reduce individual assessments in order to establish the full cash value of property for the appropriate base year. The board has no jurisdiction to grant or deny exemptions or to consider allegations that claim for exemption from property taxes has been improperly denied. The board acts in a quasi-judicial capacity and renders its decision only on the basis of proper evidence presented at the hearing.

In addition, the applicant may submit a written request for an informal assessment appeals hearing under the Hearing Officer Program. This program provides an expedited process in which qualified properties may be heard by an assessment hearing officer instead of a formal assessment appeal board hearing. Qualified properties include single-family residences, condominiums, cooperatives, or a multi-family dwellings of four units or less, regardless of value. The valuation on other properties heard by the hearing officer may not exceed \$3 million in assessed valuation on the current assessment roll. If the applicant/assessor does not agree with the hearing officer's recommendation, applicant/assessor must submit a written request for a board hearing within 14 days of the hearing officer's recommendation date. The board is not bound by the hearing officer's report and recommendation and may accept or reject the recommendation. Assessment Appeals Board decisions are final unless appealed to the Superior Court.

Public Education Seminar: This program is developed to help taxpayers better understand the assessment appeals process. Conducted every third Wednesday of the month, these virtual seminars provide information on appeal rights; how and when to file an application for assessment reduction; how to prepare for a hearing; what is admissible evidence; what happens at the hearing; and what to expect after the hearing. Seminars are available to anyone interested in learning about the appeals process, including those who have already filed an application with the Assessment Appeals Board. The Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services has worked to keep children safe and support families in crisis since 1984. The department employs social workers, attorneys, public health nurses, mental health clinicians and administrative staff across multiple specialized bureaus and 20 regional offices throughout LA County's more than 4,084 square miles. DCFS provides a broad array of services and programs to support children and families in crisis, with most functions – such as the primary responsibilities identified below – required by federal or state statute.

Child Protection Hotline: DCFS oversees the County's 24/7 child abuse and neglect hotline and responds to the immediate needs of any child at risk. When a call reporting suspicions of child maltreatment is received through the Hotline, social workers determine how best to respond, in many cases conducting a thorough investigation that may include interviews with the child, family, teachers, medical professionals and others to assess risk and safety and take all necessary precautions.

Family Maintenance: When it is determined that a child can safely remain in the home and that the family can benefit from services, DCFS works with parents to develop a prevention plan and connect the family with support services. Parents can pursue this path voluntarily or may be court-mandated to complete required trainings or services.

Out-of-Home Placement: When a child must be removed from his or her home, DCFS works to find a temporary, loving and stable home environment for the child, such as with relatives, a certified foster parent, also known as a resource parent, or in a communal living setting, known as a Short-Term Residential Treatment Program.

Family Reunification: Whenever possible, family reunification is the goal for DCFS cases, as evidence-based research shows it is often the best outcome for a child's development and well-being. DCFS works with parents to develop a case plan with clear goals, a visitation schedule and other steps necessary for reunification.

Permanent Placement: In cases when reunification is not possible and a court elects to terminate parental rights, DCFS works to identify an alternative permanent home – whether this is a relative who becomes a legal guardian, a

foster parent who adopts, or another arrangement to help the child heal and ultimately thrive.

Consumer Counseling Center: Provides counseling on consumer related matters, real estate, wage and hour, and small claims forms and procedures to the public. Provides options available to consumers to resolve their concerns, including making appropriate referrals to other Department of Consumer Business Affairs (DCBA) programs, County Departments, community partners and other local, state and federal agencies.

Complaint Investigations: Investigates consumer complaints involving allegations of consumer fraud, deceptive businesses practices, elder financial abuse, foster youth identity theft, price gouging and real estate fraud. Based on investigative findings, cases are referred to prosecuting agencies for criminal or civil prosecution. Consumers and businesses are made aware of consumer protection laws. Works in partnership with other County departments and government agencies to advocate on behalf of consumers and prevent consumers from becoming victims of fraud.

Consumer Education and Public Outreach: Coordinates communication efforts with the public. This includes organizing and developing: speaking engagements, workshops, tabling events and consumer education fairs; social media; brochures, news articles, photos and other written materials in plain language; media relations and interview requests; and relations with other departments, agencies and the offices of local elected officials.

