



Enhancing Transparency and Community Partnership

This is Los Angeles County's (County) first-ever Unincorporated Communities Annual Report—a significant milestone for both the County and unincorporated area residents. The County is providing this comprehensive overview to help residents understand the scope of public services and impact of investments in their neighborhoods.

What is an Unincorporated Area?

County unincorporated areas are communities that are not part of any of the County's 88 incorporated cities. Instead, governance and representation are provided by the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors—fulfilling the role that a Mayor and City Council would play in an incorporated city.

There are more than 120 unincorporated areas with a total population of approximately one million residents. One out of every 10 County residents lives in an unincorporated community. These communities also cover a significant portion of the County's geography—2,600 square miles, or about two-thirds of the County's total land area.

The Board of Supervisors establishes policies and regulations that benefit all unincorporated area residents, while County departments provide the municipal services and infrastructure—such as law enforcement, firefighting, trash collection, road maintenance, and parks—that residents depend on every day.

Report Focus

At the direction of the Board of Supervisors, the annual report provides a review of services and investments made in the previous fiscal year for each of the 28 unincorporated communities with a population of over 10,000.

The County has invested billions of dollars in these communities, including significant resources for municipal services, quality-of-life programs, and construction and maintenance of public facilities and infrastructure. The annual report captures information from numerous County departments to enhance transparency and accountability, enabling the public to track the County's progress, celebrate successes, and identify opportunities for continued improvement.



Municipal Services Expenditures and Local Revenues Lake Los Angeles (July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024)

The following figures estimate key County municipal expenditures and locally-collected revenues for Fiscal Year 2023-24, developed in coordination with related County departments and related agencies. Please note that the County does not budget by specific community, and these estimates exclude multi-year capital projects and regional services that benefit all residents, representing only a portion of total County investment.

How the County Funds Your Services

Most of LA County's budget is funded from state and federal sources and is tied to specific programs and services, some of which are mandated by law and not available to be used for other purposes. The County also raises money locally from property, sales, and other taxes, and by providing services that reimburse the County's costs. The following are estimated shares of some locally-generated taxes. Please note that these estimates do not include the complete listing of revenues the County generates which may include federal/state funding sources, permit fees, fines, penalties, rents, royalties, or concessions.

Public Works

Department of Public Works (DPW) operations are defined within six key areas: Transportation, Water Resources, Municipal Services, Environmental Services, Construction Management, Public Contracting and Asset Management. DPW also maintains a 24/7 Dispatch Center and on-call Emergency Operations Center and provides project management services for the design and construction of the County Capital Projects Program.

Services Provided:

DPW offers a vast array of programs, services, and events for County residents. Examples of key municipal services offered in unincorporated areas include:

- ✓ Planning, design, construction, operation, and maintenance of roads, traffic signals, street signs, sidewalks, and bridges including pavement resurfacing, pothole repair, tree trimming, debris removal, and maintenance and inspection of sewers.
- ✓ "The Works" free smartphone app for reporting/tracking the status of issues like potholes, graffiti, overgrown trees, blocked storm drains, illegal dumping, property-related concerns/violations, and maintenance of trails and facilities in County parks.
- ✓ Addressing hazards and issues on the public right-of-way including graffiti abatement, illegal dumping, and hazardous spills.
- ✓ Public transit services available through an agreement with the Antelope Valley Transit Authority (AVTA) including local fixed-routes (Route 5, 7, 9, and 97 Special) and dial-a-ride services.
- ✓ Maintaining bus stop amenities such as benches, shelters, and trash receptacles.
- ✓ Building & Safety services - Permits, plan checks, and inspections.
- ✓ Landscape Maintenance District - One zone in Lake LA with services provided by both DPW and Parks & Rec including irrigation, pruning/trimming of vegetation, weed control, litter/debris control, v-ditch/bench drain clean up, backflow testing, and tree/brush maintenance.
- ✓ Environmental programs such as recycling, smart gardening, safe disposal of household hazardous waste and sharps, and community education.
- ✓ Leading the Antelope Valley Illegal Dumping Task Force, a multi-agency task force that meets monthly to identify measures to reduce and combat illegal dumping and operating the (888)-8-DUMPING Hotline for residents to report illegal dumping.
- ✓ Project management for the design and construction of County capital projects.

