HE 20 21 RECEIVED HIS MASTER'S DEGREE IN TRANSFORMATIONAL LEADERSHIP 22 FROM THE BETHEL SEMINARY AND HAS CONTRIBUTED TO SEVERAL 23 PUBLICATIONS IN REGARDS TO MINISTRY, LEADERSHIP AND THEOLOGY. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN, AT THIS 15 16 TIME I'M GOING TO ASK BRUCE LASENBEE, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT, KENT WOODS THE SENIOR MANAGING DIRECTOR 17 18 AND PATRICK MONROE THE PRESIDENT OF ROSE HILLS MEMORIAL PARK 19 AND MORTUARY AND OTHERS WHO ARE HERE TO JOIN US HERE AS WE CELEBRATE THE 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF ROSE HILLS. ROSE HILLS WAS 20 FOUNDED IN 1914 AND WAS ORIGINALLY CALLED THE WHITTIER HEIGHTS 21 22 MEMORIAL PARK. IT BEGAN AS AN 18-ACRE CEMETERY SERVING THE 23 GROWING CITY OF WHITTIER AND AS THE POPULATION OF THE AREA GREW, THE PARK GREW WITH IT. IN 1928, MANAGEMENT LAUNCHED AN 24 EXPANSION PROGRAM THAT CONTINUED INTO THE 1950S. AT ITS 25



LARGEST, THE PARK ONCE SPANNED NEARLY 2,500 ACRES. ROSE HILLS 1 HAS EXPANDED THE BREADTH, THE SERVICES AVAILABLE TO SOUTHERN 2 3 CALIFORNIA FAMILIES. IN 1917, A SMALL INDOOR MAUSOLEUM, THE SECOND SUCH PUBLIC STRUCTURE OF ITS KIND IN CALIFORNIA WAS 4 5 OPENED. IN 1930, EL, PORTA DE LA PAZ, DOORWAY TO THE PEACE WAS OPEN TO THE PUBLIC AND THIS LARGE INDOOR MAUSOLEUM IS 6 7 REMINISCENT OF THE EARLY CALIFORNIA MISSIONS WITH MARBLE 8 CORRIDORS AND EXQUISITE STAINED GLASS WINDOWS. FOUR GARDEN 9 MAUSOLEUMS WERE LATER BUILT. FOUR BEAUTIFUL CHAPELS INCLUDING THE MOST RECENT SKY ROSE CHAPEL WERE ALSO BUILT. IN 1942, ROSE 10 11 HILLS COMPLETED ITS CREMATORIUM AND IN 1956 THEY OPENED THEIR FLOWER SHOP AND, AS WELL AS MAKING ROSE HILLS ONE OF THE FIRST 12 CEMETERIES IN THE COUNTRY TO OFFER ALL THE SERVICES AND 13 FACILITIES TO MEMORIALIZE AND REMEMBER YOUR LOVED ONES AT ONE 14 CONVENIENT LOCATION. TODAY THEY COVER MORE THAN 1,400 ACRES, 15 16 MAKING IT THE LARGEST CEMETERY IN NORTH AMERICA. ROSE HILLS IS PROUD TO BE ABLE TO OFFER COMPLETE MEMORIAL CARE FROM A SINGLE 17 18 LOCATION, INCLUDING CEMETERY, FUNERAL AND CREMATION OFFERINGS. 19 ON THIS HIGH LEVEL OF COMPREHENSIVE FUNERAL SERVICES THAT ROSE HILLS OFFERS REFLECTS THE DEDICATED EFFORT OF ITS MORE THAN 20 21 500 TEAM MEMBERS WHO ARE AS DIVERSE AS THE COMMUNITY THEY 22 SERVE TO REPRESENT MANY TRADITIONS AND CULTURES. THEY ARE 23 COMMITTED TO BEING KNOWN AS THE GENUINE COMMUNITY PARTNERS, EXAMPLES OF THIS COMMITMENT ARE THE DIA DE LOS MUERTOS EVENT 24 ATTRACTING OVER 10,000 VISITORS AND A PLACE OF INCLUSION WHICH 25



IS AN EDUCATIONAL PROJECT FOCUSING ON REMEMBERING THE CHINESE 1 EXCLUSION ACT. EACH YEAR, AND I PARTICIPATED IN THIS MANY 2 3 TIMES, ROSE HILLS ALSO PRESENTS THE VETERANS RESOURCE FAIR AND HOMELESS VETERANS MEMORIAL SERVICE SUPPORTING AS WELL AS 4 5 HONORING THOSE WHO HAVE SERVED. THEY'RE A GREAT STEWARD OF THEIR LAND AND RESOURCES, 3/4 OF THEIR MEMORIAL PARK ARE 6 7 IRRIGATED WITH RECYCLED WATER, EXPANSION OF THAT SYSTEM TO 8 INCLUDE THE WHOLE FACILITY WILL BE COMPLETED IN 2015. SO WE DO 9 WANT TO THANK THEM FOR 100 YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE RESIDENTS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY AND THEIR FAMILIES. OUR 2 3 COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT PLAYS A VERY VITAL ROLE IN COORDINATING THESE PREVENTION EFFORTS IN COMMUNITIES 4 5 THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY BY STRIVING FOR COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS 6 AND NEIGHBORHOOD SAFETY, CRIME REDUCTION AND AWARENESS. AND WE ARE THE SHIPPING COMPANIES FROM TAIWAN, ACTUALLY TOTAL LIKE AT 17 18 LEAST MORE THAN A QUARTER OF THE VOLUMES IN PORT OF LOS 19 ANGELES. SO THAT INDICATES HOW CLOSE WE ARE. AND ALSO LOS ANGELES IS THE BIGGEST TAIWANESE AND CHINESE COMMUNITY OUTSIDE 20 TAIWAN IN MAINLAND CHINA. IT ALL SHOWS THAT WE HAVE A VERY 21 22 STRONG BOND. AND PERSONALLY I HAVE VERY STRONG ATTACHMENT TO 23 LOS ANGELES. THE KIND OF FRIENDSHIP AND THE WARMTH EXTENDED TO ME AND MY COLLEAGUES WILL CERTAINLY HELP ME WITH MY BIGGEST 24 25 CHALLENGE IN OTTAWA, CANADA, WHICH IS THE SECOND COLDEST

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CAPITAL IN THE WORLD. AND I CERTAINLY WILL MISS THE WARM

I WANTED TODAY TO ADDRESS S-1 THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT 17 18 ITEM WHICH I KNOW YOU'LL BE CALLING UP LATER BUT THERE'S A 19 NUMBER OF ITEMS EMBEDDED IN THE AGENDA WHICH I WILL TRY TO ADDRESS. THE ITEM 8 AND NO. 9 BOTH HAVE TO DO WITH THE OFFICE 20 OF INSPECTOR GENERAL WHICH FOR THOSE WHO HAVE BEEN FOLLOWING 21 22 IS MAX HUNTSMAN. HE'S BEEN PUT INTO OFFICE. AND NOW WE ARE 23 STAFFING UP WITH SOMETHING LIKE 37 DIFFERENT POSITIONS WHO ARE GOING TO HELP WITH THIS GROUP. WE'RE GOING TO HAVE SOME 24 OVERSIGHT. SO THE QUESTION OF CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT PUTS THAT IN 25



PLACE IS A LITTLE PUZZLING TO RESIDENTS. OF COURSE WHAT WE 1 REALLY WANT IS CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT NOT MAX HUNTSMAN WHO IS A 2 3 FORMER D.A. AND A NUMBER OF COUNTY EMPLOYEES, NINE OF WHICH SPECIFICALLY WILL BE HOUSED IN THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE. NOW THE 4 5 EXECUTIVE OFFICE WHEN IT COMES TO OVERSIGHT OVER COUNTY BUSINESS ARE NICE PEOPLE, BY THE WAY, BUT THEY DO A TERRIBLE 6 7 JOB. ONE ISSUE THAT THEY LOOK OVER IS LOBBYISTS' BUSINESS AND 8 CARRYING ON. AND QUITE FRANKLY, I DISCOVERED A \$50,000 GIFT 9 THAT HAD BEEN GIVEN BY A LOBBYIST, A FIRM THAT ENGAGES THE LOBBYISTS AND THAT GIFT WAS FOR TASERS, BELIEVE IT OR NOT, IN 10 11 THE ANTELOPE VALLEY. WHEN I BROUGHT IT TO THE BOARD'S ATTENTION AND TO THE SHERIFF'S ATTENTION, ABSOLUTELY NOTHING 12 WAS DONE. THE SHERIFF IS SUPPOSED TO DISCLOSE THIS, IT NEVER 13 HAPPENED. FINALLY JOHN SCOTT, THE RECENT GUY TOOK CARE OF IT. 14 15 BUT THE EXECUTIVE OFFICE WHO HAD DIRECT OVERSIGHT WAS AWARE OF 16 THAT AND I BRING IT UP AS AN EXAMPLE BECAUSE THEY DID ABSOLUTELY NOTHING ABOUT IT. THEY DID ABSOLUTELY NOTHING ABOUT 17 18 IT. AND SO TO BE EMPOWERING THAT GROUP WITH THE PUBLIC'S 19 OVERSIGHT OF THE CHALLENGING LAW ENFORCEMENT ISSUES IS A TERRIBLE, TERRIBLE IDEA. ITEM NO. 24 IS ALSO PUZZLING BECAUSE 20 21 IN 2011, WE GAVE A.E.C.O.M. THE LARGE CONSTRUCTION FIRM, THEY 22 ARE EXPANDING RAPIDLY, THEY'VE PICKED UP A COMPANY IN SAN FRANCISCO TWO WEEKS AGO. THIS GROUP, WHO'S EMBEDDED IN COUNTY 23 BUSINESS, WERE GIVEN \$13 MILLION IN 2011 TO PROVIDE AN OCTAGON 24 25 IDEA FOR A NEW, BIG JAIL. I REMEMBER SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY



VERY SPECIFICALLY SAID "\$1.1 BILLION, 2.4 BILLION WITH BOND 1 2 COSTS, NOT ON MY WATCH." WELL NOW IT'S TWO YEARS LATER, 3 THEY'LL BE GIVING ANOTHER \$13 MILLION ON ITEM 24, IT'S 10 MILLION TO THEM, THERE IS SOME OTHER MONEY THERE. AND ONCE 4 5 AGAIN SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY AND MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS ARE TREPIDATIOUS ABOUT A BIG, NEW REPLACEMENT JAIL. SO ITEM NO. 2 6 7 TODAY I WANT TO JUST CLOSE ON IS THE DON KNABE AND BILL 8 FUJIOKA ARE VERY PROUD OF THEIR FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY OVER THE 9 YEARS AND THERE'S A MEASURE THERE TO BE CONSIDERED. BUT IT'S FOUR OUT OF FIVE VOTES AMONG THE SUPERVISORS TO CHANGE THE 10 11 FISCAL POLICY IS ONE OF THE THINGS THAT THEY'RE ADDING THAT'S INSIDE ITEM NO. 2. BUT WE CAN APPROVE A 2 PLUS BILLION DOLLARS 12 JAIL WITH ONLY THREE VOTES OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS? I 13 WOULD URGE THE BOARD TO CHANGE ITEM NO. 2 TO MAKE IT SO THAT 14 15 WE CAN NEVER HAVE THIS KIND OF AN ACTION TAKE PLACE WITHOUT 16 THE MAXIMUM SUPPORT. AND WE SHOULD ALSO WAIT FOR THE NEW SUPERVISORS WHO ARE COMING ON. 17

I THINK 8 THAT'S ALWAYS A VERY IMPORTANT POSITION TO HAVE TO REALLY ALLOW THE PUBLIC TO HAVE INPUT, ALSO EMPLOYEES. AND TO REMOVE 9 IT AND TO ADD 20 POSITIONS TO THE O.I.G. AND SO ON, I THINK 10 11 THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICE HAVE ALREADY ADD MULTIPLE POSITIONS IN THE TIMES THAT POSITION WAS CREATED, SO I THINK THEY ARE 12 PRETTY FAT AND I DON'T THINK THEY SHOULD HAVE ADDED ANY OTHER 13 POSITIONS. ON ITEM 15, U.S.C. EQUIPMENT, I'M TOTALLY IN FAVOR 14 OF ADDING EQUIPMENT TO U.S.C. BUT I THINK BEFORE YOU ADD 15 16 EQUIPMENT TO U.S.C., IT WILL BE VERY IMPORTANT TO ASSESS HOW STABLE IS U.S.C. HOSPITAL. IT HAS ALREADY SUNK 2 INCHES AND 17 18 NOBODY IS TALKING. BY ADDING THAT NEW EQUIPMENT, THAT WILL 19 REQUIRE A LOT OF LEAD AND SO ON IN THE WALL TO ADD NUMEROUS WEIGHT TO THAT BUILDING. SO I WOULD LOVE TO KNOW WHAT 20 21 ADJUSTMENT HAS BEEN MADE. ON ITEM 29, MY FAVORITE SUBJECT, 22 M.L.K. HOSPITAL. AND GUESS WHAT? ON THAT SHUTTLE WE HAVE BEEN 23 PAID FOR THE LAST THREE YEARS FOR A PROBABLY A SHUTTLE TO NOWHERE BECAUSE YOU KNOW M.L.K., AS FAR AS I'M CONCERNED, HAVE 24 NOT BEEN BUILT THE LAST THREE YEARS. BUT WE HAVE BEEN PAYING. 25



AND NOT ONLY THAT, BUT WE ARE EXTENDING THE CONTRACT. 1 INITIALLY WE WERE PAYING \$458,000. NOW WE HAVE INCREASED TO 2 3 \$650,476. I THINK IT'S QUITE EXPENSIVE FOR A SHUTTLE TO NOWHERE AND FROM NOWHERE. SO, FIRST OF ALL, WE HAVE ALREADY 4 5 PAID THREE YEARS ON THAT CONTRACT. SO IT WOULD BE NICE THAT IF THE MEDIA WOULD DO SOME INVESTIGATION. THANK YOU. 12

SO WHAT STANDARD DO YOU IMPLEMENT A NEW 20 REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL WHEN CONTRACTS GO UP? I HELD ITEM 54. IT 21 22 DEALS WITH A BOND ISSUANCE BY LOS ANGELES COUNTY CAPITAL ASSET 23 LEASING CORPORATION. AND THE REASON I HELD THAT IS BECAUSE BACK IN JUNE 20TH, 2011, WHEN METRO WAS PUTTING UP 24 DOCUMENTATION FOR THE TIFIA LOAN FOR THE CRENSHAW LINE, THEY 25



USED IT AS AN EXAMPLE. AS RATIONALE FOR THE NONPROFIT 1 ORGANIZATION THAT THEY WANTED TO FORM. RATIONALE. BUT THEY 2 3 HAVE NO RATIONALE FOR THE TWO OTHER TIFIA LOANS THEY GOT FOR THE DOWNTOWN CONNECTOR AND THE EXTENSION OF THE SUBWAY TO THE 4 5 CITY, PURPLE LINE, WHATEVER, BOTH OF THOSE ARE GETTING FUNDED BY TIFIA LOANS BUT NOT THROUGH NONPROFITS. SO WHERE'S THE 6 RATIONALE? AND THEN I HELD ITEM NO. 2 ALSO. IT DEALS WITH 7 8 BUDGET POLICIES AND PRIORITIES. AND I'D JUST LIKE TO ASK HOW 9 MANY PEOPLE OUT THERE HAVE AGENDAS SO THEY COULD FOLLOW ALONG SOMEWHAT? OR READ ABOUT THE AMENDMENTS TO THE LANGUAGE, THE 10 11 DELETION OF LANGUAGE OR THE MODIFICATION OF LANGUAGE OR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF NEW POLICIES OR THE REVISING OF LANGUAGE? 12 THIS IS ALL DEALING WITH COUNTY CODES AND POLICIES. AND THE 13 LANGUAGE IS REALLY IMPORTANT HERE BECAUSE YOU'RE GOING TO DEAL 14 15 WITH THAT ON S-1. EVEN IN SUNDAY'S COMICS THEY GOT IT, 16 YESTERDAY. IF YOU LOOK AT SUNDAY'S COMICS. YOU SEE THE SINGING OYSTER. NOT HERE, THE SINGING OYSTER. 17

ARNOLD SACHS: IT'S IMPORTANT ABOUT THE LANGUAGE. YOU JUST HAD AN ITEM PRESENTATION, CHILD SUPPORT AWARENESS MONTH. AND AGAIN A POLICY. APPLAUSE. STAND UP AND GIVE THEM APPLAUSE. OH, BY THE WAY, 1 THERE'S NO APPLAUSE IN THE BOARD. WHAT'S THE POLICY? WELL, 2 3 WHEN WE SAY IT'S AN APPLAUSE, WE SAY IT'S AN APPLAUSE. 19 RUSS GUINEY: GOOD MORNING. RUSS GUINEY. DIRECTOR OF PARKS AND 20 RECREATION. I ALSO SERVE AS THE DIRECTOR OF THE REGIONAL PARK 21 AND OPEN SPACE DISTRICT AND I HAVE WITH ME JANE BEASLEY, THE 22 ADMINISTRATOR OF THE OPEN SPACE DISTRICT. A MEASURE THAT IS 23 BEFORE YOU TODAY PROPOSES TO ENSURE THE CONTINUED FUNDING OF 24 AN EXPIRING VOTER-APPROVED MEASURE, THE SAFE NEIGHBORHOOD 25 PARKS PROPOSITION OF 1992. THAT MEASURE AND ITS COMPANION



