**REPORT BACK ON MOVING FORWARD ON THE EQUITABLE
IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN AND THE AMERICAN
RESCUE PLAN ACT EXPEDITED CONTRACTING (ITEM NO. 25, AGENDA OF
SEPTEMBER 15, 2021, AND ITEM NO. 12, AGENDA OF NOVEMBER 30,
2021)**

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bimonthly reports on the implementation of the equity formula and principles in the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process and to include updates on the public dashboard and website that ensure implementation information is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the Chief Executive Office to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

Attachment I provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated June 12, 2023, including progress made on the implementation of ARP projects and efforts to ensure that equity-centered investments reach the communities most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.



This report covers:

- The status of Request for Statements of Qualification (RFSQs) for contracted services using ARP funding;
- Updates on outreach efforts to increase awareness of ARP-funded programs for communities highly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. This includes a fact sheet that summarizes these outreach activities during fiscal year 2022-2023 in Attachment II; and
- ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on launch dates, encumbrances, and expenditures for approved projects, and contracting activities. A list of external partner agreements, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders is in Attachment III.

Reporting on the following two motions, *Moving Forward on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan* and *The American Rescue Plan Act Expedited Contracting* will continue to take place on a quarterly basis. The next Board report is scheduled for November 15, 2023.

Report on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan and Expedited Contracting

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bimonthly reports on the implementation of the equity formula and principles in the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process and to include updates on the public dashboard and website that ensure implementation information is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the Chief Executive Office (CEO) to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

This report provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated June 12, 2023, including progress made on the implementation of ARP projects and efforts to ensure that equity-based investments reach the communities most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The report covers:

- The status of Request for Statements of Qualification (RFSQs) for contracted services using ARP funding;
- Updates on outreach efforts to increase awareness of ARP-funded programs for communities highly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic; and
- ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on launch dates, encumbrances and expenditures for approved projects, financial recovery efforts, and contracting activities.

RFSQ Update

The RFSQ for the ARP Support Services Master Agreement (MA) released on April 29, 2022, remains open and continuous to ensure vendors have the opportunity to qualify as a contractor under the MA. Information about this funding opportunity remains posted on the ARP Recovery website:

<https://ceo.lacounty.gov/recovery/contract-opportunities>. As of August 8, 2023, 71 applications have been received, four are in the process to be qualified, nine are under technical review, with 32 vendors deemed qualified to provide services.

ARP Outreach and Engagement Efforts

Countywide Communications recently released a fact sheet summarizing the efforts of the Countywide Engagement Team during fiscal year 2022-2023 to raise awareness of ARP-funded programs and services. Highlights include:

- A four-month multilingual educational campaign leveraging a strategic combination of digital, social, radio, and out-of-home advertising mediums. Within three months, the campaign has generated:
 - More than 9.5 million impressions across social media platforms;
 - A listenership reach of more than 1.2 million per week across four traditional radio stations;
 - One digital radio platform; and
 - A combined reach of more than 2.5 million via out-of-home ads in the form of bus shelter posters and bus tail ads.
- Five ethnic media briefings that featured simultaneous translation lines in Spanish, Armenian, Korean, Mandarin, Tagalog, and Vietnamese;
- More than 100 media interviews including interviews with ethnic media and community outlets secured and coordinated through the Countywide Speakers Bureau, totaling more than 450 media interviews since the program started in 2020; and
- Increased public engagement with Los Angeles County content through the introduction of the LA County Close-Up newsletter. The weekly newsletter now reaches a subscriber base of more than 39,700 individuals, of which 37,000 are from outside of the organization. The newsletter gives subscribers direct access to County information related to top stories, services/programs, and events. It also highlights new County videos and photos that showcase County service in action, including ARP-funded programs.

The fact sheet is included in Attachment II.