On behalf of the District, DPW constructs, operates, and maintains a regional system of flood control and water conservation facilities that provide flood protection, increase local water supply, and provide recreation and aesthetic enhancement.

- ✓ Manages regional flood risk, which includes planning; operation; maintenance; emergency storm response; storm drain rehabilitation; debris protection; floodplain management; public service; and construction of storm protection facilities, such as dams, channels, debris basins, storm drains, and pumps

Department of Parks and Recreation (DPR) is the municipal park and recreation department for Lake Los Angeles. In addition to operating local parks and providing core programming in unincorporated areas, DPR serves as the regional park system and infrastructure for all of LA County and its visitors. DPR manages 182 parks with over 475 sports amenities, including regional parks, neighborhood parks, community parks, wildlife sanctuaries, botanical gardens, nature centers, public swimming pools, the Hollywood Bowl and John Anson Ford Amphitheatre, more than 200 miles of multi-use trails for hiking, biking, and horseback riding, and the largest municipal golf system in the nation.

Department of Consumer and Business Affairs serves communities through education, advocacy, and complaint resolution. DCBA also operates and oversees several specialized programs and offices including the LA County Office of Immigrant Affairs and Office of Cannabis Management.

The LA County Department of Animal Care and Control provides animal control and rescue services 24 hours a day, 7 days a week to all unincorporated areas in the County and 45 contract cities with a combined total population of over three million residents. LA County Development Authority (LACDA) administers the County's housing and community development programs. LACDA's core pillars include affordable housing, and community and economic development. The agency's wide-ranging programs benefit residents and business owners in the unincorporated Los Angeles County areas and in various cities that participate in different programs.

Services Provided:

- ✓ Operates low-income housing programs including more than 3,000 public and affordable rental units; approximately 28,000 Housing Choice Vouchers (Section 8) for rent subsidies; and financing and technical assistance to nonprofit and for-profit developers of affordable housing.
- ✓ Administers the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) fund for projects and programs for a broad array of community needs. Projects in Lake Los Angeles in FY 2023-24 include: Handyworker Program providing grants for minor home repairs to eligible low-and moderate-income households; Antelope Valley Partners For Health home visitation, prevention, and education sessions to assist with teaching parenting and life skills; Home modification program for repairs and rehabilitation including mobile homes; Park-based tiny tots and afterschool educational and recreational programs; Senior grant program for home modifications that increase seniors' mobility, habitability, safety, and independence; Taper Foundation Shelter Resource Bank.
- ✓ Offers assistance to first-time homebuyers and to low-income homeowners to rehabilitate their properties.

Department of Public Health (DPH) protects health, prevents disease, and promotes the health and well-being for all persons in LA County. On the municipal level, the Environmental Health Division enhances County residents' quality of life by protecting public health and safeguarding environmental quality, educating the public about environmental health issues, and implementing and enforcing local, state and federal environmental laws. Environmental Health investigates complaints, conducts inspections, issues various permits and licenses, and provides consultations to a wide variety of facilities and businesses.

Services Provided:

- ✓ Operates the Environmental Health Customer Call Center at (888) 700-9995 where individuals can obtain information, request a service, report a violation, or make a complaint.
- ✓ Monitors food safety at various locations such as restaurants, bakeries, bars, markets/groceries, farmers markets, food trucks and street food vending, food commissaries and commercial kitchens, and school cafeterias.
- ✓ Health investigations and inspections for rental housing and other living institutions like apartments, hotels/motels, boarding homes, and dormitories.
- ✓ Health investigations and inspections for various types of businesses including public swimming pools, body art, commercial cannabis, camps, laundromats, and massage establishments.