MEASURE FROM 1996 WERE PLACED ON THE BALLOT BY YOUR BOARD FOR 1 CONSIDERATION BY THE VOTERS IN RESPECTIVE YEARS AND WERE 2 3 APPROVED BY 64 PERCENT OF THE VOTERS IN 1992 AND 65 PERCENT OF THE VOTERS IN 1996. HUNDREDS OF PARK RECREATION, BEACH, OPEN 4 5 SPACE, MUSEUMS, SENIOR CENTER, AT-RISK YOUTH FACILITIES HAVE BEEN BOUGHT, BUILT, RENOVATED, AND EXPANDED IN EVERY AREA OF 6 7 THE COUNTY PROVIDING BENEFITS TO EVERY RESIDENT AND EVERY 8 PROPERTY OWNER. FUNDS HAVE BEEN EXPENDED ON PARKS THAT ARE 9 PART OF THE COUNTY GANG VIOLENCE REDUCTION INITIATIVE. STATISTICS SUPPORT THE FACT THAT CRIMES ARE DECREASED IN 10 NEIGHBORHOODS SURROUNDING THE PARKS WHERE THESE PROGRAMS ARE 11 HELD. ALMOST EVERY PROJECT PROPOSED IN THE MEASURES HAVE BEEN 12 COMPLETED. WE'RE ON TRACK TO COMPLETE THE REST. IN ALL YOUR 13 BOARD HAS AWARDED 1,545 GRANTS IN THE COUNTY TOTALING 14 15 \$1,035,030,755.74 THE ASSESSMENT FOR PROP A OF 1992 WILL 16 EXPIRE NEXT JUNE 30THRESULTING IN AN IMMEDIATE LOSS OF 52 MILLION ANNUALLY FOR THE COUNTY, CITIES AND OTHER PARK 17 AGENCIES COUNTYWIDE INCLUDING 8 MILLION PER YEAR IN 18 19 MAINTENANCE AND SERVICING FUNDS AND THE REMAINDER FOR CAPITAL PROJECTS THAT PROVIDE FOR REPAIR, REHABILITATION, ACOUISITION 20 21 AND IMPROVEMENT OF SAFE PARK AND RECREATION FACILITIES, 22 BEACHES, OPEN SPACE, TRAILS, WILDLIFE HABITATS, SENIOR AND AT-23 RISK YOUTH AND ANTI-GANG FACILITIES IN EVERY CORNER OF THE COUNTY. COUNTY PARKS DEPARTMENT ALONE HAS A DEFERRED 24 MAINTENANCE AND UNFUNDED CAPITAL PROJECT NEED OF AROUND 800 25



MILLION. ADD IN THE CITY PARKS DEPARTMENT AND OTHER PARK AND 1 2 RECREATION PROVIDERS AND INFRASTRUCTURE NEEDS ARE IN THE 3 BILLIONS OF DOLLARS. PARK FACILITIES LIKE A HOME, BUSINESS, ROADWAY OR BRIDGE REQUIRE ONGOING MAINTENANCE AND EVENTUALLY 4 5 COMPLETE REPLACEMENT. PLAYGROUNDS NEED TO BE UPDATED WITH THE LATEST AND SAFEST EQUIPMENT. AND YOUR BOARD YEARLY ALLOCATES 23 MONEY TO PROJECTS AT AROUND THE RATE OF \$55 MILLION. AND ABOUT 35 MILLION PER YEAR GOES TO PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST PAYMENTS ON 24 BONDED FUNDS. HOW MUCH OF THAT MONEY IS PRESENTLY COMMITTED 25



AND UNCOMMITTED? ALREADY COMMITTED TO CAPITAL PROJECTS, \$20 1 MILLION. NOT YET COMMITTED, 134 MILLION. HOW QUICKLY WILL 2 3 THESE FUND BE COMMITTED? AT THE PRESENT RATE OF COMMITMENT BY YOUR BOARD, WE EXPECT BY TWO TO THREE YEARS THE 134 MILLION 4 5 WILL ALL BE COMMITTED. IF A NEW MEASURE IS NOT APPROVED THIS YEAR, THEN IN TWO YEARS, INCOME WILL DROP TO ABOUT 33 MILLION 6 7 PER YEAR AND ANNUAL FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR PROJECTS WILL 8 DECREASE TO BELOW 20 PER YEAR. I'M NOT SURE, JANE, DO YOU HAVE AN IDEA? 13 14 JANE BEASLEY: IT TOOK ROUGHLY TWO YEARS TO PUT IT TOGETHER. 15 16 THEY MET WITH ALL 88 CITIES AND OTHER PARK AGENCIES. 17 18 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO THERE WAS AN EXTENSIVE OUTREACH IN '92, 19 WHICH WAS NOT DONE IN THE PROPOSAL THAT WAS BASICALLY DEVELOPED IN THE HEAT OF THE NIGHT. WHAT STUDIES HAD BEEN DONE 20 21 ON THE COUNTY'S CURRENT PARK NEEDS? 22 23 JANE BEASLEY: THERE HAVE BEEN NO RECENT STUDIES. THERE'S UNMET NEED ACROSS ALL THE CITIES AS WELL AS COUNTY D.P.R. AND THEY 24 ALL HAVE LISTS OF WHAT IS THE UNMET NEEDS. THOSE ARE I THINK 25



COUNTY D.P.R. AS RUSS SAID EARLIER 800 MILLION. AND THE CITIES
 HAVE LIKELY THE SAME TYPE OF DOLLARS IN NEED OF PARKS.

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SUP. ANTONOVICH: THE 1992 MEASURE WAS THE FIRST OF ITS KIND 4 5 WHILE A GREAT DEAL OF RESEARCH AND COLLABORATION HAD GONE INTO 6 THE WRITING OF THAT PROPOSITION. AND IN JUST A FEW YEARS, IT 7 WAS REALIZED THAT IT WAS NOT SUFFICIENT IN FUNDING. SO IN '96, 8 THE VOTERS APPROVED A SECOND ASSESSMENT, WHICH WAS TO 9 SUPPLEMENT THE FUNDING OF THE ORIGINAL PROPOSITION, WHICH DOES NOT EXPIRE UNTIL 2018. WITH \$154 MILLION IN UNALLOCATED FUNDS 10 11 IN THE EXISTING PROPOSITION A BANK ACCOUNT, THE NEW TAX IS BEING RUSHED TO THE VOTERS. WE HAVE ANOTHER ELECTION IN 2016. 12 THERE'S PLENTY OF TIME TO CONDUCT OUTREACH AND DO IT THE RIGHT 13 WAY, AS WE DID IN '92. AND A FULL TWO YEARS AHEAD OF THE 2018 14 DEADLINE WHEN THE EXISTING TAX EXPIRES. WE HAVE TWO TO FOUR 15 16 YEARS RESEARCH THAT THE COUNTY NEEDS TO PUT TOGETHER SO THAT WE WOULD HAVE ONE COMPREHENSIVE MEASURE, HAVE ONE TAX ON THE 17 18 BALLOT, ONE PARK TAX INSTEAD OF HAVING TWO RIGHT NOW. WITH TWO 19 DAYS' NOTICE AND NO PUBLIC OUTREACH, WE ARE IMPOSSIBLY PLACING A HALF-BAKED TAX ON THE BALLOT THAT IMPACTS TAXPAYERS' WALLETS 20 21 FOR 30 YEARS, COSTING \$1.6 BILLION. UNTIL 2018, THE 1996 22 PROPOSITION CONTINUES TO GENERATE OVER \$28 MILLION A YEAR. 23 THERE'S ALSO CURRENTLY OVER \$150 MILLION IN EXISTING PROP A FUNDS THAT HAVE NOT BEEN ALLOCATED. ON TOP OF THAT, THERE'S 24 ANOTHER \$150 MILLION COMMITTED BUT NOT YET SPENT. THERE'S OVER 25



\$12 BILLION THAT CANNOT BE USED WITHOUT LEGISLATION BECAUSE 1 THE ORIGINAL PROPOSITION SET ASIDE FUNDS FOR PROJECTS THAT ARE 2 3 NO LONGER VIABLE. WITH LEGISLATION THOSE FUNDS WOULD BE REDIRECTED TO OTHER PARK PROJECTS. ADDITIONALLY, THREE OF OUR 4 5 CITIES, PALMDALE, SANTA CLARITA AND THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES, HAVE THEIR OWN CITY PARK TAXES. THE ORIGINAL PROPOSITION A 6 7 THAT PASSED IN '92 WAS BASED ON A GREAT DEAL, AGAIN, OF 8 RESEARCH AND COLLABORATION AMONG ALL OF OUR CITIES, 9 UNINCORPORATED COMMUNITIES AND THOSE BEING SERVED WITH SPECIFIC PROJECTS BEING NAMED GUARANTEEING EOUITABLE 10 11 DISTRIBUTION OF THOSE FUNDS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY PARKS WHICH ARE A VITAL COMPONENT TO ENHANCING THE OUALITY OF LIFE FOR ALL 12 OF OUR COUNTY RESIDENTS, HOWEVER THE VOTERS SHOULD NOT BE 13 TAXED AGAIN UNTIL THERE IS A PLAN TO SPEND ALL OF THE 14 ALLOCATED REVENUES IN A PROPOSAL SPECIFYING THE NEED FOR 15 16 ADDITIONAL REVENUE. WE HAVE MONEY TO BE SPENT. WE NEED TO HAVE AN EXTENSIVE OUTREACH SO IN 2016 WE WILL HAVE ON THE BALLOT A 17 18 PROPOSITION RELATIVE TO MEETING PARK NEEDS FOR THOSE NEEDS 19 THAT ARE BEING MET THAT ARE NOT SPECIFICALLY BEING MET IN THE PROPOSAL THAT WE ARE HAVING BEFORE US TODAY THAT IS TO 20 CONTINUE TO TAX FOR 30 MORE YEARS. 21

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23 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: MR. CHAIRMAN?

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25 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: YES.



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SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN AND COLLEAGUES. ON 2 3 THE MATTER BEFORE US THAT'S CURRENTLY PROPOSED, I WOULD SIMPLY SAY THE FOLLOWING. THE SAFE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS, YOUTH, SENIOR, 4 5 RECREATION, BEACHES, WILDLIFE PROTECTION MEASURE WOULD ENSURE CONTINUED GRANTS TO COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES CITIES AND NONPROFIT 6 7 ORGANIZATIONS FOR THE CREATION, RENOVATION AND MAINTENANCE OF 8 PARK AND RECREATIONAL ASSETS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY OF LOS 9 ANGELES. NOW, HISTORICALLY, THE VOTERS HAVE SUPPORTED MEASURES 10 TO INCREASE GREEN AND RECREATIONAL SPACE, AND LOS ANGELES 11 COUNTY RECREATIONAL PARK AND OPEN SPACE DISTRICT HAS TRANSPARENTLY AND PROFESSIONALLY ALLOCATED OVER A BILLION 12 DOLLARS OF FUNDS FOR THIS INTENDED PURPOSE. THAT IS TO BE 13 APPLAUDED. AS THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS NOW CONTEMPLATES ASKING 14 15 THE VOTERS TO CONSIDER A 30-YEAR CONTINUATION OF THIS FUNDING 16 PROGRAM. THE BOARD MUST ENSURE THAT THE FORMULA FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF THESE FUNDS NOT ONLY REFLECTS THE EVOLVING 17 18 NEEDS OF THE COMMUNITY IT SERVES BUT ALSO PROVIDES ENOUGH 19 FLEXIBILITY FOR FUTURE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD TO DIRECT RESOURCES APPROPRIATELY. FIRSTLY, A SUBSTANTIAL ADEOUATE 20 ALLOCATION SHOULD BE INVESTED IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES. THE 21 22 COUNTY'S GENERAL PLAN UPDATE PROPOSES A GOAL OF 4 ACRES OF 23 PARK LAND FOR EVERY 1,000 RESIDENTS. HOWEVER, MANY COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT THE COUNTY DO NOT MEET THIS GOAL. DISPARITIES IN 24 PARK DISTRIBUTIONS ARE PARTICULARLY EVIDENT IN LOW-INCOME 25



AREAS. HIGH PARK ACREAGE WITHIN A COMMUNITY IS ASSOCIATED WITH 1 INCREASED PARTICIPATION AND PHYSICAL ACTIVITY AND MORE 2 3 POSITIVE HEALTH OUTCOMES FOR SURROUNDING RESIDENTS. THIS IS A MATTER OF PHYSICAL FITNESS, WELLNESS AND THE LIKE; IT IS NOT 4 5 SIMPLY A MATTER OF RECREATION ALONE. ADDITIONALLY, THIS FUNDING MEASURE MUST STEADFASTLY DEDICATE RESOURCES TO 6 7 ADDRESSING THE PUBLIC HEALTH DISPARITIES WHICH HAS BEEN AN 8 IMPORTANT ASPECT OF THE ARTICULATED AGENDA OF PARKS AND 9 RECREATION, NOT ONLY CREATING RECREATION BUT HEALTH, WELLNESS AND FITNESS. OUR DIRECTOR OF THE PARKS AND RECREATION 10 11 DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN A STAUNCH ADVOCATE FOR THAT BOTH PUBLICLY AND PRIVATELY. AND, SECONDLY, THE BOARD AS PRESENTLY COMPRISED 12 SHOULD NOT TIE OUR FUTURE BOARD TO A DIVIDE BY FIVE FORMULA. 13 LET ME REPEAT THAT. THIS BOARD SHOULD NOT TIE FUTURE BOARDS TO 14 A LOCKED-IN DIVIDE BY FIVE FORMULA. IT FORCES THE FUNDS TO BE 15 16 SPENT IN THE MANNER THAT DOES NOT TAKE INTO CONSIDERATION DEFERRED MAINTENANCE NEEDS, CHANGING DEMOGRAPHICS AND OTHER 17 18 FACTORS. THIS DECISION AS CURRENTLY CONSTITUTED WOULD BE PRE-19 EMPTIVE IN THAT REGARD. AND WHILE THE 1996 MEASURE PROVIDES THE BOARD WITH DIRECTION TO ALLOCATE FUNDS EQUALLY BY DISTRICT 20 21 SOLELY FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF COMPETITIVE GRANTS, NEITHER THE 22 1992 NOR THE 1996 MEASURES GENERALLY DIRECTED THE BOARD TO 23 IMPLEMENT A DIVIDE BY 5 METHODOLOGY. THE CURRENT BOARD SHOULD PROVIDE FUTURE BOARDS WITH THE SAME FLEXIBILITY AND AUTHORITY. 24 IT IS MY UNDERSTANDING THAT THAT IS HOW THE MATTER WOULD COME 25



TO US. UNFORTUNATELY, THAT HAS BEEN CHANGED. AND, THEREFORE, I 1 FIND IT HUGELY PROBLEMATIC. I THEREFORE MOVE THAT WE DIRECT 2 3 COUNTY COUNSEL TO MAKE THE FOLLOWING REVISIONS TO SECTION 5 AND 6 OF THE PROPOSED SAFE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS YOUTH, SENIOR 4 5 RECREATION, BEACHES, WILDLIFE PROTECTION MEASURE. FIRST, IT WOULD BE THE EXPENDITURE PLAN THAT IS ARTICULATED AS TO WHAT 6 7 SHOULD BE CONSIDERED IN THE INTEREST OF A MORE EQUITABLE 8 DISTRIBUTION OF RESOURCES, 20 PERCENT RATHER THAN 30 PERCENT 9 OF THE PROCEEDS SHALL BE ALLOCATED TO THE COUNTY FOR REGIONAL PARKS AND FOR OPEN SPACE, FOOTHILL MOUNTAIN, TRAIL RIVER, 10 11 WETLAND AND STREAMS PROJECT; AND 20 RATHER THAN 10 OF THE PROCEEDS SHALL BE ALLOCATED TO THE COUNTY'S PROJECTS THAT 12 INCREASE OPEN SPACE AND RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES IN 13 UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES. I SPEAK THE LANGUAGE OF EQUITY, OR 14 THAT WHICH IS EQUITABLE IN THAT REGARD. SECTION 6, THEN, I 15 16 PROPOSE THAT WE STRIKE THE FOLLOWING LANGUAGE, THE LAST PORTION WHICH IS BOLD AND STRUCK OUT HERE, THE FUNDS 17 18 IDENTIFIED IN THE SUBSECTIONS INDICATED, SHALL BE AWARDED AT 19 THE SOLE DISCRETION OF THE BOARD IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS TO THE EXPENDITURE OF FUNDS ALLOCATED FOR 20 COMPETITIVE GRANTS PURSUANT TO THE SPECIFIED LANGUAGE IN ORDER 21 22 DESCRIBED IN THE SECTION IN ORDER OF 1996 RESPECTIVELY. THOSE WOULD BE MY AMENDMENTS TO THE MATTER, MR. CHAIRMAN. I THINK IF 23 WE WERE TO BE ABLE TO ACCOMPLISH THOSE THINGS, WE CAN MOVE 24



FORWARD WITH MY SUPPORT; OTHERWISE, I WOULD FIND IT VERY
 DIFFICULT SUPPORTING THE MATTER AS IT IS BEFORE US.