Dispute Resolution Services: Provides neutral mediators to help persons and businesses voluntarily resolve disputes in a friendly, accessible and confidential manner. Mediations can be conducted by phone, in person or online. Persons or businesses residing, working or operating in LA County are eligible to receive mediation services at little or no cost. Common issues that can be mediated include landlord-tenant disputes, neighbor-to-neighbor disagreements, family arguments, and billing questions. DCBA funds nine dispute resolution organizations to provide mediation services.

Housing and Tenant Protections: Enforces the County's Rent Stabilization ordinances for residents in the unincorporated areas of LA County; and ensures tenants, mobile homeowners, landlords, and park owners are informed of their rights and responsibilities. Provides residents with information about their rights as tenants, free legal representation, short-term rental assistance, and referrals to resources and services to prevent eviction. Coordinates StayHoused LA, a partnership between the County of Los Angeles, the City of Los Angeles and local community and legal service providers to provide tenants with the information and support needed to exercise their rights so that they can remain safely in their homes. Web: rent.lacounty.gov.

Foreclosure Prevention: Assists homeowners by working directly with lenders to explore all options to avoid foreclosure. Counselors can help residents understand the foreclosure process, communicate with lenders, review and submit documentation, create a budget and savings plan, and make referrals to additional resources.

Office of Labor Equity: Answers questions regarding the County's worker protection ordinances, educates employers and workers in order to bring them into compliance, accepts complaints, and conducts investigations into allegations of workplace violations. Supports several workplace protections including the Minimum Wage and Minimum Wage Enforcement Ordinances in unincorporated areas of LA County, the Anti-Retaliation Ordinance for reporting workplace health violations, and the Prevention of Human Trafficking Ordinance. Issues citations, conducts settlement negotiations, and provides counseling and training for employers.

Center for Financial Empowerment: Convenes, advocates, and builds capacity to strengthen the financial health of County residents, with a focus on Black, Indigenous and People of Color (BIPOC), to build economic resiliency. Helps residents with low-to-moderate incomes improve their financial capability by coordinating and aligning the financial empowerment services provided by government, for-profit and nonprofit sectors, including free or low-cost income tax preparation services and checking accounts. Office of Cannabis Management: Oversees commercial cannabis activities unincorporated LA County through the development within and implementation of policies that seek to promote the health, safety and wellbeing of our communities. The Office of Cannabis Management also receives complaints about illicit dispensaries in unincorporated LA County and works with partner agencies to enforce local laws and regulation and educate the community about cannabis enforcement and compliance. The District Attorney's Office is dedicated to protecting our community through the fair and ethical pursuit of justice and the safeguarding of crime victims' rights. The office's top priority is the prosecution of violent and dangerous criminals – murderers, rapists, gang members, child abusers and robbers among them. The office prosecutes felony crimes for all unincorporated areas and cities throughout LA County. The office also prosecutes misdemeanor crimes in unincorporated areas of the County and in 78 out of 88 cities: the cities of Burbank, Hawthorne, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Long Beach, Los Angeles, Pasadena, Redondo Beach, Santa Monica and Torrance prosecute their own misdemeanor cases.

Criminal cases are filed at the Clara Shortridge Foltz Justice Center in downtown Los Angeles and at branch, area and juvenile courthouses throughout LA County. Deputy district attorneys work closely with local law enforcement personnel in their respective regions to investigate and prosecute criminal activity. Deputy district attorneys are prosecutors who represent the people of the State of California.

Additionally, the office provides specialized staff and programs to assist in the prosecution of specific crimes; to provide information and support for

people who have been victimized by crime or who are witnesses; and to educate the community about various types of crime, the criminal justice process, office services and crime prevention resources.

The department operates three acute care hospitals, a renowned rehabilitation center, 25 health centers, and four mobile clinics. Services include primary and specialty care, urgent and emergency care, inpatient care, OB/GYN, pediatric, HIV/AIDS, and psychiatric services. Medi-Cal and Medicare insurance is accepted. DHS also offers affordable payment plans to low-income, uninsured residents.

LA Health Services also provides healthcare to youth in the juvenile system, inmates in the County jails, and foster care children. Our community programs include Housing for Health and the Office of Diversion and Re-Entry, each playing a critical role in connecting vulnerable populations, including people experiencing homelessness and those released from correctional and institutional settings to supportive housing.

The Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health (LACDMH) is the largest county-level mental health department in the United States. It directly operates more than 75 sites and more than 100 co-located sites with other government agencies; and contracts with more than 1,000 providers, including non-governmental agencies and individual practitioners who provide a spectrum of mental health services to people of all ages to support hope, wellbeing and recovery.

