REPORT BACK ON POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS TO CURTAIL STREET RACING IN LOS ANGELES COUNTY (ITEM NO. 11, AGENDA OF NOVEMBER 6, 2024)

On November 6, 2024, the Board of Supervisors (Board) adopted a motion directing the Chief Executive Officer, the directors of the Departments of Public Works (DPW) Youth Development (DYD), Sheriff (LASD), and County Counsel and other relevant departments to give a verbal presentation during the December 3, 2024, Board meeting and report back quarterly thereafter on a strategic plan to curtail street racing, and the status of law enforcement's collaboration to address illegal street racing and takeovers. This report addresses these directives.

Street Takeover Reduction Action Plan

A Street Takeover Reduction workgroup made up of representatives from the Chief Executive Office (CEO), DPW, DYD, LASD, County Counsel, Department of Public Health, District Attorney, Department of Regional Planning, Public Defender, Los Angeles Police Department, California Highway Patrol, Civilian Oversight Commission, Los Angeles City Attorney, Street Racing Kills, Streets Are For Everyone, Brotherhood of Street Racers, Project Street Legal, and a few resident advocates met bi-monthly over the last three months to develop an Action Plan (Plan) for reducing illegal street takeovers across Los Angeles County (LA County) and begin its implementation (Attachment I).

The workgroup considered efforts underway in other jurisdictions such as the states of Kansas, Florida, Georgia, Connecticut, Illinois, the city of San Diego, and



numerous cities within LA County, when developing the plan's objectives, as well as existing literature on effective strategies. It was also designed to align with other similar plans, like DPW's *Vison Zero LA County: A Plan for Safer Roadways, 2020-2025*, released in November 2019.

The Plan includes objectives and strategies in five Goal Areas:

- Increase Youth Outreach, Education, and Prevention Planning
- Install Infrastructure and Technological Solutions
- Expand Enforcement Options
- Engage in Community and Communication Strategies
- Identify Safe and Legal Alternatives

Anticipated timelines, responsible parties, data to be collected, and potential resource needs are also identified, where applicable. The Plan includes a section of additional ideas to research as the workgroup continues to explore promising practices.

Available data from LASD on illegal street takeovers occurring between October and December 2024 is also attached (Attachment II). As shown below, the number of illegal street takeovers occurring in Supervisorial Districts 1 and 4 each went down from the previous quarter by 9, whereas the number occurring in Supervisorial District 2 increased by 106. These data demonstrate that there is a significant amount of work to be done to address this issue.

Next Steps

The workgroup has begun implementing the Plan. Key short-term efforts include:

- Expanding the Regional Taskforce partnership across additional LA County law enforcement agencies and updating the Memorandum of Understanding that exists among the current eight partners;
- Drafting proposed LA County Ordinance Code changes for the Board's consideration;
- Developing internal policies for issuing and processing administrative fee citations;
- Installing centerline extensions and deterrents in several identified high-impact intersections, which will now be standard practice for any new construction projects along problematic corridors;
- Implementing community and school-based prevention programs targeting youth who either have or have not participated in and/or attended street takeover and racing events before; and
- Expanding our partnership with additional community organizations who can help with launching a communications strategy for both educating the public and asking for their help in reducing these events.

The workgroup will continue to track data on the strategies implemented and their effect on the overall street takeover data, and modify and adapt the Plan's objectives, as needed. New approaches will be incorporated into the Plan, in addition to the workgroup's continued efforts to explore and study efforts occurring in other jurisdictions and other emerging promising practices.

INTRODUCTION:	Challenge: Illegal street takeovers and racing involve vehicles driven at high speeds and/or performing stunts in reckless ways. These events attract crowds that can become unruly and engage in behavior that results in property damage, looting of local businesses, bodily injury, and/or loss of life. Goal: Significantly reduce the number of illegal street takeovers and/or racing events occurring within our LA County unincorporated communities. Solution: Implement a multi-faceted, collaborative approach that includes prevention, infrastructure, enforcement, legal alternative, and communication strategies.			
GOAL AREA 1:	Increase Youth Outreach, Education, and Prevention Programming			
	Implement programs that help to prevent and/or reduce the occurrence of illegal street takeovers by educating youth and parents about the dangers of reckless driving, instilling a sense of empathy and awareness about the potential consequences, and providing fun, alternative programming that encourages a sense of community.