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4 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: OKAY. IS THERE A SECOND TO THAT? THAT
5 PARTICULAR AMENDMENT, THEN, DIES FOR LACK OF A SECOND. THE
6 MAIN ITEM IS BEFORE US. YES?

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8 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: LET ME JUST SPEAK TO THIS BRIEFLY. THIS HAS 9 BEEN DISCUSSED FOR MONTHS. NOT ONLY WITHIN THE COUNTY FAMILY, WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION AND YOUR EFFORTS 10 11 TO WORK WITH OUR OFFICES. BUT ALSO WITH COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS, CITIES THAT HAVE CONTACTED MY OFFICE AS THEY 12 HAVE OTHERS. AND WE'RE IN A VERY DIFFICULT POSITION BUT ALSO 13 IN AN ENVIABLE POSITION. THE DIFFICULT POSITION IS THE PROP A 14 15 FROM 1992, WHICH RAISES TWICE AS MUCH MONEY AS PROP A OF 1996 16 AND WHICH HAS BEEN LIBERALLY USED BY EVERY DISTRICT IN THIS COUNTY AFTER WHOM PARKS HAVE BEEN NAMED AFTER THOSE VERY 17 18 MEMBERS WHO HAVE BEEN, WHOSE DISTRICTS HAVE BENEFITED FROM 19 THIS. THOSE PROJECTS, THAT MEASURE, PROP A '92 IS SET TO EXPIRE AT THE END OF THIS FISCAL YEAR. THAT MEANS THAT A 20 REVENUE STREAM WHICH CITIES, THE COUNTY ITSELF, AND THE 21 22 DEPARTMENT OF PARKS AND RECREATION WHICH GETS SOME 23 ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS TAKEN CARE OF THROUGH THE MEASURE, WILL BE LOST FOR AT LEAST TWO YEARS, ASSUMING THERE IS A MEASURE IN 24 2016 AND ASSUMING IT PASSES. THAT IS THE CHALLENGE THAT WE 25



FACE. THE ENVIABLE POSITION THAT WE'RE IN IS THAT A LOT OF 1 WORK HAS BEEN DONE OVER THE YEARS ON THESE TWO MEASURES, PROP 2 3 A '92 AND PROP A '96. A LOT OF WORK WAS DONE WITH OUR CITIES, WITH OUR STAKEHOLDERS, WITH VARIOUS ENTITIES AROUND THE COUNTY 4 5 AND WITHIN THE COUNTY FAMILY ITSELF. WE DON'T NEED TO REINVENT THE WHEEL. WE CAN BUILD ON WHAT WAS DONE THEN AND ESSENTIALLY 6 7 CONTINUE, WHICH IS WHAT THIS IS; IT'S A CONTINUATION OF AN 8 EXISTING MEASURE THAT EXPIRES IN JUNE. WE'VE DONE THIS BEFORE 9 WHEN MEASURES WERE SET TO EXPIRE. WE TRY TO MIRROR AS OF AS POSSIBLE AND CERTAINLY WITHIN THE LAW OF WHAT WE CAN DO. AND 10 11 THAT'S WHAT HAS BEEN DONE HERE. THIS IS ESSENTIALLY A CONTINUATION OF THE MEASURE THAT WE'VE HAD SINCE 1992. THAT'S 12 22 YEARS. AND IT'S PATTERNED AFTER THAT ONE AND ALSO AFTER 13 MEASURE A OF 1996, WHICH WILL EXPIRE ALSO IN 2019. WE NEED TO 14 DO THIS IF WE WANT TO KEEP THE MOMENTUM GOING. NOT EVERY 15 16 DISTRICT HAS SPENT EXACTLY THE SAME AMOUNT OF MONEY. THERE ARE REASONS FOR THAT, I'M SURE. YOU DON'T JUST SPEND ALL THE MONEY 17 18 YOU HAVE IN ONE YEAR. YOU WANT TO SOMETIMES AMALGAMATE MONEY 19 TO MAKE SIGNIFICANT INVESTMENTS. YOU DON'T BUILD A BIG PARK IN ONE YEAR. YOU BUILD IT OVER TIME. AND CERTAINLY THAT'S BEEN 20 THE CASE IN THE SECOND DISTRICT. AND IN THE THIRD DISTRICT AND 21 22 THE FIRST DISTRICT AND THE FOURTH DISTRICT AND ESPECIALLY THE 23 FIFTH DISTRICT WHERE A LOT OF MONEY HAS BEEN SPENT AND A LOT OF MONEY HAS BEEN UNSPENT. THAT'S NOT A CRITICISM. THEY'VE GOT 24 BIG IDEAS AND BIG PROJECTS IN MIND. AND THEY OUGHT TO HAVE THE 25



FLEXIBILITY TO AMALGAMATE THE NECESSARY REVENUE, THE NECESSARY 1 FUNDING TO DO WHAT THEY NEED TO DO. AND THAT'S THE LONG AND 2 3 THE SHORT OF IT. WE COULD SPEND ANOTHER YEAR AND A HALF GETTING OURSELVES INTO PRETZELS OVER THESE THINGS, OR WE CAN 4 5 BUILD ON WHAT WE'VE GOT GOING. AND THERE ARE A NUMBER OF OFFICES, A NUMBER OF DISTRICTS AND A NUMBER OF COUNTY-WIDE 6 7 PROJECTS THAT ARE DEPENDING ON THE CONTINUING FLOW OF REVENUES 8 FROM THIS MEASURE. WE DID PUT IN A 10 PERCENT, SOMETHING WE 9 DID NOT HAVE IN THE LAST MEASURE, AND IT CAME OUT OF THE MULTITUDE OF MEETINGS THAT TOOK PLACE AMONG STAFF AND 10 11 STAKEHOLDERS. THERE WAS A 10 PERCENT SET ASIDE FOR UNDERSERVED AREAS. AND BY THE WAY, THE OTHER MONIES THAT ARE IN THERE, THE 12 OTHER CATEGORIES DON'T PRECLUDE THOSE CATEGORIES FROM BEING 13 USED FOR UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES. SO THE 10 PERCENT IS 14 EARMARKED FOR UNSERVED COMMUNITIES, BUT THE 30 PERCENT OF 15 16 COUNTYWIDE PROJECTS AND 20 PERCENT OF OTHER CITY PROJECTS COULD ALL BE USED IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES, FOR UNDERSERVED 17 18 COMMUNITIES, IS THAT CORRECT?

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20 RUSS GUINEY: THAT'S CORRECT.

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22 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: SO WHAT WE'VE DONE HERE IS WE'VE ACTUALLY
23 EARMARKED 10 PERCENT FOR UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES. AND I WOULD
24 REMIND EVERYBODY THAT THERE ARE UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES IN



EACH SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT. THEY DON'T JUST BELONG TO ONE
 SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICT.

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4 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: EXACTLY.

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SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: BUT TO ALL SUPERVISORIAL DISTRICTS. AND THAT 6 7 FLEXIBILITY NEEDS -- THAT IS TAKEN CARE OF IN THIS MEASURE. 8 AND THEN ON TOP OF THAT, AS WE HAVE DONE, AS OTHER SUPERVISORS 9 HAVE DONE, IF YOU WANT TO SPEND MONEY THAT ISN'T EARMARKED FOR UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES OR FOR 10 PARKS IN UNDERSERVED AREAS, THAT CERTAINLY IS NOT PRECLUDED; 11 IT IS PERMITTED. AND WE HAVE DONE IT ON MANY OCCASIONS, ALL OF 12 US HAVE DONE IT. SO WITH THAT I WOULD ASK FOR AN AYE VOTE. 13 IT'S NOT GOING TO BE EASY TO GET THIS PASSED IN THIS ELECTION 14 YEAR. THE TURNOUT'S GOING TO BE LOW. BUT IT IS A CONTINUATION. 15 16 I THINK PEOPLE, THE PUBLIC HAS BENEFITED FROM THIS. THEY LIKE THE PARKS THAT HAVE BEEN BUILT. THEY LIKE THE RECREATION 17 18 OPPORTUNITIES THAT HAVE BEEN PROVIDED. I DON'T THINK THEY WANT 19 TO SEE THIS COME TO A GRINDING HALT ON JUNE 30TH OF THIS COMING YEAR. AND I -- OH. IF I CAN, MR. CHAIRMAN, WE NEED TO 20 ASK THE COUNTY COUNSEL TO MAKE THE CLARIFYING AMENDMENTS THAT 21 22 YOU CAN EXPLAIN.

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24 COUNSEL: YES. LAST NIGHT THERE WERE MINOR.

3 COUNSEL: SUPERVISOR, THERE WERE MINOR REVISIONS MADE TO THE RESOLUTION. I BELIEVE THERE IS A REVISED VERSION AVAILABLE. 4 5 THOSE CHANGES ARE ON PAGE 2, DATE OF THE PUBLIC HEARING HAS BEEN CHANGED FROM JULY 29TH TO AUGUST 5TH, TODAY. ON PAGE 5, 6 7 SECTION 5 B, THE WORD "COUNTY" HAS BEEN ADDED BEFORE PARKS TO 8 MAKE CLEAR THAT THE 15 PERCENT ALLOCATION IN THAT SECTION IS 9 FOR COUNTY PROJECTS. ON PAGE 6, SECTION 6 IT HAS BEEN CLARIFIED THAT FUNDS PROVIDED TO THE COUNTY UNDER SECTION 5 C, 10 11 REGIONAL AND OPEN SPACE PROJECTS AND, D, PROJECTS IN UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES MAY BE GRANTED TO CITIES AND OTHER 12 PARK AGENCIES. AND ON PAGE 14, REFERENCE HAS BEEN ADDED IN THE 13 BALLOT MEASURE ITSELF TO ASSIST IN GANG PREVENTION. 14

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16 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THOSE ARE ALL AMENDMENTS THAT EITHER
17 CLARIFY, MAKE THE DOCUMENT INTERNALLY CONSISTENT DATE-WISE AND
18 CONSISTENT WITH THE PREVIOUS MEASURES IN THE MOTION.

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20 COUNSEL: THAT'S CORRECT.

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22 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: NO SUBSTANTIVE CHANGES IN ANY OF THIS?

23

24 COUNSEL: NO. THEY ARE CLARIFICATIONS.



SUP YAROSLAVSKY: CLARIFICATIONS. I MOVE THE MATTER AS AMENDED. 1 WE HAVE THAT DOCUMENT BEFORE US NOW. I THINK IT'S BEEN 2 3 DISTRIBUTED, CORRECT? 4 5 COUNSEL: YES. 6 7 SUP. ANTONOVICH: MR. CHAIRMAN? IS THIS A FLAT \$23 FEE? 14 COUNSEL: IT IS FLAT PER PARCEL. 15 16 SUP. ANTONOVICH: BECAUSE MY UNDERSTANDING, THE 1992 ASSESSMENT 17 18 RANGES FROM 3 CENTS TO \$10,000. 19 COUNSEL: THAT IS CORRECT. THE 1992 AND 1996 MEASURES WERE 20 21 ASSESSMENTS. THIS IS A SPECIAL TAX. IT IS A FLAT \$23 PER 22 PARCEL TAX ON REAL PROPERTY IN THE COUNTY. 23 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO A SENIOR CITIZEN ON A FIXED INCOME WILL BE 24 25 CHARGED THE SAME \$23 AS A MAJOR CORPORATION WILL BE CHARGED.



1 2 COUNSEL: THAT IS CORRECT, PER PARCEL. 3 SUP. ANTONOVICH: WHERE IN '92, IT WENT FROM 3 CENTS TO 4 \$10,000. 5 6 COUNSEL: THAT IS CORRECT. IT WAS A MORE COMPLICATED FORMULA. 7 8 9 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SO WE'RE INCREASING THE ASSESSMENT FOR SENIORS AND OTHERS WHO WERE PAYING LESS THAN \$23, INCLUDING 10 11 THOSE WHO WERE PAYING 3 CENTS? 12 13 COUNSEL: IT DEPENDS ON HOW THE FORMULA WAS APPLIED TO THEIR PARTICULAR PARCELS. 14 15 16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: IT WASN'T JUST 3 CENTS. 17 18 SUP. ANTONOVICH: SOME WERE 3 CENTS. 19 20 COUNSEL: SIR, THERE IS A PROVISION IN THE RESOLUTION FOR AN 21 APPEALS PROCESS THAT THE DEPARTMENT WILL CREATE. AND ALL OTHER 22 EXEMPTIONS THAT APPLY TO REAL PROPERTY TAXES WOULD APPLY TO 23 THIS SPECIAL TAX.



RUSS GUINEY: MR. CHAIR, IF I MIGHT. THE 3 CENTS AND THE SMALL
 AMOUNTS ARE FOR VACANT PROPERTY. THE AVERAGE RESIDENTIAL
 PARCEL OF 1992 IS \$13 AND THAT PORTION WOULD GO TO \$23.

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5 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: IF I COULD JUST ADD, MR. CHAIRMAN, THAT WE
6 WOULD HAVE PREFERRED TO DO IT WITH THE FORMULA AS IT WAS BUT
7 THAT IS NO LONGER PERMITTED BY STATE LAW.

THE SECOND POINT I WISH 15 16 TO MAKE IS THAT MY OFFICE WAS UNDER THE DISTINCT IMPRESSION THAT THE DIVIDE BY FIVE PROVISION HAD BEEN APPROPRIATELY 17 18 AMENDED. AND ON THAT BASIS, WE WERE PREPARED TO PROCEED. BUT 19 WE LEARNED JUST YESTERDAY, I BELIEVE, THAT THAT HAD BEEN CHANGED. INCONSISTENT WITH THE EXPECTATION THAT WAS 20 21 ARTICULATED IN THE AGREEMENT THAT HAD BEEN MADE. THEREFORE, I 22 CONSIDER THAT TO BE A PROBLEM. THIS IS NOT A SMALL ISSUE. WE 23 CHOOSE NOT TO HANDCUFF FUTURE BOARDS. I THINK TO DO SO IS AN OVERREACH. A LOT OF GOOD HAS BEEN DONE, BUT A LOT MORE GOOD 24 CAN BE DONE WITH THIS MEASURE. HOWEVER, IT NEEDS TO BE DONE 25



FAIRLY AND/OR EQUITABLY. AND I WISH TO SAY THAT THAT WHICH 1 2 COULD BE DONE IS BEING OVERLOOKED OR BALKED ON IN THIS 3 INSTANCE. THE MOTION THAT I BROUGHT FORWARD OBVIOUSLY DIDN'T GARNER A SECOND. I RESPECT THE OPINIONS OF MY COLLEAGUES, AND 4 5 I CERTAINLY TRUST THAT THEY WILL RESPECT MY OPINION AND VOTE, 6 AS BELL. 7 8 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. 9 SUP. ANTONOVICH: MR. ON BEHALF OF THE 9 R.M.C., I'M HERE TO LEND SUPPORT FOR THE SAFE NEIGHBORHOOD PARKS, YOUTH AND RECREATION BEACHES WILD LIFE PROTECTION 10 11 MEASURE ALSO KNOWN AS PROPOSITION A. THE R.M.C. IS ONE OF NINE STATEWIDE CONSERVANCIES CONSIDERED AN URBAN CONSERVANCY 12 BECAUSE OF THE LARGE TERRITORY WE COVER, INCLUDING 1,600 13 SQUARE MILES IN EASTERN L.A. COUNTY AND WESTERN ORANGE COUNTY. 14 WE ARE SUPPORTIVE OF PROJECTS THAT FALL SPECIFICALLY WITHIN 15 16 OUR URBAN TARGET AREA AND ARE CONSISTENT WITH THE MISSION OF THE R.M.C., WHICH IS TO PRESERVE OPEN SPACE AND HABITATS FOR 17 18 LOW IMPACT RECREATIONAL AND EDUCATIONAL USES, WILDLIFE HABITAT 19 PROTECTION, AND WATERSHED IMPROVEMENTS. WE HAVE BEEN A BENEFACTOR 19 OF PROP A FUNDS IN THE PAST FOR URBAN PARKS AND OPEN SPACE, INCLUDING TRAILS AND THE DEVELOPMENT OF PARKS WITHIN HIGHLY 20 URBANIZED AREAS WITHIN OUR COUNTY. THOSE PARK PROJECTS ARE 21 22 LARGELY IN AREAS THAT ARE DIFFICULT OFTEN TO DEVELOP FOR OTHER 23 PURPOSES. AND WE'VE TAKEN ON THOSE PROJECTS AS A MEANS TO 24 BRING OPEN SPACE TO OUR UNDERSERVED AREAS WITHIN THE COUNTY. THE WATERSHED CONSERVATION AUTHORITY BROADLY SUPPORTS YOUR 25