Mental health services provided include screenings and assessments, case management, self-help peer support groups, outreach to homeless still living on the street, crisis intervention, medication support, peer support and other recovery services.

Services are provided in multiple settings, including residential facilities, clinics, schools, hospitals, juvenile halls and camps, urgent care centers, mental health courts, board-and-care homes, in the field and in homes. Special emphasis is placed on addressing co-occurring mental health disorders and other health problems associated with addiction. Clinicians also provide counseling to victims of natural or manmade disasters, their families and emergency first responders.

LACDMH is also responsible for protecting patients' rights in all public and private hospitals and programs providing mental health care and treatment, and all contracted community-based programs. The department also serves as the public guardian for individuals considered gravely disabled by mental illness, and handles conservatorship investigations for the County.

The Mental Health Services Act (MHSA) has allowed for the development and implementation of full-service partnership programs, wellness centers and alternative crisis services, as well as navigator teams and field-capable clinical

services for all age groups. Services are provided by licensed and waived professionals as well as past and current mental health clients and family members.

Since its inception in 1965, LACMA has been devoted to collecting works of art that span both history and geography, in addition to representing Los Angeles's uniquely diverse population. Today LACMA is the largest art museum in the western United States, with a collection of over 135,000 objects that illuminate 6,000 years of art history from new and unexpected points of view. A museum of international stature as well as a vital cultural center for Southern California, LACMA shares its vast collection with Greater LA County and beyond through exhibitions, public programs and research facilities that attract over 1.5 million visitors annually, in addition to serving millions more through community partnerships, school outreach programs and creative digital initiatives.

Among the museum's strengths are its holdings of Asian art; Latin American art, ranging from masterpieces from the Ancient Americas to works by leading modern and contemporary artists; and Islamic art, of which LACMA hosts one of the most significant collections in the world. The museum approaches the past from a contemporary perspective through collaborations with artists and architects in the presentation of its collections, and through the installation of monumental artworks by the likes of Chris Burden, Barbara Kruger, Michael Heizer and others around its campus.

The museum is renowned for its educational and cultural programs, which annually serve hundreds of thousands of visitors, including children, seniors and the physically challenged. Several tours (free with admission) are offered six days per week for the general public and school groups. The Boone Children's Gallery resides in the Hammer Building, where kids can learn about brush painting used in Korean art for free. The museum's film and music programs are among the most robust and diverse in the country. LACMA also engages with diverse audiences in neighborhoods throughout the County through exhibitions, workshops and other programming. LACMA's satellite gallery at Charles White Elementary School in MacArthur Park presents exhibitions and public programming free of charge, and highlights of LACMA's collections are on view at Vincent Price Art Museum at East Los Angeles College in Monterey Park.

Parking for LACMA is in the Pritzker Parking Garage, accessed from 6th Street, just east of Fairfax Blvd., on Wilshire Blvd. and Spaulding Ave.; and at metered

parking available on neighboring streets. For those with disabilities, elevator access is available in the parking garage or at the museum's alternate entrance on Wilshire Blvd. and Spaulding Ave. Free charging stations for electric vehicles are available on the first level of the Pritzker Parking Garage.

General admission for LA County residents is \$21, and admission for students (with valid ID) and senior citizens over 65 is \$16. For non-LA County residents, general admission is \$25, admission for students and senior citizens is \$21. Children 17 and under are always free. Additionally, children may join Arts for NexGen, LACMA's acclaimed youth membership program; as a benefit of this free membership, kids may bring one adult to the museum free of charge. The museum is free to all LA County residents after 3 p.m. on weekdays (closed Wednesday). LACMA offers numerous opportunities for free admission, including on the second Tuesday of every month; select federal holiday Mondays, sponsored by Target; and on select days throughout the year. LACMA memberships begin at \$80 annually for individuals and \$40 for students.

Natural History Museum (NHM) was the first dedicated museum building in Los Angeles, opening its doors in 1913. It has since amassed one of the world's most extensive and valuable collections of natural and cultural history—more than 35 million objects. The curatorial staff not only cares for those collections, but uses them for groundbreaking scientific and historic research. Today, the museum incorporates on- and off-site nature and culture exploration in its community, a slate of community science programs, and active research – creating a new natural history museum experience that explores the past, but increasingly addresses the present and the future.