Community-based Outreach Programs

In addition to digital, social, radio, and out-of-home advertising, there are three ARP-funded community-based outreach and navigation programs that support community-based partnership, such as promotora, health worker, ambassador, and community navigator programs, to ensure local communities are aware of recovery resources and services as they emerge from the pandemic. The Community Health Worker Outreach Initiative (CHWOI) established by the Department of Public Health (DPH) facilitates access to accurate, up-to-date information and services needed to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 and reduce barriers to COVID-19 vaccination through street-level outreach efforts. The initiative delivers in-language, culturally appropriate services to communities hardest hit by the pandemic through the dissemination of health information and education, tangible supports such as personal protective equipment (PPE) and hand sanitizer, and connecting residents to immediate COVID-19 related services (e.g., transportation, vaccination appointments, testing), as well as tailored strategies to address disparities in health outcomes (e.g., chronic disease) exacerbated by COVID-19.

The United Mental Health Promoters (UMHP) Community Based-Outreach program established by the Department of Mental Health (DMH) similarly addresses the needs of the most disadvantaged and marginalized communities. The program addresses the mental health and wellness of community residents by training community members to serve as trusted representatives to provide one-on-one psychosocial supports and referral/linkage services as pathways to recovery from the stress and other mental health impacts caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Finally, the Community Navigators Program by the CEO-ARDI has launched and is securing a network of community-based organizations that can effectively outreach, engage, and support organizations, small business owners, individuals, and their families in accessing ARP-funded resources and other County services needed to recover from the economic and social impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. Community navigation services are expected to assist residents in accessing programs that support behavioral health care; prevent and respond to violence; and assist in obtaining job training, childcare, food assistance, and housing. Community navigation providers shall also make referrals to financial assistance and other County services, technical assistance and navigation support, and training on how to navigate the County's contracting process.

While all three programs have varied focus areas and staff reporting structures, meetings have taken place to identify ways in which the programs can effectively collaborate and coordinate services. Immediate areas for collaboration and coordination include facilitating cross-training opportunities on subject areas and referral programs and sharing key, standardized messaging and communication materials for providers in all three programs to share with client. Through the Community Navigators Program, ARDI plans to leverage existing tracking and reporting systems to manage providers and encourage coordination with community-deployed outreach workers from CEO. Long term, the Departments of Health Services, Mental Health, and Public Health are collaborating to identify the feasibility of sustainable funding sources and build pathways for career advancement through promotional items to retain outreach workers. Additionally, the departments are collaborating on strategies to strengthen their partnership with community-based organizations to advise on Community Navigation and outreach strategies.

Language Access for ARP Funded Programs and Services

To increase the County's language capacity to reach residents who speak languages other than English, the Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Immigrant Affairs (DCBA-OIA) is piloting two innovative strategies for increasing access to and centralizing language access services to support ARP-funded services, grant, and contract opportunities. The two strategies include:

- Launching a centralized Language.LACounty.gov online language services hub, centered on prototyping an on-demand document translation request feature; and

- Securing subcontracted language service providers to provide simultaneous interpretation support at an in-person ARP grant or contract opportunity application submission event.

The DCBA-OIA is collaborating with U.S. Digital Response (USDR) on the development of the Language.LACounty.gov hub. The USDR is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization that helps governments, nonprofits, and public entities respond quickly to critical public needs by leveraging a network of pro bono technical experts to address common, systemic challenges facing the public sector. USDR teams are focused on the development of an on-demand document translation request feature and online language access hub. They are conducting user research and market analyses to understand the barriers and challenges confronting speakers of Languages Other Than English (LOTE) who seek to access County services. These include key informant interviews with local community-based organizations who serve LOTE speakers, as well as County departments to better understand how a centralized hub can improve in-language outreach and service delivery. Additionally, they have completed a comparative analysis of language access websites across the nation to inform the development of the County’s online language services hub and are refining a survey form-based prototype for the on-demand document translation request feature. These two projects are scheduled for completion by December 2023.

ARP Project Status and ARP Contracting Updates

As of June 2, 2023, seven of the eight newly funded projects in the ARP Phase Two Spending Plan are approved for project launch. One project is in the design phase. See Table 1 below for a breakdown of each project’s design status.