EFFORTS IN BRINGING PROP A FORWARD FOR THE PUBLIC TO VOTE ON 1 TO EXTEND THAT PROGRAM. WE ARE INTERESTED IN CONTINUING TO 2 3 COLLABORATE WITH THE REGIONAL PARKS AND OPEN SPACE DISTRICT MOVING FORWARD AND WOULD LIKE TO OFFER OUR SUPPORT TO YOU 4 5 TODAY. 6 7 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. WITH THAT, WE WILL CLOSE THE 8 PUBLIC HEARING AND DO A ROLL CALL VOTE, PLEASE. 9 SACHI HAMAI, EXEC. OFFICER: OKAY. 9 RICHARD E. DROOYAN: LET ME SAY I'VE GIVEN A LOT OF THOUGHT TO THIS ISSUE. AND I ALSO HAD A LOT OF EXPERIENCE AS A MEMBER OF 10 11 THE LOS ANGELES POLICE COMMISSION AND THE PRESIDENT OF THE POLICE COMMISSION. ALSO HAVING BEEN THE GENERAL COUNSEL OF THE 12 JAIL COMMISSION AND INVOLVED IN THE WRITING OF THE REPORT AND 13 IN THE DISCUSSIONS THAT WE HAD. AND WE HAD A NUMBER OF 14 15 RIGOROUS DISCUSSIONS OVER THIS ISSUE. ULTIMATELY, THE JAIL 16 COMMISSION'S CONCLUSION WAS: THERE SHOULD BE AN INSPECTOR GENERAL. THAT INSPECTOR GENERAL SHOULD BE APPOINTED BY THIS 17 18 BOARD AND SHOULD REPORT TO THIS BOARD. AND THAT ONLY IN THE 19 EVENT THAT IT WAS ULTIMATELY DETERMINED BY THIS BOARD THAT IT WAS NOT IN A POSITION TO PROVIDE THE OVERSIGHT TO THE 20 INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE AND BE THE FORUM FOR RECEIPT OF THE 21 22 INSPECTOR GENERAL'S REPORTS THAT THERE SHOULD BE A CIVILIAN 23 COMMISSION TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL OVERSIGHT TO THE JAILS. AND MY VIEW IS THAT THAT'S WHAT THIS BOARD SHOULD DO AT THIS POINT 24 IN TIME. THE BOARD SHOULD NOW THAT THEY PASSED THE ORDINANCE, 25



NOW THAT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE IS UP AND RUNNING, THE 1 BOARD SHOULD LET THE INSPECTOR GENERAL DO HIS JOB, TAKE 2 3 REPORTS FROM THE INSPECTOR GENERAL OVER AT LEAST THE NEXT YEAR, MAKE SURE THAT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE IS 4 5 OPERATING EFFECTIVELY, THAT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE IS MEETING THIS BOARD'S EXPECTATIONS, IS ABLE TO HAVE THE ACCESS 6 7 THAT'S NECESSARY AND IS PROVIDING A RIGOROUS OVERSIGHT AND 8 RIGOROUS REPORTS TO THIS BOARD. IF AT THE END OF THAT PERIOD 9 OF TIME THE BOARD CONCLUDES THAT THERE NEEDS TO BE AN ADDITIONAL LAYER OF OVERSIGHT, THAT THE PUBLIC REPORTS PLUS 10 11 THE BOARD'S OVERSIGHT IS NOT APPROPRIATE, IS NOT SUFFICIENT, I SHOULD SAY, IT WOULD BE AT THAT POINT IN TIME THAT THE BOARD 12 SHOULD CONSIDER THE APPOINTMENT OF A CIVILIAN COMMISSION. PART 13 OF THE RECOMMENDATIONS -- OR PART OF THE ANALYSIS THAT WENT 14 15 INTO THE JAIL COMMISSION'S RECOMMENDATIONS IS A REFLECTION OF 16 THE STRUCTURE OF COUNTY GOVERNMENT WHICH IS FUNDAMENTALLY DIFFERENT FROM THE STRUCTURE OF THE L.A. CITY GOVERNMENT. IN 17 18 THE CITY, YOU HAVE A UNITARY EXECUTIVE WHO APPOINTS A POLICE 19 COMMISSION. THAT POLICE COMMISSION IS EMPOWERED BY THE CHARTER TO HAVE PLENTY OF OVERSIGHT OVER THE LOS ANGELES POLICE 20 DEPARTMENT WITH EVERYTHING EXCEPT FOR DISCIPLINE. AND THAT 21 22 POLICE COMMISSION REGULARLY RECEIVES REPORTS FROM THE 23 INSPECTOR GENERAL, REVIEWS ALL CATEGORICAL USES OF FORCE IN THE L.A. CITY POLICE DEPARTMENT AND HAS THE FINAL 24 DETERMINATION AS TO WHETHER THOSE USES OF FORCE ARE IN POLICY 25



OR OUT OF POLICY. ALL FIVE OF THEM ARE APPOINTED BY A MAYOR, 1 2 AND THEY ULTIMATELY ARE RESPONSIBLE TO THE MAYOR AND TO THE 3 CITIZENS OF LOS ANGELES. THAT IS A FUNDAMENTALLY DIFFERENT STRUCTURE THAN WHAT WE HAVE HERE IN THE COUNTY. WE HAVE THE 4 5 FIVE-MEMBER BOARD OF SUPERVISORS, WHICH SERVES AS BOTH AN EXECUTIVE AND LEGISLATIVE BODY. WE HAVE AN INDEPENDENTLY 6 7 ELECTED SHERIFF, CONSTITUTIONAL OFFICER. AND WE HAVE NO 8 STATEWIDE AUTHORITY FOR THE CREATION OF A CIVILIAN COMMISSION 9 THAT WOULD HAVE ANY TRUE OVERSIGHT OVER THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. SO THAT IS, I THINK, A BIG REASON WHY THE JAIL 10 11 COMMISSION CAME OUT THE WAY IT DID IN ITS RECOMMENDATION. THERE IS NO OUESTION THAT THE JAIL COMMISSION -- AND I 12 PERSONALLY -- FAVOR CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OVER LAW ENFORCEMENT. I 13 THINK IT IS ABSOLUTELY CRITICAL. I THINK THE ROLE THAT THIS 14 15 BOARD PLAYED IN CREATING THE JAIL COMMISSION AND THE RESULT OF 16 THAT JAIL COMMISSION DEMONSTRATE THE IMPORTANCE OF CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. I THINK WHAT YOU HAVE RIGHT NOW IS A BODY, THIS 17 18 BOARD, WHICH WILL HAVE THE MAXIMUM OVERSIGHT POSSIBLE OVER THE 19 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IN TERMS OF THE INFLUENCE THAT THIS BODY HAS, IN TERMS OF THIS BODY'S BUDGETARY AUTHORITY, AND IN TERMS 20 OF RECEIVING REPORTS FROM THE INSPECTOR GENERAL. AND I THINK 21 22 IF YOU HAVE AN INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE NOW WITH THE BUDGET 23 AND THE STAFFING THAT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL IS GOING TO HAVE IS YOU HAVE A BODY THAT IS GOING TO BE ABLE, WITH SOME 24 COOPERATION OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, TO AUDIT, REVIEW, 25



MONITOR AND, WHEN NECESSARY, INVESTIGATE AND MAKE THOSE KINDS 1 OF REPORTS TO THIS BOARD. THE JAIL COMMISSION IS NOT GOING TO 2 3 REALLY HAVE THE ABILITY TO CONDUCT INVESTIGATIONS. A FIVE-PERSON BROWN ACT BOARD IS LIMITED IN THE ABILITY TO CONDUCT 4 5 INVESTIGATIONS. THAT'S WHY WE HAVE THE INSPECTOR GENERAL. AND THIS BOARD, I THINK, IS THE BODY THAT HAS THE MAXIMUM 6 7 AUTHORITY TO PROVIDE THE OVERSIGHT OVER THE SHERIFF'S 8 DEPARTMENT. SO MY VIEW IS YOU HAVE A DIFFERENT STRUCTURE HERE. 9 YOU HAVE TO TAKE INTO ACCOUNT OF THE POLITICAL STRUCTURE WE HAVE IN THE COUNTY. YOU'VE NOW CREATED AN INSPECTOR GENERAL'S 10 11 OFFICE THAT'S FULLY EMPOWERED TO CONDUCT THE NECESSARY OVERSIGHT. AND I THINK MY OWN PERSONAL VIEW AND I BELIEVE THE 12 RECOMMENDATION OF THE JAIL COMMISSION IS THAT WE SHOULD LET 13 THIS CURRENT ORGANIZATION WITH ITS INSPECTOR GENERAL REPORTING 14 15 TO THE BOARD PLAY OUT FOR SOME PERIOD OF TIME SO THAT THIS 16 BOARD IS ULTIMATELY SATISFIED THAT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL IS BOTH EFFECTIVE AND MEETING ITS EXPECTATIONS. 17

19 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. MR. HUNTSMAN?

20

21 MAX HUNTSMAN: THANK YOU, SIR. THIS BOARD HIRED ME TO DO
22 SOMETHING, TO INVESTIGATE AND TO SORT OF TAKE APART AND
23 ANALYZE THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, A TASK I FEEL I'M QUALIFIED
24 TO DO. AND IF I'M GIVEN ACCESS, I THINK I'LL BE ABLE TO DO TO
25 THE BENEFIT OF THE DEPARTMENT AND TO THE ASSISTANCE OF THE



BOARD IN ITS SUPERVISORY ROLE. I WAS ALSO ASKED TO PROVIDE AN 1 OPINION REGARDING A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT IN ORDER TO DO THAT, 2 3 BECAUSE I AM NO EXPERT IN THIS AREA. ME AND MY STAFF SPOKE TO A WIDE VARIETY OF EXPERTS. YOU JUST HEARD FROM MR. DROOYAN WHO 4 5 IS ONE SUCH EXPERT AND THE THINGS THAT HE TOLD YOU ARE ECHOED BY MANY OF THE EXPERTS IN THIS AREA. THE BOARD IS CONSIDERING 6 7 WHETHER OR NOT TO FORM A CIVILIAN COMMISSION WITHOUT WHAT 8 PEOPLE OFTEN CALL ADDITIONAL POWERS. AND AS MR. DROOYAN HAS 9 TOLD YOU, IN THIS COUNTY CONTEXT IN WHICH THERE IS NO ONE PERSON WHO APPOINTS THE SHERIFF OR CONTROLS THE SHERIFF IN THE 10 11 WAY L.A.P.D. OR ANY OTHER JURISDICTIONS, IN ORDER TO EMPOWER SUCH A COMMISSION, YOU'D HAVE TO PASS A STATE LAW OR A COUNTY 12 CHARTER. IF YOU DON'T DO THAT, THEN YOU HAVE AN ADVISORY 13 COMMITTEE. AND I KNOW YOU ALL UNDERSTAND THIS, BUT I DON'T 14 KNOW THAT THE PUBLIC DOES. DRIVING HOME YESTERDAY, LISTENING 15 16 TO N.P.R., I HEARD KEVIN RODERICK, WHO COMMENTS ON THESE AREAS TALK ABOUT HOW THIS BOARD WAS CONSIDERING, TODAY, CREATING A 17 18 COMMISSION THAT WOULD HAVE OVERSIGHT OF SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. 19 AND THAT COMMISSION, IF YOU CREATE IT TODAY, WON'T ACTUALLY HAVE THE AUTHORITY TO DO ANYTHING MORE THAN RECOMMEND. THAT 20 DOES NOT MEAN IT'S A BAD IDEA. BUT IT IS NOT THE SAVIOR ON A 21 22 WHITE HORSE RIDING IN THAT SOME PEOPLE WOULD LIKE IT TO BE. 23 AND THAT IS WHY, BASED ON THE INFORMATION I PROVIDED YOU, I RECOMMENDED WAITING UNTIL WE COMPLETED THE PROCESS WE'RE IN 24 RIGHT NOW. TO MY MIND, THE MOST CRITICAL PIECE OF WHAT WE'RE 25



TRYING TO DO HERE TO REFORM THE DEPARTMENT IS ACCESS. COMPLETE 1 ACCESS. UNLIMITED ACCESS. AND TO DATE WE DO NOT HAVE THAT. 2 3 WE'VE BEEN NEGOTIATING FOR MONTHS ON TRYING TO GET THAT. THE DEPARTMENT MAY OR MAY NOT ULTIMATELY GIVE THAT TO US. JUST 4 5 OVER THE WEEKEND, A PERSON WAS SHOT AND THERE'S AN INVESTIGATION GOING ON RIGHT NOW THAT I DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO. 6 7 THAT WHETHER OR NOT IT'S BEING CONDUCTED PROPERLY IS A 8 CRITICAL POINT FOR THE PUBLIC TO HAVE CONFIDENCE IN ITS 9 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND HAVE CONFIDENCE IN THE BOARD AND WHATEVER MECHANISMS YOU PUT IN PLACE. WE NEED THAT COMPLETE 10 11 ACCESS. WE'VE COME UP WITH LEGAL JUSTIFICATION. SOME OF IT IS LISTED IN THE REPORT THAT YOU HAVE IN FRONT OF YOU. WE'VE 12 PRESENTED IT TO THE DEPARTMENT. AND WE'RE IN A CONTINUING 13 PROCESS OF NEGOTIATING IT. SHERIFF SCOTT HAS BEEN VERY 14 COOPERATIVE, VERY ENTHUSIASTIC IN HIS SUPPORT. BUT THE WAY A 15 16 PROCESS LIKE THIS FAILS IS NOT THROUGH THE PRESENCE OR ABSENCE OF SUPPORT OF A HEAD OF A DEPARTMENT; IT'S THROUGH THE PEOPLE 17 18 ON THE GROUND, THE DAY-TO-DAY OPERATIONS PEOPLE, THE 19 BUREAUCRATS, THE PEOPLE WHO WHISPER IN SOMEBODY'S EAR WHO GO TO A MEETING AND PUT UP ROADBLOCKS. SO IF THAT PROCESS RESULTS 20 IN US GETTING INCOMPLETE ACCESS, THEN I THINK WE'LL HAVE A 21 22 FAILURE ON OUR HANDS AND WE'LL NEED A PLAN B. AND THE PLAN B, 23 IN MY OPINION, WOULD BE FOR YOU TO SEEK A STATE LAW OR CHARTER CHANGE TO IMPLEMENT ADDITIONAL CHANGE. SUCH AS I'VE HEARD 24 ANECDOTALLY THAT THE CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION THAT'S CURRENTLY 25



IN PLACE, I'VE HEARD HORROR STORIES ABOUT SOME OF THE RESULTS 1 COMING OUT OF THE DISCIPLINARY PROCESS THERE. I'VE ALSO HEARD 2 3 OTHER PEOPLE SAY IT WORKS JUST FINE. BUT IF YOU HAD A STATE LAW THAT ALLOWED YOU TO, YOU COULD PULL THE PORTION OF CIVIL 4 5 SERVICE OUT OF THAT COMMISSION AND PUT IT IN A COMMISSION THAT YOU CREATED TO OVERSEE IN THE SENSE OF THE DISCIPLINARY 6 7 PROCESS THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. THAT WOULD BE A MUCH MORE 8 RADICAL AND AGGRESSIVE REFORM EFFORT. I DON'T KNOW IF IT 9 POLITICALLY WOULD SUCCEED. AND I DON'T KNOW IF IT'S NECESSARY. SO WHEN I TELL YOU THAT I THINK YOU SHOULD WAIT BEFORE YOU 10 11 MAKE YOUR DECISION, IT IS NOT BECAUSE I AM NOT IN SUPPORT OF A COMMITTEE. IT IS BECAUSE I THINK YOU MAY NEED TO BE OF MORE IN 12 SUPPORT OF A COMMITTEE THAN YOU ARE NOW. AND THE COMMITTEE 13 THAT YOU'RE CONSIDERING CREATING MAY OR MAY NOT GET YOU WHAT 14 YOU WANT. MORE IMPORTANTLY, OR EQUALLY IMPORTANTLY, CURRENTLY 15 16 I DO NOT BELIEVE THERE IS A GREAT DEAL OF CONSENSUS AMONG THE BOARD. I ALSO DON'T BELIEVE THERE'S CONSENSUS BETWEEN THE 17 18 BOARD AND THE SHERIFF. NOW, IT IS POSSIBLE FOR THIS BOARD TO 19 DO A LOT OF THINGS WITHOUT THE COOPERATION OF THE SHERIFF, BUT THIS ROAD WE'VE GONE DOWN, WE NEED SOME FORM OF COOPERATION 20 FOR IT TO WORK AND THE FORM THAT WE'RE TRYING TO DO IT. THE 21 22 SHERIFF ISN'T HERE TODAY. I KNOW THAT MR. MCDONNELL WHO IS A 23 CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF HAS ENDORSED THE COMMITTEE IDEA. PERSONALLY I THINK THAT THAT COULD BE A WATERSHED MOMENT. IF 24 HE IS INDEED ELECTED AND IF HE CONTINUES TO BE IN SUPPORT OF 25



IT AND WE SIT DOWN AT THE NEGOTIATING TABLE AND SAY TO HIM WE 1 WANT ACCESS. WE WANT COMPLETE ACCESS FOR THE I.G. WITH RESPECT 2 3 TO THE PEACE OFFICER BILL OF RIGHTS AND OTHER CONFIDENTIAL PROVISIONS. AND WE'RE WILLING TO PUT A COMMITTEE ON THE TABLE 4 5 AND YOU WANT IT AND MANY OF US THINK IT'S A GREAT IDEA. THAT COULD LEAD TO BOARD CONSENSUS. AND IT COULD LEAD TO BUY-IN 6 7 FROM THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND I THINK THAT WOULD BE A 8 GREAT PLACE TO BE AT BUT WE'RE NOT AT THAT POINT YET. HAVING 9 SAID THAT, IT'S OF COURSE THIS BOARD'S DECISION WHAT STEPS YOU WANT TO TAKE. I'M ONLY GIVING YOU MY PERCEPTION OF WHAT I 10 11 THINK STRATEGICALLY IS THE BEST WAY TO PLAY YOUR HAND HERE. BUT ULTIMATELY IT WILL BE UP TO YOU TO DECIDE HOW YOU WANT TO 12 PLAY YOUR CARDS. AND I OF COURSE WILL WORK WITH YOU IN 13 WHATEVER FRAMEWORK THIS BOARD SETS UP. AS I'M GOING TO BE 14 15 DOING IN THE DAYS AHEAD TRYING TO GET ACCESS AT THE DEPARTMENT 16 FOR THE THINGS THAT I THINK WE NEED TO SEE IN ORDER TO IMPROVE THE DEPARTMENT'S OPERATIONS AND PUBLICLY REPORT TO YOU HOW 17 18 IT'S DOING.

