REPORT BACK ON MOVING FORWARD ON THE EQUITABLE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN AND THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT EXPEDITED CONTRACTING (ITEM NO. 25, AGENDA OF SEPTEMBER 15, 2021, AND ITEM NO. 12, AGENDA OF NOVEMBER 30, 2021)

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bi-monthly reports on the implementation of the equity formula and principles in the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process and to include updates on the public dashboard and website that ensure implementation information is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the Chief Executive Office to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

Attachment I provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated September 6, 2023, including progress made on the implementation of ARP projects and efforts to ensure that equity-centered investments reach the communities most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.



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This report covers:

- The status of Request for Statements of Qualification (RFSQs) for contracted services using ARP funding;
- Efforts to increase access of ARP-funded programs among communities who speak Languages Other Than English (LOTE) and were highly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic;
- ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on launch dates, encumbrances, and expenditures for approved projects, and contracting activities. A list of external partner agreements, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders, is in Attachment II; and

Report on the Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan and Expedited Contracting

On September 15, 2021, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, in collaboration with County Counsel, to provide bi-monthly reports on the implementation of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) contracting process, equity formula and encumbrance data. The Board's directives to Chief Executive Office (CEO) requires updates on a public-facing dashboard and website to ensure implementation and outcomes data is available to the public. A follow-up motion adopted by the Board on November 30, 2021, directed the CEO to submit quarterly reports on the status of contracts executed for programs approved in the ARP Spending Plan, as well as any subsequent new or amended ARP Spending Plans.

This report provides an update on the above-noted directives since the previously submitted Board memo dated September 6, 2023, including progress made on the implementation of ARP projects and efforts to ensure that equity-based investments reach the communities most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The report covers:

- The status of Request for Statements of Qualification (RFSQs) for contracted services using ARP funding;
- Efforts to increase access of ARP-funded programs among communities who speak Languages Other Than English (LOTE) and were highly impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic;
- ARP project status, budget, and contracting updates, including updates on launch dates, encumbrances, and expenditures for approved projects, and contracting activities. A list of external partner agreements, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders, is in Attachment II; and
- An update on the Countywide evaluation plan to measure the impact of program investments in achieving an equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

RFSQ Update

The RFSQ for the ARP Support Services Master Agreement (MA) released on April 29, 2022, remains open and continuous to ensure vendors have the opportunity to qualify as a contractor under the MA. Currently, there are 36 vendors qualified to provide services in six categories. Information about this funding opportunity remains posted on the ARP Recovery website: https://ceo.lacounty.gov/recovery/contract-opportunities.

Language Access for ARP-Funded Programs

The Department of Consumer and Business Affairs' Office of Immigrant Affairs (DCBA-OIA) is launching two innovative strategies to improve the County's ability to serve LOTE speakers by increasing access to and centralizing language access services for ARP-funded programs, grants, and contract opportunities. The two strategies include the future launch of Language.LACounty.gov, a centralized online language services hub, and securing subcontracted language interpretation services to increase access to ARP-funded resources.

DCBA-OIA is collaborating with U.S. Digital Response (USDR) to develop the centralized Language.LACounty.gov online language services hub. Currently, they are in the process of designing a low-fidelity prototype website featuring two main sections. One section will enable cross-departmental County collaboration and resource-sharing to streamline requests for language assistance among departments and improve the consistency of services delivered to clients. Features will include: 1) a centralized directory of multilingual County staff, particularly employees who receive bilingual bonuses; 2) a mechanism to request language service support from other departments for ARP-funded and other programs; and 3) the development of glossaries to standardize translated terms commonly used in public communications. The second section will focus on improving Countywide language access to information of most interest to the public, as recommended by several community organization that serve LOTE speakers. Features will include: 1) links to translated materials on ARP-funded and other County benefits, services, and resources most frequently requested by LOTE speakers; 2) a language access complaint form to track complaints, expeditiously respond, and improve language services; and 3) a general overview of efforts to promote equitable language access Countywide and ways to support the work. The Office of Immigrant Affairs has been working with U.S. Digital Response (USDR) on the development of an online language access hub that would centralize and make more accessible County language access resources and the most frequently accessed, translated public information.