ARDI continues to track project launch dates and budget encumbrances and expenditures for all funded projects. As of July 31, 2023, nearly all projects have been approved for launch. Funding amounts encumbered and/or expended across these projects continue to vary depending on their level of implementation. As of July 12, 2023, more than 51 percent of funds for all projects were encumbered with more than 15 percent of the funds expended.

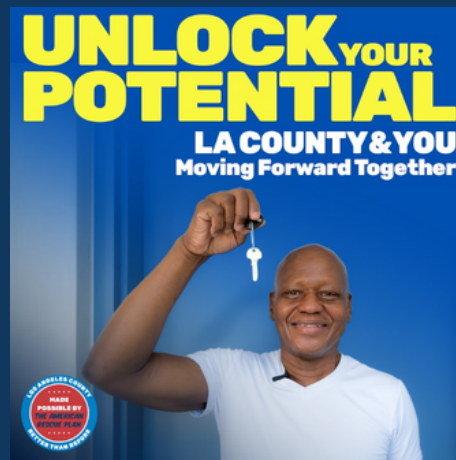
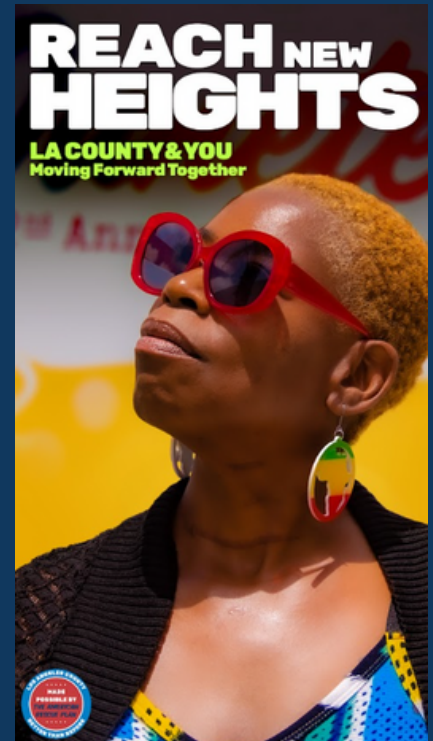
As of August 7, 2023, 12 departments reported having or are in the process of awarding a total of 227 agreements with external partners, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders. Awarded agreements total a reported \$527,936,719.23. A list of ARP-funded agreements is provided in Attachment III.

The Chief Executive Officer will submit the next Board update on these two motions, *Moving Forward on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan* and *The American Rescue Plan Act Expedited Contracting*, by November 15, 2023.

Accomplishments 2022 - 2023

Countywide Engagement Team

Raised public awareness of American Rescue Plan Act-funded programs and services through a strategic combination of digital, social, radio, and out-of-home advertising mediums. This multilingual, four-month-long educational campaign has already had a successful reach with three of the four months generating **more than 9.5 million impressions** across social media platforms, a listenership reach of **more than 1.2 million per week** across four traditional radio stations and one digital radio platform, and a **combined reach of more than 2.5 million** via out-of-home ads in the form of bus shelter posters and bus tail ads.