The museum also curates new, immersive exhibitions that give visitors the opportunity to explore the "big picture" of global topics, often seen through a local lens of specimens and objects, the stories behind them, and the ways that nature and culture interact. NHM's permanent exhibitions include:

- Becoming Los Angeles
- Dinosaur Hall; Gems and Mineral Hall; Bird Hall
- Nature Lab; Nature Gardens; Age of Mammals
- Dinosaur Encounters snarling, stomping, life-size *T. rex* and *Triceratops* puppets in live presentations

- Ralph M. Parsons Discovery Center
- Dino Lab: Real Dinosaurs, Real Paleontologists
- Visible Vault: Archeological Treasures from Latin America
- Butterfly Pavilion and Spider Pavilion
- Seasonal special exhibits focusing on Los Angeles

The museum is a teacher resource for Southern California educators. Its halls contain content for lessons that meet California state curriculum standards, and there are downloadable lesson plans and activities on the museum's website. The museum houses the Ralph M. Parsons Discovery Center, an interactive, family-friendly space where visitors can handle artifacts and specimens, and watch live animal presentations while learning about camouflage, habitat and their important contributions to the planet.

The museum offers school tours, community outreach programs, free family programming on the weekends, and day camps called "Adventures in Nature." Its nighttime First Fridays series attracts an adult crowd with compelling discussions, DJs and live bands. Outdoor events such as Summer Nights in the Garden and the L.A. Nature Fest encourage engagement in the natural world by giving visitors access to community activists and international scientists.

General admission is \$15 for adults; \$12 for college students with ID, senior citizens and youth 13-17; and \$7 for children 3-12. Free for children 2 and under, Museum members, California teachers and students, active military personnel and veterans, and EBT cardholders. Admission is free every Tuesday in September and the first Tuesday of the month, October through June. Admission is also free for L.A. County residents Monday through Friday, from 3-5 p.m.

The La Brea Tar Pits and Museum showcases Ice Age fossils from the most famous active, urban excavation localities in the world. Many of the permanent

exhibits are designed with family interaction in mind: visitors are invited to test their strength against the pull of asphalt, and touch a massive leg bone of an extinct giant ground sloth. Through the windows of the transparent Fossil Lab, guests can watch bones being cleaned and repaired by lab volunteers. Ice Age Encounters features a life-sized saber-toothed cat puppet in performances Fridays through Sundays, and the new Excavator Tour showcases indoor and outdoor highlights, including the newly-opened Observation Pit.

Outside the museum, the 23-acre grounds feature the still-bubbling Lake Pit, life-size models of extinct mammoths, and a Pleistocene Garden which reveals what Los Angeles looked like 10,000 to 50,000 years ago during the last Ice Age, when animals such as saber-toothed cats and mammoths roamed the L.A. Basin. Visitors can also watch live excavation from July to early September as paleontologists extract fossils from asphalt as a part of Project 23 and Pit 91. The fossil observation areas are open free.

General admission is \$15 for adults; \$12 for college students with ID, senior citizens 62+ and youth 13-17; and \$7 for children 3-12. The museum is free for children 2 and under, Museum members, California teachers and students, active military personnel and veterans, and EBT cardholders. Admission is free every Tuesday in September and the first Tuesday of the month, October through June. Admission is also free for L.A. County residents Monday through Friday, from 3 p.m. – 5 p.m.

The Los Angeles County Registrar's office is responsible for the registration of voters, maintenance of voter files, conducting federal, state, local and special elections, and the verification of initiative, referendum and recall petitions. There are approximately 5.6 million registered voters and approximately 5,000 election precincts established in the County.

Candidate Filing

Candidate qualifications and requirements depend on election type. In California, candidates must be:

- A registered voter and otherwise qualified to vote for the office at the time that nomination papers are issued to the person or at the time of the person's appointment. (Elections Code § 201)
- Other rules depend on what cities and the California Constitution dictates.

The Registrar's office produces a Candidate Handbook and Resource Guide to assist candidates filing for office. The guide provides a general overview of major events and valuable information related to critical deadlines for the candidate filing process, guidelines for candidate statements, and campaign finance disclosure filing requirements.

Campaign Finance

Beginning January 1, 2021, Assembly Bill 2151 requires local government agencies to post campaign statements and reports on their agency's website within 72 hours of each applicable filing deadline, if they are filed in paper format. Before posting, the local filing officer shall redact the street name and building number of the persons or entity representatives listed on any statement, report or document, or any bank account number required to be disclosed by the filer. The reports and statements must remain on the agency's website for at least 4 years.