On December 13, 2023, the USDR development team presented the language access website prototype. As part of the presentation, the developers:

- Shared feedback from key stakeholders on critically important issues to address in this website;
- Showcased the recommended concepts designed to address the needs identified by stakeholders; and
- Offered recommendations on how this hub might evolve.

OIA is planning to present the prototype to community stakeholders for additional feedback and recommendations to inform the final website development. The product is scheduled to publicly launch by May of 2024.

DCBA-OIA is also collaborating with DCBA's Grants to CBOs Financial Wellbeing and Wealth Building program to increase access to financial planning services. This ARP-funded program provides grants to community-based organizations and community development financial institutions to support low-income communities with intergenerational wealth-building, financial coaching, and homeownership. To

increase access to these services for LOTE communities, DCBA-OIA is also contracting with community interpreters to pilot on-demand videos and live interpretation services at in-person workshops to provide education on the importance of estate planning. OIA will also provide interpreters who can partner with estate planning contractors to work with LOTE speakers to complete estate planning documents, such as living wills and trusts, advanced directives, and powers of attorney.

Additionally, DCBA-OIA is developing strategies to improve outreach and engagement among indigenous language-speaking communities to increase awareness of and access to ARP-funded programs. These strategies include County workforce trainings focused on improving linguistically and culturally appropriate service delivery to indigenous populations and the development of map-based tools to help direct outreach to the County's most linguistically diverse residents.

ARP Project Status and ARP Contracting Updates

As of October 11, 2023, seven of the eight newly funded projects in the ARP Phase Two Spending Plan are approved for project launch. One project is in the design phase. See Table 1 below for a breakdown of each project's design status.

ARDI continues to track project launch dates and budget encumbrances and expenditures for all funded projects. As of October 26, 2023, nearly all projects have been approved for launch. Funding amounts encumbered and/or expended across these projects continue to vary depending on their level of implementation. As of October 26, 2023, nearly 52 percent of funds for all projects were encumbered with more than 22 percent of the funds expended.

As of October 31, 2023, 12 departments reported having or are in the process of awarding a total of 237 agreements with external partners, inclusive of service contracts and purchase orders. Awarded agreements total a reported \$592,493,574.23. A list of ARP-funded agreements is provided in Attachment II.

ARP Evaluation

Equitable approaches to evaluation explore ways in which the concepts of equity and inclusion inform decision making, strategies, and programmatic efforts to serve highest need and disadvantaged populations. An equity-centered evaluation specifically examines how disadvantaged communities experience systemic barriers that create differences in access to quality services and result in disparate outcomes in comparison to their less impacted counterparts. In order to measure the impact of program investments in achieving an equitable recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic, ARDI is working with a contractor to design and execute a Countywide ARP evaluation plan. This plan features evaluation templates to collect data from ARP-funded programs in compliance with the U.S. Treasury Guidance and requirements set forth by the ARP and Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds (SLFRF) program. Additionally, the templates will collect key metrics mandated by the Board in the "Recovering Better Than Before: Ensuring Equitable Implementation of the American Rescue Plan" motion passed on July 13, 2021, to assess how the use of ARP funds have benefited communities suffering disproportionate health and economic impacts.

The purpose of the evaluation templates is to enable County to track which communities are being served by ARP-funded programs, how much funding was allocated to these communities, and if funding aligned with its intended goals, objectives, and allocations across its programs. The evaluation templates also establish a streamlined and replicable process to systematically collect, evaluate, synthesize, and report ARP program evaluation data to: 1) strengthen the administration of current ARP-funded programs; and 2) establish new precedents for future federal awards and equity-centered program design and evaluation. To ensure the successful implementation of the evaluation templates as part of a comprehensive equity-centered evaluation framework and process, ARDI and its consultant will gather stakeholder feedback on reporting requirements to inform user-friendly design, promote accountability among ARP-funded programs and departments, and facilitate equitable data-driven outcomes. Additionally, training, individual consultation sessions, and ongoing technical assistance will be provided to advise on recommended practices to identify, collect, and report on data and metrics for the completion of program-level evaluations, which will inform the overall Countywide findings and evaluation report.