20 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. MR. RIDLEY-THOMAS?

21

SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: THANK YOU VERY MUCH MR. CHAIRMAN, AND TO MY COLLEAGUES AND THOSE WHO ARE GOING TO SPEAK ON THIS ITEM. I THINK THIS IS AN IMPORTANT OPPORTUNITY FOR VOICES TO BE HEARD. I WILL SAY QUICKLY IN RESPONSE TO THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S



REMARKS, HAD WE DEFERRED AS A BOARD THAT THE JUDGMENT OF A 1 PREVIOUS SHERIFF, YOU WOULDN'T HAVE YOUR JOB TODAY, SIR. THIS 2 3 IS A RESULT OF A SUSTAINED EFFORT TO BRING ABOUT ACCOUNTABILITY, OVERSIGHT, SUNSHINE, AND THE PROCESS. I WISH 4 5 IT TO BE UNDERSTOOD OR APPRECIATED THAT THE CONTINUING PUSH, THE CONTINUING DRIVE, THE CONCERN FOR THE BEST POSSIBLE 6 7 OUTCOMES IN TERMS OF CONSTITUTIONAL 21ST CENTURY EFFECTIVE LAW 8 ENFORCEMENT IN THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES IS WHAT IS AT STAKE 9 HERE IN TERMS OF A CIVILIAN COMMISSION. MR. CHAIRMAN AND COLLEAGUES, WE KNOW TODAY IS A VERY IMPORTANT MOMENT. WE KNOW 10 11 THAT MANY OF THE THINGS THAT ARE HAPPENING IN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS DEEPLY TROUBLING. WE KNOW THAT THERE ARE MANY, 12 MANY MEN AND WOMEN, THE VAST MAJORITY, WE MAINTAIN WHO DO 13 THEIR JOBS WELL AND THIS IS IN NO WAY TO BE INTERPRETED AS 14 ANYTHING THAT WOULD DISPARAGE THEIR EFFORTS OR THEIR MOTIVES. 15 16 IT IS ESSENTIALLY TO SAY THAT THIS IS ABOUT A SYSTEMIC MATTER, IT IS ABOUT STRUCTURAL REFORM. THE 21ST CENTURY BEST PRACTICES 17 18 SUGGEST AND INSIST THAT YOU HAVE AN INSPECTOR GENERAL AND A 19 COMMISSION. WE HAVE EFFECTIVELY ACCOMPLISHED A HALF LOAF. IT IS ESSENTIALLY THE TIME FOR US TO FILL THIS OUT AND GET 20 COMPLETE REFORM IN THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S 21 22 DEPARTMENT. THE CONTEXT, THE BACKGROUND IS VERY, VERY CLEAR. 23 WE TALK ABOUT THE STATE OF AFFAIRS IN OUR SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. THE CLAIM ABOUT EXCESSIVE USE OF FORCE. HOPEFULLY 24 BEING MANAGED. ABOUT THE TREATMENT OF MENTALLY ILL IN THE 25



JAILS. A HUGE ISSUE. THUS WE PUSH FOR DIVERSION. THE 1 ALLEGATIONS OF DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES IN THE ANTELOPE VALLEY 2 3 AS ANOTHER EXAMPLE. THIS IS THE FOCUS, THESE ARE THE FOCI OF THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE. AND THEN WE HAVE THE 4 5 ISSUE OF THE U.S. ATTORNEY WITH THE 18 DEPUTIES THAT WERE 6 INDICTED, LIEUTENANTS AND SERGEANTS FOR EXCESSIVE FORCE, 7 OBSTRUCTION OF JUSTICE AND OTHER CHARGES. AND TO DATE, SIX OF 8 THEM HAVE BEEN FOUND GUILTY. THEN LITIGATION COSTS FROM THE 9 LAST YEAR ALONE, SOME \$43 MILLION RELATED TO MATTERS INVOLVING THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. AND I SIMPLY WANT TO ASSERT THAT 10 11 THERE IS MUCH MORE THAT WE WILL LEARN IN THE COMING YEARS. AND I DON'T MEAN TO SUGGEST THAT EVERYTHING IS WRONG IN THE 12 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. THEY HAVE AN IMPORTANT JOB. IT'S OFTEN 13 DANGEROUS. YOU HEAR GUNSHOTS FIRING. AND IN MANY INSTANCES, 14 THE COMMON REACTION IS FOR PEOPLE TO RUN IN THE OPPOSITE 15 16 DIRECTION. THESE MEN AND WOMEN RUN TO THAT GUNFIRE TO TRY TO SAVE LIVES, PROTECT PEOPLE, RESTORE ORDER AND BRING ABOUT A 17 18 SEMBLANCE OF CIVILITY AND SAFETY IN THE CONTEXT WHERE IT IS 19 BROKEN DOWN. WE UNDERSTAND THAT. WE RESPECT THAT. THAT DOES NOT KEEP US FROM UNDERSTANDING AND KNOWING THAT THERE ARE 20 21 PROBLEMS THAT HAVE TO BE ADDRESSED. AND I THINK THAT IT'S THE 22 NEED FOR CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT IS NOT JUST ABOUT AN INDICTMENT 23 AGAINST OF SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AT ALL. THE PUBLIC PARTICIPATION EMBRACES LAW ENFORCEMENT. IT ESSENTIALLY 24 ADVANCES IT. IT CAUSES US TO HAVE A HIGHER LEVEL OF CONFIDENCE 25



IN OUR DEPARTMENT. IT IS IMPORTANT. AND IT'S NOT SIMPLY ABOUT 1 HAVING TEETH. IT IS ESSENTIALLY ABOUT HAVING A VOICE. THAT'S 2 WHAT THE CIVILIAN COMMISSION IS ABOUT. IT IS NOT ABOUT HAVING 3 TEETH. NO ONE IS TRYING TO BITE THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. WE 4 5 ESSENTIALLY ARGUED FOR ACCOUNTABILITY. AND WHILE I'M ON THAT POINT, THE OVERSIGHT COMMISSION WOULD NOT SUPERVISE THE 6 7 SHERIFF ALONE; IT WOULD HAVE ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES FOR THE 8 OFFICE OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL. IT'S NOT THAT THE INSPECTOR 9 GENERAL WOULD FLY ON HIS OR HER OWN WITHOUT A REPORTING STRUCTURE THAT WOULD MAKE SENSE AND BRING ABOUT THE 10 11 APPROPRIATE LEVEL OF ACCOUNTABILITY. AND SO I SIMPLY WANT TO SAY THAT WE CAN ARGUE THAT WE SHOULD WAIT FOR CIVILIAN 12 OVERSIGHT. THAT'S ESSENTIALLY AN APOLOGY REDUCED TO THE STATUS 13 QUO. I KNOW THAT THERE TAKES A CONSIDERABLE AMOUNT OF TIME. A 14 CONSIDERABLE AMOUNT OF TIME TO MOVE REFORM FORWARD. IT WOULD 15 16 SEEM TO ME THAT THIS BOARD CAN AND SHOULD EMBRACE IT NOT TOMORROW BUT NOW. NOT TOMORROW BUT TODAY. AND MOVE THE AGENDA 17 18 FORWARD IN A SIGNIFICANT MANNER. [APPLAUSE.] I THINK IF, IF 19 YOU WOULD, THE PEOPLE'S VOICE, THE COMMUNITY'S VOICE, THE PUBLIC'S VOICE IS IMPORTANT. TO BE SUPPORTIVE OF LAW 20 21 ENFORCEMENT, HAVE A HIGHER LEVEL OF PUBLIC CONFIDENCE, AND TO 22 MAKE SURE THAT ACCOUNTABILITY MEASURES ARE WHAT THEY SHOULD BE 23 AND CAN BE. AND THERE IS NO REASON FOR FURTHER DELAY, IN MY OPINION. AND I TRUST THAT WE CAN MOVE FORWARD TODAY, MR. 24 CHAIRMAN AND COLLEAGUES. 25



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3 SUP. MOLINA: THIS ISSUE OF A CITIZENS COMMISSION CERTAINLY HAS 4 5 BEEN ONE THAT IS IMPORTANT TO MANY OF US BECAUSE WE THINK IT WILL BRING ABOUT ACCOUNTABILITY. I REMEMBER WHEN I FIRST ASKED 6 7 THE QUESTION OF MR. DROOYAN AS TO WHY THE COMMISSION DID NOT 8 SUPPORT A COMMISSION OF THIS TYPE, AND THERE WERE ISSUES ABOUT 9 THE LEGALITY OF IT, WHICH IS A KEY STUMBLING BLOCK. AND CERTAINLY THE ISSUE OF HOW TO GET AT ACCESS AND INFORMATION 10 11 AND HOW TO MAKE IT WORK AND FUNCTION IN THE LIGHT OF DAY, WHICH IS AN IMPORTANT PART. SO WE TOOK THAT TO HEART. AND WE 12 DID ACCEPT THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE COMMISSION TO PUT IN AN 13 OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL, WHICH WE HAVE TODAY. I THINK 14 15 THAT, AGAIN, I SUPPORTED THE COMMISSION BECAUSE I DID WANT IT TO BITE, TO BRING ABOUT ACCOUNTABILITY. WHAT'S SAD ABOUT IT IS 16 EVEN IF IT WERE PASSED TODAY, IT COULD NOT BE IMPLEMENTED 17 18 UNTIL STATE LAW IS CHANGED. SO I THINK WE HAVE TO BE CAREFUL 19 ABOUT WHAT WE DO. I KNOW I'M INTERESTED IN IT. AND SO WOULD CONSIDER TO PURSUE IT IN THE ORIGINAL MOTION THAT I HAD BEEN A 20 PART OF COAUTHORING. WHAT CONCERNS ME TODAY IS THE FACT THAT 21 22 WE DO HAVE TEETH. WE HAVE AN O.I.R. WHO HASN'T GOTTEN STARTED. 23 THE ONLY THING WE'RE DOING IS WASTING OUR TIME TRYING TO FIGURE OUT WHAT YOUR BUDGET IS. INSTEAD, ACCESS IS NOT THE 24 ONLY ISSUE. ACCESS WAS DISCUSSED HERE SIX MONTHS AGO WHEN I AS 25

SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. SUPERVISOR MOLINA?



A SUPERVISOR COULD NOT GET ACCESS TO A WRITTEN REPORT BY THE 1 SHERIFF. THAT'S WHEN WE SHOULD HAVE BEEN DECIDING THIS ISSUE, 2 3 SIX MONTHS AGO. WE SHOULDN'T BE WAITING FOR TODAY. BUT AS YOU CAN SEE, YOU NOW HAVE IT. THIS BOARD IS WILLING TO SUPPORT IT. 4 5 BUT THE REALITY IS: YOU HAVE TO GET YOUR MISSION STARTED. THAT'S THE KEY. YOU'VE BEEN ON FOR A LONG TIME. AND THE 6 7 MISSION IS NOT CLEAR. YOU DON'T JUST NEED ACCESS. YOU NEED TO 8 START BRINGING ACCOUNTABILITY. THERE ARE OVER 3,000 REPORTS 9 THAT YOU COULD REVIEW TODAY. AT LEAST 8 IN THE LAST YEAR ALONE. YOU COULD, FROM THAT, DECIDE WHETHER IN FACT THERE IS 10 11 ACCOUNTABILITY OR NOT. IT DOESN'T HAVE TO BE IN THE PRESENT TENSE. IT COULD BE IN THOSE REPORTS WHICH ARE COMPLETED, WHICH 12 YOU DO HAVE ACCESS. AND I THINK IF YOU START LOOKING AT THOSE 13 REPORTS, YOU WILL SEE THAT THERE IS NOT ACCOUNTABILITY. I HAVE 14 15 BEEN CONCERNED AS I HAVE READ SOME OF THOSE REPORTS: THEY ARE 16 SLOPPY. THEY ARE NOT WELL DONE. THERE IS NO ACCOUNTABILITY. IT IS CLEARLY A PATHWAY TO COVER UP SOME OF THE ISSUES. AND THEY 17 18 EMBARRASS ME. I'M NOT THE ONLY ONE THAT'S EMBARRASSED BY THOSE 19 REPORTS IF YOU READ THEM. I THINK THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE IS EMBARRASSED, AS WELL. NO ONE WANTS TO JUST PLAY GOTCHA WITH 20 THE SHERIFF. THEY HAVE A TOUGH JOB TO DO EVERY SINGLE DAY. AND 21 22 THEIR LIVES ARE IN DANGER EVERY SINGLE DAY. THOSE SAME COPS 23 THAT DON'T KNOW HOW TO FOLLOW POLICY, DON'T KNOW HOW TO FOLLOW LAW, DON'T SEEM TO RESPECT THE CIVIL RIGHTS OF INDIVIDUALS IN 24 25 OUR COMMUNITY NEED TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE. THEY MAKE ALL



SHERIFF'S DEPUTIES LOOK BAD. AND I THINK EVERYONE WOULD AGREE 1 WITH THAT. SO I THINK THE O.I.G. HAS TO GET TO WORK. WE 2 3 HAVEN'T HAD ONE PUBLIC REPORT. THERE HAS BEEN NO TRANSPARENCY IN ANY ACTIONS WHATSOEVER. SUPPOSEDLY YOU HAVE A COUPLE OF 4 5 PEOPLE WORKING ON THINGS. THERE'S PLENTY OF THINGS TO DO. DON'T WAIT FOR ACCESS. YOU WANT TONS OF PEOPLE ON YOUR BUDGET. 6 7 GET THEM TO WORK ON THE BASICS. REFORM COMMITTEE GAVE US A 8 SERIES OF RECOMMENDATIONS THAT NEEDED TO BE IMPLEMENTED. SOME 9 ARE, SOME ARE NOT. BUT THEY'RE GOING TO REOUIRE MONITORING ALL OF THE TIME. WE'VE NOT EVEN SEEN SUCH A REPORT. I AM 10 11 CONCERNED. I DON'T WANT AN O.I.R. OR O.I.G. WITHOUT TEETH, EITHER. WE NEED TO GET TO WORK AND START BITING SOME PEOPLE IN 12 ORDER TO GET THE JOB DONE. WE NEED TO SEE HOW YOU'RE DOING AND 13 HOW THIS WORK IS GETTING DONE, NOT JUST HOW YOUR PEOPLE ARE 14 15 BEING PAID AND WHAT CLASSIFICATION THEY HAVE. I'D LIKE A 16 BETTER MISSION DETERMINED. I'D LIKE A PRESENTATION OF WHEN WE'RE GOING TO GET SOME PUBLIC HEARINGS. I'D LIKE TO GET A 17 18 BETTER UNDERSTAND OF WHAT YOUR 60-DAY PLAN IS, YOUR ONE-YEAR 19 PLAN IS. WE'VE GOT TO GET TO WORK. I UNDERSTAND THE FRUSTRATION OF SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS AND FROM MANY 20 PEOPLE IN OUR OWN COMMUNITIES BECAUSE WE CAN'T GET THAT 21 22 INFORMATION. WE CAN'T BRING ACCOUNTABILITY. WE WANT TO FUND 23 THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. WE WANT TO TAKE PRIDE IN EVERY SINGLE ONE OF OUR DEPUTIES. BUT LET'S FACE IT: IT ISN'T JUST 24 THE INDICTMENTS THAT TOLD US THERE WAS SOMETHING WRONG IN THE 25



SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. WE HAD THREE TO FOUR YEARS OF MAJOR 1 OUTCOMES JUST BY LAWSUITS ALONE WITH WHAT THE A.C.L.U. HAS 2 3 PRESENTED US. WHAT THE COMMISSION HAS TOLD US. WE NOW NEED TO GET TO WORK. THERE IS NOTHING THAT IS STOPPING US TODAY 4 5 GETTING TO THE BASICS OF WHO, WHAT, WHY, WHERE, HOW AND WHEN. AND WHEN WE HAVE DEPUTIES THAT DON'T KNOW HOW TO FOLLOW POLICY 6 7 AND A GOOD EXAMPLE I POINTED OUT TO YOU ABOUT FIVE MONTHS AGO, 8 WHEN YOU HAVE DEPUTIES WHO REFUSE TO WEAR A SEAT BELT FOR 9 WHATEVER REASON, AND IF THEY THINK THEY'RE ABOVE THE LAW, THEN THEY NEED TO MARCH TO SACRAMENTO AND CHANGE THE LAW. BUT UNTIL 10 11 THAT HAPPENS, THEY NEED TO FIND A WAY TO BRING ACCOUNTABILITY. YOU SAID TO ME, HOW CAN IT BE DONE? I OUTLINED HOW IT COULD BE 12 DONE. THEY NEED TO KNOW THAT FOLLOWING THE LAW, AS MINOR AS 13 THAT MIGHT BE, IS AS SIGNIFICANT AS FOLLOWING POLICY AND 14 PROTECTING THE RIGHTS OF INDIVIDUALS WHEN THEY'RE OUT THERE 15 16 EVERY SINGLE DAY. WE KNOW THEY'RE IN DANGER. IT IS OUR RESPONSIBILITY TO INDEMNIFY THEM EVERY SINGLE DAY, TO ASSURE 17 18 THEM OF PROTECTION, TO LET THEM KNOW THEY CAN GO TO THEIR JOB 19 AND THEY'RE GOING TO HAVE THE MAXIMUM OF PROTECTION FROM US. BUT I DO NOT WANT TO PROTECT A BAD COP. I DO NOT WANT TO 20 PROTECT A CORRUPT COP HAVE I DON'T WANT TO PROTECT A 21 22 MANAGEMENT SYSTEM THAT COVERS UP FORBAD COPS. WE NEED A SYSTEM 23 WITH INTEGRITY. AND YOU'RE THE PERSON TODAY WHO CAN DELIVER IT. AND I SAY GET TO WORK. [APPLAUSE.] 24

KNABE, CHAIRMAN: ANOTHER LAYER. 12 13 RICHARD E. DROOYAN: AND THE INSPECTOR GENERAL. YOU LOSE THE 14 ABILITY TO REALLY MONITOR WHAT HE'S DOING AND WHETHER IT MEETS 15 16 THIS BOARD'S EXPECTATIONS. 17 18 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: OF COURSE WITH THE 950,000 OTHER THINGS 19 THAT WE HAVE TO DO THAT WE CAN'T SUSTAIN ATTENTION ON AS IT IS. THAT'S ONE OF THE COMPELLING ARGUMENTS IS THE PRACTICAL 20 CONSIDERATION. WE CANNOT PAY ENOUGH ATTENTION TO THE SHERIFF'S 21 22 DEPARTMENT, THE I.G.R. OR THE SHERIFF HIMSELF. THAT'S WHY WE 23 NEED HELP. AND THAT'S WHY THERE ARE COMMISSIONS ALL OVER THE NATION. AND SO IT SHOCKS ME, FRANKLY, THAT YOU WOULD ARGUE 24 OTHERWISE. IT IS VERY PRACTICAL. IT IS NOT IDEOLOGICAL WHETHER 25



WE WANT ACCOUNTABILITY OR NOT. ACCOUNTABILITY CAN BE REDUCED
 TO AN ABSTRACTION.

RICHARD E. DROOYAN: I AGREE WITH YOU. IT'S NOT AN IDEOLOGICAL 4 5 ISSUE BECAUSE I THINK WE ALL AGREE FOR THE NEED OF CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. I THINK IT'S JUST A QUESTION WHAT'S THE BEST 6 7 FORMAT? WHAT'S THE BEST FORMAT IN THE NEXT YEAR? TAKING INTO 8 ACCOUNT THE POLITICAL STRUCTURE THAT WE HAVE IN THE COUNTY. I 9 WOULD BE VERY SUPPORTIVE OF STATE LEGISLATION THAT PROVIDED FOR A COMMISSION THAT HAD REAL POWER, REAL OVERSIGHT OVER LAW 10 11 ENFORCEMENT. BUT THAT'S A BIG STEP. AND THAT'S A REAL WAYS AWAY TO HAVE THAT. IN THE INTERIM, THE OUESTION IS ARE WE 12 GOING TO HAVE A COMMISSION THAT REALLY HAS NO AUTHORITY, THAT 13 PUTS ITSELF BETWEEN THIS BOARD AND THE INSPECTOR GENERAL? AND 14 I THINK ULTIMATELY MAKES IT MUCH MORE DIFFICULT FOR THIS BOARD 15 16 TO DETERMINE WHETHER OR NOT THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE IS MEETING EXPECTATIONS. I UNDERSTAND THE MANY OBLIGATIONS AND 17 RESPONSIBILITIES THAT THIS BOARD HAS. BUT THERE IS NO COUNTY 18 19 INSTITUTION THAT HAS MORE AUTHORITY, MORAL AUTHORITY, POLITICAL AUTHORITY OR POWER THAN THIS BOARD. THE REASON WHY 20 WE HAVE THE SIGNIFICANT REFORMS AND CHANGES IN THE SHERIFF'S 21 22 DEPARTMENT TODAY IS BECAUSE 2-1/2 YEARS AGO THIS BOARD SAID 23 WE'VE GOT TO DO SOMETHING. IT APPOINTED A CIVILIAN COMMISSION, A JAIL COMMISSION FOR A SPECIFIC DUTY, RESPONSIBILITY, 24



INVESTIGATION, AND I THINK THE RESULT OF THAT IS A SIGNIFICANT 1 2 CHANGE. WE NOW HAVE AN INSPECTOR GENERAL. 3 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: CORRECT. AND IT DID NOT TAKE A STATE LAW 4 5 TO DO IT. IT TOOK LEADERSHIP. IT TOOK INITIATIVE. AND THAT'S ESSENTIALLY WHAT'S IN PLAY HERE. 6 7 8 RICHARD E. DROOYAN: AND I AGREE. AND IT WAS THIS BOARD'S 9 LEADERSHIP. 10 11 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: EXACTLY. AND IT'S THIS BOARD'S LEADERSHIP THAT CAN PUT A CIVILIAN BODY IN PLACE THAT WOULD BE 12 ACCOUNTABLE IN A WAY THAT WOULD SUSTAIN ITSELF RATHER THAN THE 13 EPISODIC TREATMENT THAT THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WILL GET FROM 14 THE BOARD OWING TO THE FACT THAT WE ARE INUNDATED WITH OTHER 15 16 RESPONSIBILITIES. IN OTHER WORDS, I WOULD ASSERT THIS BOARD NEEDS HELP. AND IF WE APPOINT THE RIGHT PEOPLE, JUST AS WE DID 17 18 WITH THE JAIL VIOLENCE COMMITTEE WE WILL GET HELP. OUALITY 19 HELP. AND THAT'S WHAT THIS REDUCES ITSELF TO. IT'S NOT ABOUT A DEBATE ABOUT STATE LAW. IT'S ESSENTIALLY ABOUT LEADERSHIP AND 20 21 ACCOUNTABILITY AND LAW ENFORCEMENT IN THE COUNTY OF LOS 22 ANGELES.

24 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: BUT IT IS A DEBATE ABOUT DIFFERENCE OF25 OPINION OF THIS BOARD, OKAY?



1 2 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: I SPEAK FOR ONE MEMBER, MR. CHAIR. 3 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: I UNDERSTAND THAT. SO, MR. YAROSLAVSKY? 4 5 SUP YAROSLAVSKY: MR. CHAIRMAN, MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, I WANTED 6 7 TO MAKE A THOUGHTFUL STATEMENT ABOUT THIS SUBJECT BECAUSE I DO 8 THINK IT REQUIRES CONTEXT AND THOUGHTFULNESS. INSURING 9 CONSTITUTIONAL POLICING AND THE ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY THAT PROMOTES IT HAS LONG BEEN ONE OF OUR 10 11 SOCIETY'S AND ESPECIALLY LOS ANGELES'S MOST DIFFICULT CHALLENGES. LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES WHICH HAVE THE 12 EXTRAORDINARY POWER TO TAKE AWAY OUR FREEDOMS AND USE DEADLY 13 FORCE, TO COLLECT INFORMATION ON PRIVATE CITIZENS MUST BE HELD 14 TO THE STRICTEST STANDARDS OF THE LAW. EACH OF US SERVING IN 15 16 PUBLIC OFFICE TAKES AN OATH TO UPHOLD THE CONSTITUTIONS OF THE UNITED STATES AND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA. 17 18 FOR ME THAT OATH HAS BEEN VERY PERSONAL AND HAS A VERY 19 PERSONAL MEANING BECAUSE MANY YEARS AGO BEFORE I WAS EVER ELECTED TO OFFICE MY RIGHTS AS A PRIVATE CITIZEN WERE VIOLATED 20 21 BY A LOCAL POLICE AGENCY. AS AN ELECTED OFFICIAL, I SPILLED 22 CONSIDERABLE POLITICAL BLOOD EVEN AS OTHERS WERE SPILLING REAL 23 BLOOD WHEN I TOOK ON SUCH POLICE ABUSES AS EXCESSIVE FORCE, BAD SHOOTINGS, RECKLESS USE OF CHOKEHOLDS AND ILLEGAL SPYING 24 ON LAW-ABIDING CITIZENS BY OUR LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES. 25



TODAY'S UPHEAVAL IN THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S 1 DEPARTMENT IS ONLY THE LATEST IN A SERIES OF CRISIS THAT HAVE 2 3 ENGULFED OUR LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES OVER THE YEARS. WHEN JAIL VIOLENCE AND OTHER MISCONDUCT ISSUES SHOOK THE 4 5 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT THIS BOARD ON A MOTION I AUTHORED ALONG WITH SUPERVISOR MARK RIDLEY-THOMAS, ESTABLISHED THE CITIZENS 6 7 COMMISSION ON JAIL VIOLENCE TO RECOMMEND STEPS TO REVERSE THE 8 DEPARTMENT'S SLIDE INTO SCANDAL. THE COMMISSION PRODUCED A 9 HARD HITTING REPORT ABOUT WHAT ITS ESTEEMED MEMBERS CONCLUDED WAS NECESSARY TO HOLD THE SHERIFF'S OFFICE ACCOUNTABLE FOR HOW 10 11 IT POLICES OUR JAILS AND BY EXTENSION OUR COMMUNITIES. OUR BOARD UNANIMOUSLY APPROVED EACH AND EVERY ONE OF THOSE 12 REFORMS, MOST OF WHICH HAVE BEEN IMPLEMENTED, SOME OF WHICH 13 REMAIN WORKS IN PROGRESS. TODAY'S DISCUSSION FOCUSES ON THIS 14 VERY OUESTION: WHAT IS THE MOST EFFECTIVE WAY TO ENSURE THAT 15 16 THE DEPARTMENT STRICTLY ADHERES TO ITS CONSTITUTIONAL MANDATE WHILE CONDUCTING ITSELF WITH AS MUCH TRANSPARENCY AS POSSIBLE 17 18 TO RESTORE PUBLIC CONFIDENCE. THE PROBLEM WITH THE SHERIFF'S 19 DEPARTMENT IS NOT THAT THERE IS TOO LITTLE OVERSIGHT. THE PROBLEM IS THERE HAS BEEN TOO LITTLE EFFECTIVE OVERSIGHT. 20 21 SINCE 1959, BEFORE THE NOW NOTORIOUS MEN'S CENTRAL JAIL WAS 22 EVEN OPENED, THE COUNTY'S SYBIL BRAND INSTITUTIONAL COMMISSION 23 WAS CHARGED WITH MONITORING OUR JAILS. AFTER THE 1992 KOLTS REPORT WHICH FOCUSED ON EXCESSIVE FORCE, COMMUNITY RELATIONS 24 AND CITIZENS COMPLAINTS, THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS HIRED 25



SPECIAL COUNSEL MERRICK BOBB TO TRACK THESE ISSUES AND PRODUCE 1 SEMIANNUAL REPORTS. THE BOARD ALSO CREATED AN OFFICE OF 2 3 OMBUDSMAN TO HEAR AND VET CITIZEN AND INMATE COMPLAINTS. LATER, THE BOARD ENGAGED THE AMERICAN CIVIL LIBERTIES UNION AS 4 5 AN INDEPENDENT JAIL MONITOR, SO INDEPENDENT THAT THE A.C.L.U. WOULD SUE US ON THE VERY CONDUCT THEY WERE MONITORING ON OUR 6 7 BEHALF. LATER STILL WE CREATED THE OFFICE, AN OFFICE OF 8 INDEPENDENT REVIEW, A GROUP OF ATTORNEYS OPERATING WITHIN THE 9 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT TO PROVIDE A SECOND SET OF EYES TO THE DEPARTMENT'S INTERNAL INVESTIGATIONS OF ALLEGED POTENTIAL 10 11 MISCONDUCT. AND ON TOP OF ALL THIS, THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE HAS BEEN LOOKING OVER OUR SHOULDER FOR 12 YEARS NOW ON A VARIETY OF MATTERS, INCLUDING WHETHER THE 13 DEPARTMENT IS MEETING ITS OBLIGATIONS UNDER A MEMORANDUM OF 14 AGREEMENT IN ITS TREATMENT OF MENTALLY ILL INMATES. DESPITE 15 16 ALL OF THESE OVERSIGHT EFFORTS, THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WENT INTO A TAILSPIN THAT INCLUDED THE FAILED ADMINISTRATION OF OUR 17 18 JAILS, VIOLENCE PERPETRATED AGAINST SOME OF OUR INMATES AND 19 JAIL VISITORS AND THE LACK OF ADEQUATE AND EFFECTIVE TREATMENT OF INMATES WITH MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES. ALL WITH THE OVERHANG OF 20 LACK OF TRANSPARENCY. THIS IS NOT TO MENTION PROBLEMS 21 22 ELSEWHERE IN THE DEPARTMENT THAT MADE IT A POSTER CHILD FOR 23 HOW NOT TO CARRY OUT ITS CONSTITUTIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES. IT WAS IN RESPONSE TO THIS MELTDOWN THAT I PROPOSED AND THE BOARD 24 SUPPORTED UNANIMOUSLY A COMMISSION ON JAIL VIOLENCE WHICH 25



WE'VE HEARD A LITTLE ABOUT ALREADY THIS MORNING. AFTER NEARLY 1 A YEAR OF DEDICATED WORK UNDER THE LEADERSHIP OF SOME OF 2 3 L.A.'S MOST RESPECTED JURISTS, EXPERTS AND COMMUNITY LEADERS, THE PANEL URGED ENACTMENT OF MORE THAN 60 REFORMS. THE 4 5 CENTERPIECE WAS THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NEW, FULL-TIME OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL THAT WOULD BE INDEPENDENT OF THE 6 7 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, ANSWERING DIRECTLY TO THE BOARD OF 8 SUPERVISORS WITH ITS OWN STAFF, BUDGET AND BROAD INVESTIGATIVE 9 AUTHORITY INCLUDING UNFETTERED ACCESS TO THE DEPARTMENT'S RECORDS. THOSE RECOMMENDATIONS DID NOT INCLUDE THE CREATION OF 10 11 A SHERIFF'S OVERSIGHT COMMISSION LIKE THE ONE NOW BEING PROPOSED. IN FACT, THE CITIZENS COMMISSION ON JAIL VIOLENCE 12 CONCLUDED IN ITS FINAL REPORT, AND I QUOTE, "WHILE THE 13 COMMISSION CONSIDERED A CIVILIAN COMMISSION COMPRISED OF 14 15 COMMUNITY LEADERS AS AN ADDITIONAL OVERSIGHT BODY, SUCH A 16 COMMISSION IS NOT NECESSARY IF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS CONTINUES TO PUT A SPOTLIGHT ON CONDITIONS IN THE JAILS AND 17 18 ESTABLISHES A WELL STRUCTURED AND ADEOUATELY STAFFED OFFICE OF 19 INSPECTOR GENERAL". THE INK WAS BARELY DRY ON THIS HISTORIC REPORT BEFORE THE BOARD WAS ASKED TO CONSIDER THE CREATION OF 20 21 A SHERIFF'S OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. AND I RESPECT THE REQUEST 22 AND I RESPECT SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS'S COMMITMENT TO THIS 23 ISSUE. A YEAR LATER, BEFORE THE BOARD HAD EVEN APPOINTED AN INSPECTOR GENERAL, A SECOND MOTION WAS PROPOSED CALLING AGAIN 24 25 FOR THE CREATION OF AN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. AND NOW JUST AS