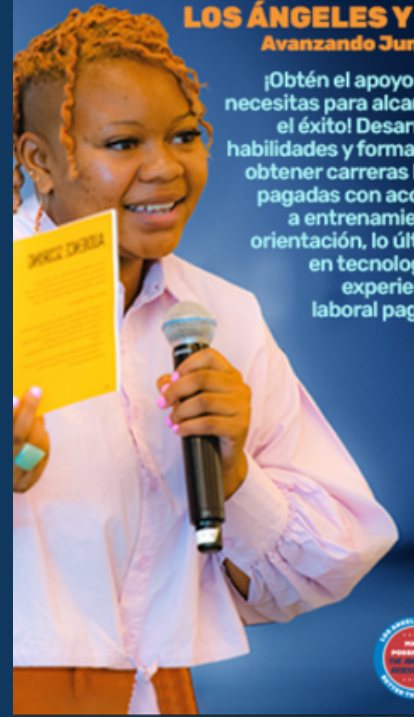

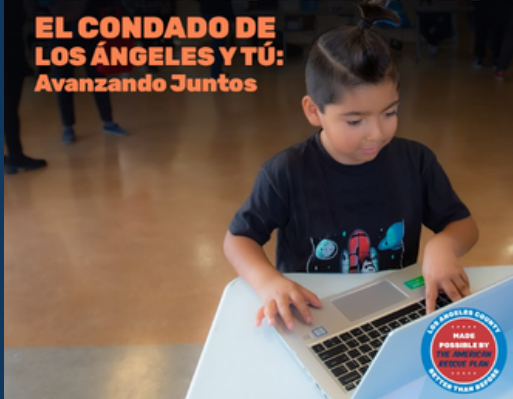

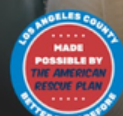

L.A. County's BREATHE Expansion Program will Help 200 L.A. County DCFS Foster Youth

The income program will provide 200 former Los Angeles County DCFS foster youth with \$1,000 per month for two years.

On Wednesday, June 14, L.A. County held a virtual media briefing to announce the BREATHE Guaranteed Income Program's expansion to include 200 former L.A. County DCFS foster youth, who aged out of the system, with \$1,000 monthly for two years.



Young people who have aged out of the foster system will benefit from the BREATHE expansion program.

The briefing included speakers Holly J. Mitchell, L.A. County Supervisor, and District 11 Councilmember Carrie D. Miller, Ph.D., executive director of L.A. County Poverty Alleviation Initiative and Allison Thompson, MSW, Ph.D., executive director, University of Pennsylvania, Center of Guaranteed Income Research. June 20 through July 3 and is the first step in the county's determination to address poverty. BREATHE is a pilot program that the county hopes will lead to a more expansive program in the future that will serve many people in Los Angeles County.

who age out of foster care are at higher risk for experiencing poor well-being outcomes compared to their same-aged peers in the general population."

The Center of Guaranteed Income Research was established in 2020 at the school of Social Policy and Practice at the University of Pennsylvania to develop a common body of knowledge on unconditional cash transfers. It focuses on research, evaluation, pilot design, and policy pathways with the goal of learning about effective and just implementation and outcomes related to guaranteed income.

"Youth in the general population typically rely on their families for concrete resources and financial support well into their 20s and even 30s, but youth who age out of foster care often do so without these concrete resources and financial support," said Thompson. "And as a result, they face enormous challenges."

BREATHE to provide its residents a chance to "breathe" in having financial

Investments of nearly \$78 million in American Rescue Plan Act funding are expanding equitable access to technology and the internet with free programs and new infrastructure

Los Angeles County is accelerating efforts to bridge the digital divide and bring technology and new infrastructure into traditionally disadvantaged communities, particularly those most heavily affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Supported by nearly \$78 million in resources from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), County departments have launched or expanded a series of programs that provide residents with ready access to laptops, WiFi, training and more.

For example:

All 85 Los Angeles County Libraries are providing daily free public use computers and the option to borrow laptop and hotspot kits for internet access for free for up to 6 weeks through the Laptop Lending program. The Library also recently launched a Work Ready program that offers free support for job seekers, including use of a laptop and access to virtual events covering topics ranging from writing a great cover letter to identifying high-growth careers. Free tutoring and online learning activities are also available for families. While people can access the internet through their cellphones, cellular data plans can be expensive. Access to free WiFi lessens the financial burden and is available through the Library's Park & Connect program.

The Department of Parks and Recreation has also launched a WiFi in Parks program, which patrons are using heavily. Data shows that the top 10 locations to access WiFi in the parks are primarily low-income, revealing that park patrons, park access may be their primary source of internet. With the support of ARPA funding, 22 new parks will receive WiFi and be expanded in 14 existing parks. As of June 2023, 9 sites are deployed and 17 are planned by June 2024.