Voter Registration

You may register to vote if you are a U.S. Citizen, a California resident, 18 years of age at the time of the next election, not currently serving a State or Federal prison term for the conviction of a felony, and not currently found mentally incompetent to vote by a court.

Registration forms are available in most government buildings, such as the U.S. Post Office, libraries, DMV offices, or any of the Registrar's offices located throughout LA County. You may also register online at <u>registertovote.ca.gov</u>.

To check your voter registration status, re-register if you have moved, changed your name or wish to change your political party affiliation, or to cancel your voter registration, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Birth, Death & Marriage Records

Birth, death and marriage records can be ordered online, in person or by mail. For more information on how to order a record or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Birth Records

The Recorder provides records for births that occurred in LA County from 1876 to present.

There are two types of birth certificates available: certified copies and informational copies. An authorized certified copy is required to obtain a driver's license, passport, Social Security card and other services related to verifying an individual's identity. An informational copy usually fulfills the needs of genealogists and others that are only requesting information. The informational copy has the legend "Informational, not a valid document to establish identity" written across the face of the document.

Individuals legally permitted to receive an authorized certified copy:

- The registrant or a parent or legal guardian of the registrant.
- A child, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse or domestic partner of the registrant.
- A party entitled to receive the record because of a court order, or an attorney or a licensed adoption agency seeking the birth record to comply with the requirements of Section 3140 or 7603 of the Family

Code.

- A member of a law enforcement agency or a representative of another governmental agency, as provided by law, who is conducting official business.
- An attorney representing the registrant or the registrant's estate, or any person or agency empowered by statute or appointed by a court to act on behalf of the registrant or the registrant's estate.

Individuals who do not fit into any of the above categories can only obtain an informational copy. Certified copies of original documents from 1963 to the present (except 1972-1977) will be provided at your scheduled appointment. Records from 1866-1962, 1972-1977 and all informational certified copies will be processed and mailed within 20 working days.

Death Records (45 days or more after the date of death)

The Recorder provides records of deaths that occurred in LA County from 1877 to the present.

There are currently two types of death certificates available: certified copies and informational copies. An authorized certified copy of a death record may be required to obtain death benefits, claim insurance proceeds, notify Social Security, and obtain other services related to an individual's identity. An informational copy usually fulfills the needs of genealogists and others that are only requesting information. The informational copy has the legend "Informational, not a valid document to establish identity" written across the face of the document.

Individuals permitted to receive an authorized certified copy:

- A parent or legal guardian of the registrant.
- A child, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse or domestic partner of the registrant.
- A member of a law enforcement agency or representative of another governmental agency, as provided by law, who is conducting official business.
- An attorney representing the registrant or the registrant's estate, or any person or agency empowered by statute or appointed by a court to act on behalf of the registrant or the registrant's estate.
- Any funeral director or agent/employee of a funeral establishment acting within the scope of their employment who orders certified copies of a death certificate on behalf of any individual specified in paragraphs (1) to (5), inclusive, of subdivision (a) of Section 7100 of the Health and Safety Code.
- Any individual specified in paragraphs (1) to (8) inclusive of subdivision (a) of Health & Safety Code 7100.

Individuals who do not fit into any of the above categories can only obtain an informational copy. Certified copies of original documents (authorized or informational) for death records requested in person or by mail are processed and mailed within 20 working days. Certified copies of original documents from 1995 to present will be provided at your scheduled appointment. Records from 1877-1994, and all informational certified copies will be processed and mailed within 20 working days.

Information on deaths occurring within the past 45 days must be obtained from Public Health, 313 N. Figueroa St., Rm. L-1, Los Angeles 90012, (213) 240-7816.

Marriage Records (After Marriage)

The Recorder provides records for marriages where the license was issued in LA County from 1852 to the present.

There are two types of marriage records: public marriage records and confidential marriage records.

Confidential Marriage Records

Copies of confidential marriage records may only be obtained by the parties to the marriage or by court order. Informational certified copies are <u>not</u> issued for confidential marriage records.

Public Marriage Records

There are currently two types of public marriage certificates available: certified copies and informational copies. An authorized certified copy is required to obtain a driver's license, passport, Social Security card and other services related to verifying an individual's identity. An informational copy usually fulfills the needs of genealogists and others that are only requesting information. The informational copy has "Informational, not a valid document to establish identity" written across the face of the document.