WE ARE PREPARING TO FORMALLY ESTABLISH THE OFFICE OF INSPECTOR 1 GENERAL, WHICH BY THE WAY WE HAVE NOT YET DONE, IT'S ON THE 2 3 AGENDA TODAY. WE THOUGHT WE APPROVED IT BUT IT WAS REAPPROVED FOR FURTHER DISCUSSION. I THOUGHT WE COULD DO IT TODAY. BUT WE 4 5 ONCE AGAIN ARE BEING TOLD THAT ONLY THE SHERIFF'S OVERSIGHT COMMISSION CAN DO THE JOB. I UNDERSTAND THE DEEP AND LONG-HELD 6 7 FRUSTRATIONS THAT HAVE DEALT WITH THIS PROPOSAL. NOBODY SHARES 8 THOSE FRUSTRATIONS MORE THAN I DO AND MEMBERS OF THIS BOARD 9 DO. I SHARE THEM DEEPLY, LONG BEFORE THE SCANDAL OVER BRUTALITY IN THE JAILS ERUPTED. RESIDENTS IN SOME 10 11 NEIGHBORHOODS COMPLAINED OF HEAVY HANDED TACTICS BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. IN RECENT DAYS WE HAVE ALL HEARD FROM 12 MANY PEOPLE WHO SUPPORT THE IDEA OF AN OVERSIGHT PANEL. MANY 13 14 OF YOU WERE HERE IN THE AUDIENCE. AND I APPLAUD YOU, QUIETLY, FOR YOUR ACTIVE ENGAGEMENT IN AN ISSUE OF SUCH CRITICAL 15 16 IMPORTANCE. BUT I BELIEVE IT IS NECESSARY AT THIS MOMENT OF UNDERSTANDABLY HIGH EMOTIONS TO PROVIDE STRAIGHT TALK ABOUT 17 18 WHAT I SEE AS THE SUREST WAY TO REACH OUR GOAL OF RIGHTING THE 19 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FOR TODAY AND FOR THE FUTURE. SOME MIGHT ASK: WHAT'S THE HARM IN A COMMISSION? ISN'T TOO MUCH OVERSIGHT 20 BETTER THAN TOO LITTLE? THAT'S BEEN PRECISELY THE PROBLEM. NOT 21 22 TOO MUCH OVERSIGHT; TOO MUCH INADEQUATE, INEFFECTIVE, AND 23 DUPLICATIVE OVERSIGHT. SOMEHOW WITH THE MANY MONITORING EFFORTS LAUNCHED OVER THE YEARS, PROBLEMS WERE OVERLOOKED, 24 25 IGNORED AND NEVER ADDRESSED. IN MY JUDGMENT, THE AMBIGUOUS



ROLES OF THESE VARIOUS OVERSIGHT STRUCTURES CONTRIBUTED TO THE 1 LACK OF FOCUS AND DECISIVENESS IN ADDRESSING THE DEPARTMENT'S 2 3 PROBLEMS WHICH HAVE NOW BECOME A NATIONAL EMBARRASSMENT. SIMPLY PUT, WHEN EVERYONE IS IN CHARGE, NO ONE IS IN CHARGE. 4 5 THAT'S WHY THE CITIZEN'S COMMISSION ON JAIL VIOLENCE URGED THE 6 COMMISSION OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, AN AGENCY WITH 7 AUTHORITY, RESOURCES AND A SINGLE MINDED DEDICATION TO OUR 8 COLLECTIVE MISSION OF RESTORING CONSTITUTIONAL POLICING TO OUR 9 COUNTY. TODAY MORE THAN SEVEN MONTHS AFTER WE APPOINTED THE INSPECTOR GENERAL, SEVEN MONTHS, WE FINALLY HAVE BEFORE US ON 10 11 OUR AGENDA STAFFING THE ORGANIZATIONAL PLAN FOR HIS OFFICE. IN ADDITION TO PROVIDING RIGOROUS OVERSIGHT OF THE DEPARTMENT, 12 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, THIS MANDATE INCLUDES REACHING OUT TO 13 THE PUBLIC THROUGH TOWN HALL MEETINGS AND OTHER VEHICLES TO 14 HEAR COMPLAINTS AND INVESTIGATE. THE CITIZEN'S COMMISSION ON 15 16 JAIL VIOLENCE, THE ACTING SHERIFF, THE COUNTY C.E.O. AND OUR OWN INSPECTOR GENERAL ALL AGREE -- AND OUR OWN MONITOR ALL 17 18 AGREE THAT THE FIRST PRIORITY MUST BE TO GET THIS NEW OFFICE 19 FULLY OPERATIONAL BEFORE CONTEMPLATING ANY ADDITIONAL OVERSIGHT STRUCTURES. THESE ARE THE INDISPUTABLE FACTS. THE 20 21 PROPOSED SHERIFF'S OVERSIGHT COMMISSION WOULD HAVE NO REAL 22 POWER. NO LEGAL INVESTIGATIVE AUTHORITY. ONLY LIMITED ACCESS 23 TO SENSITIVE DEPARTMENT MATERIALS, IF ANY. AND NO MEANINGFUL WAY TO IMPLEMENT ANY RECOMMENDATIONS IT MIGHT MAKE. THE STATE 24 CONSTITUTION GRANTS GREAT POWER TO THE SHERIFF. AND HE IS NOT 25



SUBORDINATE TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. AND THIS BOARD CANNOT 1 DELEGATE POWERS TO A COMMISSION THAT THE BOARD ITSELF DOES NOT 2 3 POSSESS. FINALLY, LOOMING AHEAD OF US THERE'S A POTENTIAL FOR OVERSIGHT BEYOND THE INSPECTOR GENERAL WITH VERY REAL AND 4 5 SHARP TEETH: THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE HAS BEEN INVESTIGATING KEY AREAS OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FOR A 6 7 NUMBER OF YEARS. AND WHILE IT HAS NOTED SOME PROGRESS TOWARD 8 REFORM, IT RECENTLY WARNED OF SERIOUS DEFICIENCIES. IT IS 9 BECOMING ABUNDANTLY CLEAR THAT THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT WILL COMPEL THE DEPARTMENT, THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT AND THIS 10 11 COUNTY TO BE ACCOUNTABLE FOR CONSTITUTIONAL POLICING EITHER THROUGH A CONSENT DECREE OR A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT, ALL 12 UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF A FEDERAL JUDGE. WE MUST PERMIT THE 13 INSPECTOR GENERAL, THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT AND THIS BOARD TO 14 15 IMPLEMENT THE SYSTEM OF ACCOUNTABILITY RECOMMENDED BY THE JAIL 16 VIOLENCE COMMISSION NEARLY TWO YEARS AGO. CREATING ANY ADDITIONAL STRUCTURE AT THIS POINT WOULD BE COUNTERPRODUCTIVE. 17 18 THESE ENTITIES WORKING IN TANDEM OFFER THE BEST CHANCE OF 19 ESTABLISHING THE KIND OF ACCOUNTABILITY AND TRANSPARENCY THAT WE ALL WANT AND DESPERATELY NEED. IF THIS SYSTEM FALLS SHORT, 20 21 THEN OUR BOARD CAN RE-ASSESS ANY NUMBER OF ALTERNATIVES, 22 INCLUDING LEGISLATIVE CHANGES AT THE STATE AND COUNTY LEVELS 23 THAT WOULD ALLOW FOR AN OVERSIGHT BODY WITH REAL AUTHORITY OVER THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. FRANKLY, I SAID A YEAR AGO, I 24 SAY IT AGAIN TODAY, IT SHOULD BE PART OF OUR LEGISLATIVE 25



PROGRAM TO BEGIN SEEKING THOSE KINDS OF LEGISLATIVE CHANGES IN 1 CASE WE WANT IT OR THE NEXT BOARD WANTS TO USE THEM. THIS MUCH 2 3 I KNOW FOR SURE: THE COMMISSION WE'RE BEING ASKED TO CREATE TODAY WOULD BE UNABLE TO LIVE UP TO OUR HIGHEST AND RIGHTFUL 4 5 EXPECTATIONS. AND IT'S GIVING PEOPLE FALSE EXPECTATIONS. THE LAST THING I WOULD THINK THIS BOARD NEEDS TO DO IS TO RAISE 6 7 PEOPLE'S EXPECTATIONS AND THEN FALL SHORT. WE HAVE A PLAN 8 PROVIDED BY THE JAIL VIOLENCE COMMISSION. AS THE OLD NAVY 9 PILOT ONCE TOLD ME, "YOU PLAN THE FLIGHT, AND THEN YOU FLY THE PLAN." LET'S FLY THIS PLAN. LET'S GET MAX HUNTSMAN GOING. YOU 10 11 ASKED FOR A YEAR; I WOULD SAY SIX MONTHS TO A YEAR. SEE HOW THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE, WORKING WITH THE BOARD, 12 PRODUCES. I BELIEVE YOU'LL LIVE UP TO OUR EXPECTATIONS. LAST 13 THING I WANT TO SAY IS THIS THING ABOUT THE BOARD DOESN'T HAVE 14 TIME. THE BOARD NEEDS TO MAKE TIME. THERE IS NO MORE IMPORTANT 15 16 ISSUE THAT WE FACE THAN THIS ISSUE AND THE ISSUE OF CHILD SAFETY. WE NEED TO MAKE TIME. THERE WAS A TIME WHEN THIS BOARD 17 18 MET TWICE A WEEK. THERE WAS A TIME WHEN THE BOARD MET EVERY 19 TUESDAY AND ONCE EVERY OTHER THURSDAY. THERE'S NO REASON WHY THIS BOARD NEEDS TO MEET JUST ONCE A WEEK. IF WE HAVE A 20 21 CRISIS, WE OUGHT TO MEET AND MAKE IT OUR BUSINESS, PUT THIS AT 22 THE TOP OF OUR AGENDA, PUT IT HIGH ON OUR RADAR SCREEN. SAYING 23 THAT THE BOARD DOESN'T HAVE TIME IS NO EXCUSE. AT THE END OF THE DAY, IT'S THE FIVE MEMBERS OF THIS BOARD WHO ARE HELD 24 ACCOUNTABLE BY THE PUBLIC. YOU HAVE ONLY SIX PEOPLE YOU CAN 25



HOLD ACCOUNTABLE FOR WHAT'S GOING ON IN THE SHERIFF'S 1 DEPARTMENT THROUGH THE BALLOT BOX: THE SHERIFF AND THE FIVE 2 3 SUPERVISORS. AND I THINK FOR ME TO GO TO MY CONSTITUENTS AND SAY "I'M SORRY, I DON'T HAVE THE TIME TO SPEND ON THE MOST 4 5 IMPORTANT ISSUE FACING THIS COUNTY", IT JUST DOESN'T CUT IT WITH MY CONSTITUENTS. I DON'T THINK IT CUTS IT WITH ANYBODY 6 7 ELSE'S. IF WE HAVEN'T DEVOTED ENOUGH TIME TO IT, PERHAPS WE 8 HAVEN'T, CERTAINLY WE HADN'T IN PRIOR YEARS, THEN LET'S SPEND 9 THE TIME NOW GOING FORWARD. THE INSPECTOR GENERAL NEEDS TO ACCOUNT TO US. THAT'S WHAT YOUR COMMISSION DEVELOPED. THOSE 10 ARE THE STRICTURES YOU PROPOSED. 11 12

13 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: SOMEHOW SUPERVISOR YAROSLAVSKY'S MIC WENT
14 OFF.

16 SUP. YAROSLAVSKY: THERE WE GO.

THEN WE'LL BE SPENDING TIME 15 16 REFEREEING NOT BETWEEN YOU AND THE SHERIFF BUT BETWEEN YOU AND THE OVERSIGHT COMMISSION, THE BOARD AND EVERYBODY ELSE. THE 17 18 TIME IS NOW TO LET YOU DO YOUR JOB. I THINK THE TIME IS NOW 19 FOR US TO LOOK AND WE HAVE A REPORT FROM THE COUNTY COUNSEL SOME MONTHS AGO. IT'S A ROAD MAP OF THE LEGISLATION WE NEED 20 21 BOTH STATEWIDE AND CHARTER CHANGES THAT WOULD GIVE US THE 22 AUTHORITY TO CREATE A MEANINGFUL OVERSIGHT COMMISSION IF THE 23 BOARD SO CHOSE. BUT THE JOB WE HAVE TO DO NOW IS GIVE THE INSPECTOR GENERAL HIS MARCHING ORDERS AND THEN YOU NEED TO GO 24 25 MARCH.

PATRISSE CULLORS: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS PATRISSE CULLORS. 10 11 I'M FOUNDER AND EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF DIGNITY AND POWER NOW AND THE COALITION TO END SHERIFF VIOLENCE IN L.A. JAILS. OUR 12 COALITION HAS BEEN DEMANDING THAT THIS BOARD CREATE PERMANENT 13 CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FOR THE LAST 14 TWO YEARS. SOME OF YOU ARGUE THAT THE OVERSIGHT BODY WOULD BE 15 16 INEFFECTIVE IF IT DOES NOT HAVE LEGAL POWERS. WE SAY THREE 17 THINGS ON THIS. ONE, THE COALITION WILL FIGHT FOR THE 18 OVERSIGHT BODY TO HAVE LEGAL POWERS EVENTUALLY. TWO, THE BOARD 19 IF WORRIED ABOUT LEGAL POWERS SHOULD GO AND SUPPORT THE COMMUNITY IN LOBBYING FOR LEGAL POWERS. AND, THREE, A BOARD, 20 21 EVEN IF ADVISORY, CAN WORK WITH THE INSPECTOR GENERAL TO 22 PROVIDE THE COMMUNITY AN AVENUE TO MAKE COMPLAINTS, KEEP A 23 SPOTLIGHT ON THE DEPARTMENT AND TO HOST AND ENGAGE PUBLIC FORUMS. WHY IS IT SO DIFFICULT TO APPOINT A REVIEW BOARD? THE 24 25 I.G. ISN'T THE COMMUNITY. WHEN MY BROTHER WAS BRUTALIZED, OUR



FAMILY HAD NOWHERE TO GO. IT IS UP TO YOU TODAY, SUPERVISORS,
 TO SUPPORT AND UPLIFT COMMUNITIES BY PUSHING FOR PERMANENT
 CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT.

5 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

6

7 MARK ANTHONY-JOHNSON: GOOD MORNING. MARK ANTHONY-JOHNSON WITH 8 DIGNITY AND POWER NOW AND THE COALITION TO END SHERIFF 9 VIOLENCE. I THINK IT'S VERY IMPORTANT THAT THIS BOARD ACKNOWLEDGE THE LEVEL OF CONCERN AROUND BOTH POWERS AND 10 11 ADVISORY FUNCTION OF THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. A FEW WEEKS AGO RICHARD DROOYAN GAVE A REPORT ON THE C.C.J.V. RECOMMENDATIONS 12 WHERE TERRI MCDONALD ACKNOWLEDGED A 27 PERCENT INCREASE OF 13 VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN THE IN LYNWOOD. SHE ATTRIBUTED IT TO 14 15 THE RISE OF THE MENTAL HEALTH POPULATION IN L.A. COUNTY JAILS. 16 L.A. COUNTY JAILS IS STILL THE LARGEST MENTAL HEALTH FACILITY IN THE COUNTRY OF THE LARGEST JAIL SYSTEM IN THE WORLD. THAT 17 18 BEING SAID WE NEED THE MOST COMPREHENSIVE THE MOST EFFECTIVE 19 FORM OF OVERSIGHT AND A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT BODY EVEN IN AN ADVISORY FUNCTION COULD COORDINATE WITH THE O.I.G. TO BE THE 20 21 MOST EFFECTIVE VOICE. FOLKS WHO ARE COMING OUT OF THE JAILS, 22 FOLKS WHO ARE IN THE COMMUNITY KNOW FIRSTHAND HAVE A 23 SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF WISDOM OF HOW THE SYSTEM WORKS. SECONDLY, THE L.A. COUNTY JAILS IS, IN THE L.A. COUNTY 24 COMMUNITY BLACK FOLKS ARE 9 PERCENT OF THE L.A. COUNTY 25



COMMUNITY. WE ARE 43 PERCENT OF THOSE DIAGNOSED WITH SERIOUS
 MENTAL ILLNESS HELD IN THE L.A. COUNTY JAILS. WE NEED TO BE
 LOOKING AT BOTH THE GENDER AND THE DIMENSIONS OF OVERSIGHT AND
 AN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION CAN HELP FILTER THAT.

