# **Finding Words**

You can use the Find command to find a complete word or part of a word in the current PDF document. Acrobat Reader looks for the word by reading every word on every page in the file, including text in form fields.

# To find a word using the Find command:

- 1. Click the Find button (**Binoculars**), or choose Edit > Find.
- 2. Enter the text to find in the text box.
- 3. Select search options if necessary: Match Whole Word Only finds only occurrences of the complete word you enter in the box. For example, if you search for the word *stick*, the words *tick* and *sticky* will not be highlighted.

Match Case finds only words that contain exactly the same capitalization you enter in the box.

Find Backwards starts the search from the current page and goes backwards through the document.

4. Click Find. Acrobat Reader finds the next occurrence of the word.

#### To find the next occurrence of the word, Do one of the following:

Choose Edit > Find Again Reopen the find dialog box, and click Find Again. (The word must already be in the Find text box.)

# Copying and pasting text and graphics to another application

You can select text or a graphic in a PDF document, copy it to the Clipboard, and paste it into another application such as a word processor. You can also paste text into a PDF document note or into a bookmark. Once the selected text or graphic is on the Clipboard, you can switch to another application and paste it into another document.

Note: If a font copied from a PDF document is not available on the system displaying the copied text, the font cannot be preserved. A default font is substituted.



# To select and copy it to the clipboard:

1. Select the text tool T, and do one of the following: To select a line of text, select the first letter of the sentence or phrase and drag to the last letter.

To select multiple columns of text (horizontally), hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option (Mac OS) as you drag across the width of the document.

To select a column of text (vertically), Hold down Ctrl+Alt (Windows) or Option+Command (Mac OS) as you drag the length of the document.

To select all the text on the page, choose Edit > Select All. In single page mode, all the text on the current page is selected. In Continuous or Continuous – facing mode, most of the text in the document is selected. When you release the mouse button, the selected text is highlighted. To deselect the text and start over, click anywhere outside the selected text. The Select All command will not select all the text in the document. A workaround for this (Windows) is to use the Edit > Copy command. Choose Edit > Copy to copy the selected text to the clipboard.

2. To view the text, choose Window > Show Clipboard

In Windows 95, the Clipboard Viewer is not installed by default and you cannot use the Show Clipboard command until it is installed. To install the Clipboard Viewer, Choose Start > Settings > Control Panel > Add/Remove Programs, and then click the Windows Setup tab. Double-click Accessories, check Clipboard Viewer, and click OK.

- 3 COUNTY TO INVEST IN WATER QUALITY EDUCATION. I THEREFORE MOVE
- 4 THAT THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS DIRECT THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC
- 5 WORKS AND COUNTY COUNSEL TO CONTINUE TO WORK WITH THE L.A.
- 6 UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT, THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY OFFICE OF

- 19 COUNTY AUDITOR-CONTROLLER, THE COUNTY COUNSEL, REGISTRAR-
- 20 RECORDER AND THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE OF THE BOARD TO WORK WITH
- 21 THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO ENSURE A TIMELY DELIVERY OF

- 5 OUR REGION IS A PRESSING ISSUE FOR US. THE FEDERAL
- 6 GOVERNMENT'S BREATHING DOWN OUR NECK. THE STATE GOVERNMENT'S

- 19 EACH DEPARTMENT. BUT THE COST TO THE INCORPORATED COUNTY, THE
- 20 DEPARTMENTS CUMULATIVELY, IS AROUND \$4 MILLION A YEAR.

- 22 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO AROUND \$4 MILLION. IS THAT FOR THE PARKS
- 23 AND RECREATION?



- 1 MARK PESTRELLA: NO. THE PARKS AND RECREATION WILL BE A SUBSET
- 2 OF THAT \$4 MILLION.

3

4 SUP. ANTONOVICH: AND WHAT WOULD THAT \$4 MILLION PERTAIN TO?

5

- 6 MARK PESTRELLA: IT WOULD PERTAIN TO THE DEPARTMENTS'
- 7 COMPLIANCE WITH THE CLEAN WATER ACT.