Individuals permitted by law to receive an authorized certified copy:

- One of the parties to the marriage or a parent or legal guardian of one of the parties.
- A child, grandparent, grandchild, sibling, spouse or domestic partner of one of the parties to the marriage.
- A member of a law enforcement agency or a representative of another governmental agency, as provided by law, who is conducting official business.
- An attorney representing one of the parties to the marriage or the party's estate, or any person or agency empowered by statute or appointed by a court to act on behalf of one of the parties to the marriage or the party's estate.

Individuals who do not fit into any of the above categories can only obtain an informational copy. Certified copies of original documents (authorized or informational) for marriage records 1995 to present will be provided at your scheduled appointment. Records dating from 1852 – 1994, and all informational certified copies will be processed and mailed within 20 working days.

Deputy Commissioner for a Day

The Deputy Commissioner for a Day Program allows individuals to be deputized for a day to allow them to perform a marriage ceremony. Please contact our office at (562) 462-2082 for the availability of this service.

Homesteads

A declaration of homestead may be declared and recorded by owners of real property on their principal place of residence to protect their home from forced sale in satisfaction of certain types of creditors' claims. Signatures on the declaration of homestead must be notarized.

The Declaration of Homestead form is available on our website or may be purchased at most office supply and legal stationery stores.

Homestead documents may be recorded by mail or in person. For more information on recording requirements and applicable fees, or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Liens

A lien is an encumbrance that makes property secure for the payment of a debt or discharge on an obligation. The Recorder/County Clerk serves notification by mail to debtors when an involuntary lien is recorded against them. An involuntary lien is a lien that a property owner did not sign.

If you have received a copy of a lien from the County Recorder and have questions, you must contact the person or agency that filed the lien. By law, the County Recorder cannot make any changes or alterations to a lien document. Once you have contacted the person or agency that filed the lien and have resolved the issue, a release of lien must be submitted to the County Recorder for recording.

Documents may be recorded by mail or in person. For more information on recording requirements and applicable fees, or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Property Document Recording

The County Recorder, upon payment of proper fees and taxes, will accept any document that is authorized or required by California law to be recorded, if the document contains the required information and if it is photographically reproducible.

Documents may be recorded by mail or in person. For more information on document recording requirements and applicable fees, or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Real Estate Records

The Recorder's office records and maintains real estate records in LA County since 1850. The records are maintained in alphabetical indexes by name and year the document was recorded. The Recorder's office does not provide online access to real estate records or indexes. Section 6254.21 of the Government Code prohibits online posting of home addresses of any elected or appointed official without their written permission. Since the Recorder cannot identify such individuals and their home addresses, which may be a part of the record, the Los Angeles County Counsel's Office recommended that the RR/CC not make these records available online.

Any member of the public can search and request real estate records.

Domestic Partnership Filing

The Domestic Partnership registry is intended to assist unmarried adult couples who reside or are employed within LA County and who are applying for domestic partnership benefits from employers.

Couples may file a statement of domestic partnership in person at any of our office locations. For more information on requirements for filing a domestic partnership or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Fictitious Business Names/Proof of Publication

Who should file?

• Persons doing business for profit under a fictitious name (does not include surname in the company name).

- Statement must be filed in the county of principal place of business and may also be filed in other counties as long as the requirements for filing in the county of principal place of business have been met.
- Non-profit corporations, organizations or associations are not required to file a Fictitious Business Name Statement.

State law requires that **within 30 days of filing**, the registrant must publish a statement in a newspaper of general circulation **once a week for four consecutive weeks** in the county where the principal place of business is located. A renewal does not require publication.

Fictitious business name filings can be done online, in person or by mail. For more information on filing requirements and applicable fees, or to book an inperson appointment or file online, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Marriage License, Civil Ceremonies & Justice of the Peace Marriage License (before marriage)

The County Clerk provides marriage licenses to couples getting married in the near future and may be used in any county in California.

To obtain a marriage license, the couple must apply for the marriage license online and then schedule an appointment to complete the marriage license process. For more information on marriage license requirements, applying for a marriage license and all applicable fees, or to book an in-person appointment, visit LAVOTE.GOV.

Civil Ceremony

The County Clerk conducts marriage ceremonies at the Norwalk office and select branch offices by appointment only. The fee is \$35. Couples must obtain a license prior to booking an appointment for their ceremony. At least one witness must be present at the ceremony unless the couple is marrying using a confidential marriage license. Couples are responsible for bringing their own witnesses. If they do not have a witness, one can be provided for a fee of \$20.

Justice of the Peace

The position of justice of the peace does not exist in the State of California. The following authorized persons may perform marriage ceremonies in this state: a member of clergy of any religious denomination, California state judge or retired judge, commissioner of civil marriages, federal judge or retired federal judge, current legislator, or constitutional officer of California, current member of Congress who represents a district within California, and a person that holds or formerly held an elected office of a city, county, or city and county.

Notary Public Oath & Bonds

Whether you are a new or renewing Notary Public, you may subscribe to your oath and file your bond and oath with the County Recorder's office.

Registration for a new or renewing Notary Public is available in person or by mail. For more information on the registration process and applicable fees, or to book an in-person appointment, visit <u>LAVOTE.GOV</u>.

Process Servers

Process Servers who received compensation for more than 10 process services within a calendar year must file a Process Server Registration application with the County where their principal business or residence is located. Process Server Registration applications must be filed at the Recorder/County Clerk main office located in Norwalk. The registrant must appear in person and meet the following requirements:

- Possess a valid, government-issued, photo identification (established by a birth certificate, such as a driver's license or passport).
- The principal place of business or residential address must be in LA County.
- Present a bond in the amount of \$2,000 naming the registrant as principal, providing a term of two years, commencement date and expiration date.
- Pursuant to Business and Profession Code §22350 and §22351.5, the registrant will be required to submit a completed Live Scan application. A 90-day temporary identification card will be issued until Live Scan results from the Department of Justice have been reviewed and accepted. Thereafter, the permanent identification cards will be issued at the time of registration in our office. Additional or replacement cards (in the event a card is lost or stolen) are \$10 each.

The Los Angeles County Sanitation Districts protect public health and the environment through innovative and cost-effective wastewater and solid waste management and, in doing so, convert waste into resources such as recycled water, energy and recycled materials. The agency consists of 24 independent special districts and functions on a regional scale with a service area covering approximately 850 square miles, including 78 cities and unincorporated territory within the County. The 24 districts work cooperatively

under a joint administration agreement with one administrative staff headquartered near the City of Whittier. Each district has its own board of directors consisting of the mayor of each city within the district and the chair of the Board of Supervisors for districts with unincorporated territory. This agency is separate from LA Sanitation and Environment, which serves the City of Los Angeles.

The Sanitation Districts' 1,400 miles of main trunk sewers and 11 wastewater treatment plants convey and treat about half the wastewater produced in LA County. The agency is a pioneer in the production of recycled water. Their water reclamation plants produce high-quality recycled water that essentially meets drinking water standards and is reused at more than 880 sites throughout the county. Their solid waste management facilities serve a portion of the county's solid waste management needs with a system that includes two sanitary landfills, two landfill-gas-to-energy recovery facilities, and three materials recovery/transfer facilities. One materials recovery facility and the recyclable sort line at another facility are leased to a third-party operator. The Sanitation Districts also participate in the operation of a refuse-to-energy facility. The agency operates a food waste recycling program to help its member cities comply with state organic recycling requirements. Furthermore, in January 2016, the Sanitation Districts gained authority to help local cities with stormwater management.

Secured Property Tax: Annual Secured Property Tax Bills for real property, such as vacant land and/or structures on land, are mailed in October and may include personal property taxes. The first installment payment is due on Nov. 1 and becomes delinquent by the close of business on December 10. The second installment payment is due on February 1 and becomes delinguent by the close of business on April 10. If the delinguency date falls on a Saturday or Sunday, by law, the Tax Collector extends the delinguency date to the close of business on the next business day. If the Tax Collector does not receive your payment, or the United States Postal Service (USPS) does not postmark your payment by the delinquency date, the Tax Collector will impose a 10% penalty on each installment and a \$10 cost on the second installment per State law. You may pay online, by mail, in person or by credit/debit card. You can pay your current and defaulted property taxes online 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, up until 11:59 p.m. Pacific Time on the delinguency date by eCheck or major credit/debit cards. Each credit/debit card transaction is limited to \$99,999.99, including a service fee, currently 2.22% of the transaction amount (minimum \$1.49 per transaction). The eCheck payment option requires a Personal Identification Number (PIN) and is free of charge. To make payments online, go to propertytax.lacounty.gov and select "Pay Property Taxes Online." To pay by mail, please return the appropriate payment stub(s) with your payment in the envelope provided with your tax bill. If paying both installments, please include both payment stubs. Checks, money orders and cashier's checks must be drawn in U.S. currency and made payable to the Los Angeles County Treasurer and Tax Collector. Do not include cash in the envelope. You must mail property tax payments to the Los Angeles County Treasurer and Tax Collector, Post Office Box 54018, Los Angeles 90054-0018. We also accept cash, check, money order, cashier's check and major credit/debit cards at 225 North Hill St., First Floor Lobby, Los Angeles 90012, between 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time, Monday through Friday, excluding LA County holidays. Commercial properties or unimproved vacant residential lots with three or more years in default (arrears) become subject to the tax collector's power to