8

- 9 SUP. ANTONOVICH: I KNOW. WHICH DEPARTMENTS ARE WE TALKING
- 10 ABOUT?

11

12 MARK PESTRELLA: ALL COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

13

14 SUP. ANTONOVICH: WHICH ONE SPECIFICALLY DEALING WITH THIS?

15

- 16 MARK PESTRELLA: I'LL GIVE YOU EXAMPLES OF THE DEPARTMENTS.
- 17 PARKS AND REC, I.S.D., SHERIFF, HEALTH, FIRE, LIBRARIES.

18

- 19 SUP. ANTONOVICH: AND THESE ARE DOLLARS THAT WOULD BE COMING
- 20 OUT OF THEIR GENERAL FUND?

21

- 22 MARK PESTRELLA: YES. THERE ARE CURRENTLY DOLLARS COMING FROM
- 23 GENERAL FUND TO PAY FOR THAT COMPLIANCE THAT WOULD BE
- 24 REDIRECTED TO THIS PROGRAM.



- 1 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY, CHAIRMAN: AND WE'RE ATTEMPTING TO DO A MAIL
- 2 BALLOT IN AN OFF YEAR WHEN PEOPLE ARE ASLEEP INSTEAD OF
- 3 PUTTING IT ON THE GENERAL ELECTION WHEN PEOPLE ARE AWARE OF
- 4 BALLOT INITIATIVES, CORRECT?

5

6 MARK PESTRELLA: WE ARE RECOMMENDING A MAIL-OUT BALLOT.

7

- 8 SUP. ANTONOVICH: RIGHT. DOING IT IN AN OFF-YEAR ELECTION WHEN
- 9 THERE ARE LESS PEOPLE VOTING AND HAVING A MAILMAN INSTEAD OF
- 10 HAVING THE OPPORTUNITY TO GOING TO THE POLLING BOOTH AND
- 11 VOTING.

12

13 MARK PESTRELLA: THEY WOULD VOTE FROM HOME.

14

15 SUP. ANTONOVICH: MORE OF A SNEAK ATTACK. CORRECT?

16

- 17 MARK PESTRELLA: I WOULDN'T CALL IT A SNEAK ATTACK. WE WOULD BE
- 18 NOTIFYING THEM UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF 218 THROUGH MAIL THAT
- 19 SOMETHING'S COMING AND THEY WOULD HAVE THE --

- 21 SUP. ANTONOVICH: MORE PEOPLE ARE READING THE SAMPLE BALLOT
- 22 THIS NOVEMBER WHEN WE TALK ABOUT PRESIDENTS, SENATORS,
- 23 CONGRESSIONAL, ASSEMBLY, THAN THEY WILL IN MARCH WHEN THE
- 24 PRESIDENT OR THE GOVERNOR ARE NOT ON THE BALLOT OR ANY U.S.



- 1 SENATE OR ANY STATE LEGISLATORS ON THE BALLOT, AND YET THIS IS
- 2 A MULTIBILLION DOLLAR TAX THAT DOESN'T HAVE A SUNSET IN IT.

3

- 4 GAIL FARBER: SUPERVISOR ANTONOVICH, I CAN'T PREDICT VOTER
- 5 TURNOUT IN THE NEXT ELECTION. WE CAN SAY WITH THE
- 6 RECOMMENDATION TO PROCEED WITH A MAIL OUT, IT'S A DIRECT
- 7 EDUCATION AND OUTREACH EFFORT TO ALL PARCEL OWNERS, OVER 2
- 8 MILLION, 2.1-PLUS MILLION PARCEL OWNERS, OF WHICH MAIL-OUT
- 9 BALLOT TO THEM INFORMING THEM ABOUT THE PARCEL FEE AND THEN TO
- 10 EXERCISE THEIR RIGHT TO RESPOND BY PARCEL BY HOUSEHOLD BACK TO
- 11 THE DISTRICT ON THEIR PREFERENCE THERE. SO WE CAN SAY THAT WE

- 17 BE ABLE TO INFORM MORE PEOPLE WITH THAT INFORMATION THAN WOULD
- 18 BE INCLUDED IN A SAMPLE BALLOT WITH PRO AND CON ARGUMENTS,
- 19 RIGHT?