sell at a public auction. Residential or agricultural properties with five or more years in default (arrears) become subject to the tax collector's power to sell at a public auction. If property taxes have defaulted, a prior delinguency notation will appear in the pink box of the Annual Secured Property Tax Bill. Property owners may be eligible to open an Installment Plan of Redemption and pay the defaulted taxes over a five-year period for defaulted properties that are not subject to the tax collector's power to sell at a public auction. Property owners who receive such a notation on their tax bills should contact the Tax Collector immediately. The State Controller's Office administers the Property Tax Postponement Program for senior, blind or disabled citizens. The program allows eligible homeowners to defer current-year property taxes on their principal residence if they meet certain criteria. Through its third-party notification program, the Tax Collector allows property owners to designate a person or an agency to receive a copy of past due notices. While third parties are not responsible for paying the tax bill, they can assist property owners with their property matters. Annual Unsecured Property Tax Bills for personal property are mailed between March 1 and June 30 of each year. The bills are due upon receipt and become delinquent if payments are not received or United States Postal Service (USPS) postmarked by August 31. Typical items assessed and collected on the unsecured tax roll include boats, airplanes, business property, and escape and supplemental assessments against former owners of real property. If Annual Unsecured Taxes are not paid as of November 1 of each year, the Tax Collector files a lien with the Registrar-Recorder. This lien prevents the assesse from recording real estate and loan transactions in LA County. In addition, most major credit reporting bureaus report the tax liens. A Release of Lien can be obtained after the unsecured taxes are paid in full.

To ensure the effectiveness and efficiency of these policies and programs, the commission consults closely with the Board of Supervisors and the County's Chief Executive Officer, and works in conjunction with its implementing partner, the Quality and Productivity Managers Network, comprised of representatives from every County department. The 17-member Quality and Productivity Commission was established in 1981 by the Board of Supervisors.

Redevelopment Oversight Boards

As part of the 2011 Budget Act, and in order to protect funding for core public services at the local level, the California State Legislature approved the dissolution of the State's 400 plus Redevelopment Agencies (RDAs). LA County had 71 RDAs. After litigation, the RDAs were officially dissolved on February 1, 2012. As a result of the elimination of the RDAs, property tax revenues are now being used to pay required payments on existing bonds, other obligations, and pass-through payments to local governments. The remaining property tax revenues that exceed the enforceable obligations are now allocated to cities, counties, special districts, and school and community college districts, thereby providing critical resources to preserve core public services.

To help facilitate the wind-down process at the local level, Successor Agencies were established to manage redevelopment projects currently underway, make payments on enforceable obligations, and dispose of redevelopment assets and properties. Each Successor Agency has an Oversight Board (OB) that supervises its work. The OB is comprised of representatives of the local agencies that serve the redevelopment project area: the city, County, special

districts and K-14 educational agencies. Oversight Board members have a fiduciary responsibility to holders of enforceable obligations, as well as to the local agencies that would benefit from property tax distributions from the former redevelopment project area.

In addition, there are four advisory, non-voting members: the Forester and Fire Warden, Director of Public Works, Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, and Agricultural Commissioner.

The Planning Commission acts as an advisory body to the Board of Supervisors on all planning matters, and administers the provisions of the State Planning Law (Title 7, Division I, of the Government Code), the State Subdivision Map Act, CEQA, and the LA County Ordinances affecting planning such as the County Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance. It formulates planning policies and conducts regular public hearings each Wednesday. The Regional Planning Commission also serves as the Airport Land Use Commission.

The blue signifies clear skies. The green border is to keep Los Angeles beautiful and the gold lettering "County of Los Angeles" stands for the land of opportunity for everyone since gold was discovered in California.

The seal in the center is the official seal of the County of Los Angeles.

The flag was approved on October 17, 1967, by the Board of Supervisors and flew for the first time in front of the County Courthouse on March 28, 1968.