20

- 21 GAIL FARBER: AND AGAIN, SUPERVISOR, THAT DECISION WILL COME
- 22 BACK TO THE BOARD IF YOU WOULD RATHER DO IT IN A GENERAL
- 23 ELECTION VERSUS A MAIL OUT.



- 1 SUP. ANTONOVICH: WELL, WE COULD DO IT RIGHT NOW IN THE GENERAL
- 2 ELECTION. PUT IT ON THE NOVEMBER ELECTION IF YOU WANTED TO.
- 3 BECAUSE YOU HAVE UNTIL AUGUST TO MAKE THAT DECISION.

4

5 GAIL FARBER: CORRECT. THAT'S THE BOARD'S DECISION.

6

- 7 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO YOU'D RECOMMEND THAT? OR YOU'D RATHER DO
- 8 IT WHEN LESS PEOPLE ARE VOTING IN MARCH?

9

10 GAIL FARBER: WE'LL, WE'D LIKE TO HAVE A SUCCESSFUL INITIATIVE.

11

- 12 SUP. ANTONOVICH: NOT THE MOST INFORMED PEOPLE BUT WHERE MAYBE
- 13 YOU CAN SNEAK SOMETHING THROUGH. BUT THIS IS A TAX THAT HAS A
- 14 LIFE OF ITS OWN. IT DOESN'T HAVE A SUNSET. WE'VE HEARD ABOUT
- 15 THE SCHOOL DISTRICT. THAT WAS JUST ONE SCHOOL DISTRICT. AND WE

- 1 MARK PESTRELLA: PERCENTAGE OF THE PROBLEM, WE INTENDED TO
- 2 ADDRESS THE REGULATIONS AS SET FOR WATER BODIES THROUGH THE
- 3 PROGRAM. SO WE'RE INTENDING TO ADDRESS ALL THE --

4

- 5 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO THIS WOULD BE 100 PERCENT COMPLIANCE WITH
- 6 THIS?

7

8 MARK PESTRELLA: ULTIMATELY THE GOAL IS TO HAVE 100 PERCENT.

9

- 10 SUP. ANTONOVICH: THE ULTIMATE GOAL. WHAT ARE WE LOOKING AT IN
- 11 THE NEXT FIVE YEARS IF THIS WAS SUCCESSFULLY PASSED? WOULD WE
- 12 BE ACHIEVING 100 PERCENT OF OUR GOAL? OR 1 PERCENT OF OUR
- 13 GOAL?

14

- 15 MARK PESTRELLA: I THINK THE GOAL FROM THE BEGINNING WOULD BE
- 16 TO SLOW THE DEGRADATION IF NOT STOP THE DEGRADATION OF OUR
- 17 WATER QUALITY IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES WITH AN ULTIMATE
- 18 GOAL OF 100 PERCENT COMPLIANCE WITH THE BENEFICIAL USE --

- 1 MARK PESTRELLA: WELL, IF YOU TAKE A LOOK AT WHAT WE'VE DONE
- 2 ALONG THE BEACHES IN L.A. COUNTY, IT'S BEEN FAIRLY SUCCESSFUL
- 3 OVER ABOUT A 10-YEAR PERIOD IN REDUCING THE NUMBER OF CLOSED
- 4 BEACHES, SUPERVISOR. AND THAT'S DIRECTLY PROPORTIONAL TO THE
- 5 IMPROVEMENTS THAT THE L.A. COUNTY FLOOD CONTROL DISTRICT