6 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. TIME'S UP. THANK YOU. NEXT?7 NEXT?

8

9 SANDRA NEAL: HELLO, MY NAME IS AND SANDRA NEAL AND I AM A NURSE AND I TEACH ALLIED HEALTH IN EAST L.A. DISTRICT ONE. AND 10 11 I AM A MEMBER OF THE COALITION TO END SHERIFF VIOLENCE IN L.A. JAILS. WHEN I SPOKE HERE LAST YEAR I DESCRIBED THE EVENTS OF 12 MY SON'S ENCOUNTER WITH THE DEPUTIES AT THE INMATE RECEPTION 13 CENTER THREE YEARS AGO. I TOOK MY COMPLAINT ABOUT HIS BRUTAL 14 ASSAULT THAT LEFT HOSPITALIZED ALL THE WAY UP THE CHAIN OF 15 16 COMMAND EVEN TO LEE BACA DIRECTLY. NO EXPLANATION WAS EVER VOLUNTEERED BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. MY SON IS STILL 17 18 PUTTING HIS LIFE BACK TOGETHER AND STILL STRUGGLES WITH THE 19 TRAUMA OF THAT INCIDENT. AND I AM STILL HEARING STORIES FROM MY STUDENTS ABOUT THEIR CONTACT WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. 20 21 WE ARE TAX PAYERS AND COMMUNITY MEMBERS AND WE PAY THE 22 SALARIES OF THESE PERPETRATORS OF EXCESSIVE USE OF FORCE AND 23 THE RESULTING COST OF LITIGATION. IT IS TIME WE HAVE A VOICE TO HOLD THEM ACCOUNTABLE FOR THEIR ACTIONS AND WHEN THEY DO 24 25 NOT FOLLOW POLICY. WE NEED TRANSPARENCY. WE NEED CHANGE. I



BELIEVE THAT A CITIZEN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION IS A HUGE STEP IN
 THAT DIRECTION. THANK YOU FOR YOUR CONSIDERATION.

4 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? AND THEN I WOULD ASK,
5 STEVE, BEFORE YOU START, I WOULD ASK KELVIN SAULS. DELORIS
6 GLASS. ALICE HARRIS. AND GREG AKILI. GO AHEAD, STEVE.

7

8 STEVE ROGERS: STEVE ROGERS, DIGNITY AND POWER. THIS NATION IS 9 HAVING A PROBLEM WITH INCARCERATION. I THINK THAT IS CLEAR. THAT'S NOT WHAT WE'RE HERE TO TALK ABOUT OR WE WOULD NEED A 10 11 MUCH BIGGER ROOM. THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE COME HERE TODAY BECAUSE WE CAN DO SOMETHING ABOUT THIS TODAY. WE CAN TELL THIS STATE 12 HERE TODAY THAT LOS ANGELES IS READY TO MOVE FORWARD AND LOS 13 ANGELES IS READY TO DO SOMETHING DIFFERENT. WILL IT BE A 14 COMPLETE ANSWER? NO. IT'S A FIRST STEP. BUT WE WILL HAVE A 15 16 JOURNEY TO GO THROUGH. BUT WALK WITH US ON THIS. SHOW US THAT YOU GUYS ARE WILLING TO LISTEN TO THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE. THE 17 18 AMERICAN PEOPLE ARE HERE BECAUSE WE BELIEVE IN THE INTEGRITY 19 OF THIS BOARD TO DO THE WILL OF THE PEOPLE. WHEN I ANNOUNCED THIS AT CHURCH, "HEY, YOU SHOULD COME TO THIS." SO MANY PEOPLE 20 21 WERE LIKE, "HEY, I WOULD GO BUT THEY'RE NEVER GOING TO LISTEN. 22 THEY HAVE IT TOO GOOD. IT WON'T CHANGE ANYTHING. YOU'RE 23 WASTING YOUR TIME." WE ARE HERE, NOT BECAUSE THIS NEEDS TO CHANGE BUT BECAUSE WE BELIEVE THAT IT STILL CAN. WE BELIEVE 24 THERE'S SOMETHING YOU CAN DO HERE. WE BELIEVE THAT OUR VOICE 25



COUNTS AND THAT YOU GUYS ARE LISTENING. AND THAT YOU WILL DO
 THE RIGHT THING.

4 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

5

ALICE HARRIS: GOOD AFTERNOON. I AM THE LADY THAT CALLED SWEET 6 7 ALICE HARRIS. LIVED IN WATTS FOR 60 YEARS. AND I KNOW MY 8 SUPERVISORS, AND I KNOW YOU ALL GOING TO LISTEN TO US. I KNOW 9 YOU ARE GOING TO DO THE RIGHT THING. WE DO NEED THAT OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. WE KNOW THAT MOST OF THE FOLKS WE KNOW YOU DON'T 10 11 KNOW BECAUSE THEY HAVE A SLOGAN IN THE JAIL "WE FAMILY MEMBERS AND MEMBERS DON'T TELL ON OTHER MEMBERS." BUT WE GET IT. WE 12 DON'T HAVE TIME TO WAIT. BECAUSE WE ARE LOSING OUR YOUNG 13 PEOPLE. TOO MANY EVERY DAY. I HAVE A FAMILY NOW I'M WORKING 14 WITH, THE BOY IS 24 YEARS OLD, WAS IN JAIL OVERNIGHT. THE NEXT 15 16 MORNING, HE'S PARALYZED FROM HIS WAIST DOWN. 24 YEARS OLD. THEY DIDN'T KNOW -- THEY THOUGHT HE WAS DEAD. SO THEY CARRIED 17 18 HIM TO THE HOSPITAL. BUT HE LIVED AND SAID THEY WERE BEATING 19 HIM UPSIDE THE WALL. AND THE WALLS ARE CONCRETE. THAT'S WHAT HAPPENED TO HIM. YOU ALL LISTENING TO US BECAUSE WE LISTEN TO 20 YOU ALL. Y'ALL KNOW THAT. WE NEED THAT OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. 21 22 AND WE DON'T NEED TO WAIT. BECAUSE WAIT BROKE THE WAGON DOWN. 23 CAN'T WAIT. CAN'T WAIT. THANK YOU.

25 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.] NEXT?

KELVIN SAULS: MY NAME IS REVEREND KELVIN SAULS. AND I HAVE THE 2 3 PRIVILEGE OF SERVING AT THE SENIOR PASTOR AT THE HOLMAN UNITED METHODIST CHURCH AND THE CO-CONVENER FOR THE COALITION CALLED 4 5 JUSTICE, NOT JAILS. THE LOS ANGELES SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT OVERSEER OF THE LARGEST LOCAL JAIL SYSTEM IN THE U.S. AND 6 7 INDEED THE WORLD CONTINUES TO HAVE A DISTURBING, UNACCEPTABLE 8 HISTORY OF DECADES LONG BRUTALITY AND UNCONSTITUTIONAL CONDUCT 9 TOWARDS MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC AND TOWARDS PEOPLE OF COLOR IN PARTICULAR. ACCOUNTABILITY FOR BREAKING THE LAW IS NO LICENSE 10 11 TO VIOLATE ANY PERSON'S CIVIL RIGHTS, NOR THEIR HUMAN DIGNITY. LACK OF COMPLETE ACCESSIBILITY IS APPALLING AND INCREASES 12 13 INSTITUTIONAL SUSPICION. ONGOING TESTIMONIES FROM VICTIMS AND THEIR FAMILIES, PERSISTENT LITIGATION COSTS AND FEDERAL 14 INVESTIGATIONS OF THE L.A. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT HAS RESULTED 15 16 IN SEVERAL CONCLUSIONS. ONE, A CULTURE OF ARROGANCE AND ABUSE IN CIVILITY AND BRUTALITY CONTINUES. TWO, THE SHERIFF'S 17 18 DEPARTMENT DOES NOT HAVE THE WILLINGNESS, THE COURAGE NOR THE 19 ABILITY TO POLICE ITSELF. THREE, THE SUPERVISORS HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO BRING SYNERGY BETWEEN AUTHORITY AND 20 ACCOUNTABILITY, INTEGRITY AND DIGNITY. 21 22

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23 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: SIR, DO YOU WANT TO WRAP IT UP, PLEASE?
24



KELVIN SAULS: AND SO, THE L.A. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT CAN NO 1 LONGER REMAIN A LAW UNTO ITSELF. TOO MANY LIVES, FAMILIES AND 2 3 COMMUNITIES HAVE BEEN CRUELLY SHATTERED BY DEPUTY MISCONDUCT. BY VOTING FOR A CIVILIAN COMMISSION, YOU ARE VOICING YOUR 4 5 CAPABILITY OF HOLDING THE L.A. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ACCOUNTABLE AND WE BELIEVE A ROBUSTLY ACTIVE CIVILIAN 6 7 COMMISSION CAN ONLY STRENGTHEN THE MISSION OF THE INSPECTOR 8 GENERAL. ANY FURTHER DELAY TO COMPLETE ACCESSIBILITY AND FULL 9 ACCOUNTABILITY IS A MORAL FAILURE OF THIS BOARD. 10 11 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. I JUST WOULD ASK EVERYONE TO PLEASE ABIDE BY THE TIME LIMIT. WE HAVE A NUMBER OF FOLKS, 12 13 OVER A HUNDRED I BELIEVE SIGNED UP. SO NEXT? 14 DELORIS GLASS: MY NAME IS REVEREND DELORIS GLASS. PASTOR OF 15 16 THE FELLOWSHIP BAPTIST CHURCH. PRESIDENT OF CONCERNED CITIZENS OF WILLOWBROOK. FOR SOME 53 YEARS AS A RESIDENT OF THE COUNTY 17 18 OF LOS ANGELES. I'VE HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO WITNESS SITUATIONS 19 WHERE JUSTICE WAS LEFT IN QUESTION, WHICH CAUSED OF DEEP CONCERN AS WELL AS OUTRAGE ON THE PARTS OF OURSELVES AS 20 RESIDENTS. I SINCERELY BELIEVE THAT THE CREATION OF THIS 21 22 OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE WILL BE A STEP IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION ON 23 THE ROAD TO FURTHER REFORM. I ALSO BELIEVE THAT IT WILL ENSURE, CAUSE US TO BE IN A PLACE WHERE WE CAN BEGIN TO ENSURE 24 25 JUSTICE FOR ALL OF OUR CITIZENS REGARDLESS OF RACE, CREED,

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1	COLOR, ECONOMIC STATUS. I ALSO BELIEVE THAT IT WILL STRENGTHEN
2	THE ELEMENTS OF TRANSPARENCY AND ACCOUNTABILITY. I BELIEVE
3	THAT JUSTICE THAT IS DELAYED IS JUSTICE DENIED. I DON'T THINK
4	WE CAN WAIT. ALSO IN THE WORDS OF A VERY WISE BARBECUE
5	RESTAURANTEUR, WHO SAID "IF YOU'VE GOT THE RIGHT TENDERIZER,
6	YOU NEED NO TEETH TO EAT MY BEEF."

8	SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: I LIKE THAT ONE. [LAUGHTER.] YOU HAVE TO
9	FOLLOW THAT, OKAY?
10	
11	GREG AKILI: MAKES YOU WANT TO RUSH OUT AND OPEN UP A BARBECUE
12	STAND.
13	
14	SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: EXACTLY. SIR, BEFORE YOU START, OBDULIO
15	OLIVIA LIRA, KIM MCGILL, DAYVON WILLIAMS AND REVEREND PETER
16	LAARMAN. PLEASE COME UP.
17	
18	GREG AKILI: CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE BOARD. MY NAME IS GREG
19	AKILI AND I'M FROM THE BLACK COMMUNITY CLERGY AND LABOR
20	ALLIANCE. AND WE ARE HERE TODAY TO SUPPORT THE OVERSIGHT
21	COMMITTEE. THE ABUSES IN THE JAILS, THE NUMBER OF SHOOTINGS IN
22	OUR COMMUNITY HAS CREATED VERY POOR RELATIONSHIPS, A LACK OF
23	CONFIDENCE AND A LACK OF TRUST WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT.
24	ONE WAY TO BEGIN TO RESTORE SOME OF THAT TRUST IS THE TO HAVE
25	A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. TO HAVE ADDITIONAL EYES AND



EARS AND VOICES ON BEHALF OF THE COMMUNITY. IT TOOK MANY YEARS 1 OF STRUGGLE. IT TOOK A FEDERAL CONSENT DECREE TO FINALLY BEGIN 2 3 TO MOVE THE L.A.P.D. LET'S NOT DO THE SAME THING HERE. LET'S STOP MOVING FROM CRISIS TO CRISIS. AN ADDITIONAL SET OF EYES 4 5 AND EARS, AN ADDITIONAL VOICE CAN HELP RESTORE SOME OF THE TRUST THAT NO LONGER EXISTS IN OUR COMMUNITIES. B.C.C.L.A. IS 6 7 CALLING ON THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO GET ON THE RIGHT SIDE 8 OF HISTORY AND THE RIGHT SIDE OF THE PEOPLE AND APPOINT AND 9 SUPPORT A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. THANK YOU.

11 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

12

DAYVON WILLIAMS: MY NAME IS DAYVON WILLIAMS, I'M A YOUTH 13 ORGANIZER WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION AND MEMBER OF L.A. 14 15 NO MORE JAILS AND CURB, CALIFORNIA UNITED FOR A RESPONSIBLE 16 BUDGET. I WAS ARRESTED FOR BURGLARY AND SENTENCED TO A YEAR IN COUNTY JAIL. DURING MY TIME OF INCARCERATION I WAS PLACED INTO 17 18 SOLITARY CONFINEMENT FOR TWO WEEKS, 24 HOURS A DAY. I HAVE 19 EPILEPSY. AND I HAD A SEIZURE WHILE I WAS IN THERE AND THE GUARDS AND THE CELL MATES CALLED THE GUARDS BUT THEY THOUGHT I 20 21 WAS PLAYING AND THEY PUT ME INTO THE HOLE FOR THAT REASON. 22 AFTER A FEW DAYS IN SOLITARY CONFINEMENT, I STARTED TO FEEL 23 LIKE I WAS GOING CRAZY, IMAGINATION GOING AROUND. LOOKED BACK AND REALIZED HOW CREATIVE THE MIND CAN BE BUT DANGEROUS AT THE 24 SAME TIME. YOU CAN LOSE YOUR SANITY IN THERE. SO I HAD SEVERAL 25



EPILEPTIC SEIZURES WHILE I WAS IN SOLITARY CONFINEMENT BECAUSE 1 THEY DIDN'T ALWAYS BRING ME MY MEDICINE AND DIDN'T ALWAYS 2 3 BRING THE RIGHT AMOUNT IF THEY DID BRING IT. AND STRESS IS ONE OF THE MAIN TRIGGERS OF MY SEIZURES. THERE WERE NO BOOKS, NO 4 5 PAPERS, NO PENS, NO ANYTHING TO ADDRESS THE COMPLETE BOREDOM THAT WAS GOING ON. SO MY EXPERIENCE IS AND EXPERIENCES OF 6 7 HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN DETAINED IN LOS 8 ANGELES COUNTY JAILS --9 10 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: PLEASE WRAP UP. 11 DAYVON WILLIAMS: HAVE BEEN STOPPED BY SHERIFFS AND OTHER 12 FAMILY MEMBERS. SO I AM SUGGESTING WE STAND HERE STRONG TODAY 13 14 THAT THE SHERIFFS BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE FOR THE INHUMANE AND CRUEL ACTIONS THEY TAKE TOWARDS OUR COMMUNITY. 15 16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. 17 18 19 DAYVON WILLIAMS: I WANT AT LEAST ONE YOUTH. 20 21 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK THANK YOU. NEXT? 22 23 OBDULIO LIRA: (INTERPRETER SPEAKING) MY NAME IS OBDULIO LIRA, AND I'M HERE BECAUSE I'M THE PARENT OF A YOUNG MAN WHO WAS A 24 VICTIM OF THE SHERIFF. THIS HAPPENED IN CITY TERRACE ON 25

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SEPTEMBER 10TH OF LAST YEAR 2013. I'M HERE BECAUSE I WANT TO 1 KNOW WHY AREN'T PEOPLE TALKING MORE ABOUT THESE THINGS THAT 2 3 ARE HAPPENING LIKE WHAT HAPPENED LAST NIGHT? I DON'T THINK BUT I KNOW THAT THERE HAVE BEEN EXCESSIVE FORCE BECAUSE IN MY 4 5 SON'S CASE THEY BEAT HIM BEFORE ACTUALLY SHOOTING HIM. HE WAS RUNNING TO SAVE HIS LIFE BEFORE THE SHERIFF SHOT HIM IN THE 6 7 BACK. THIS IS ILLEGAL TO SHOOT SOMEONE IN THE BACK. WE FEEL WE 8 KNOW THAT PAUL TANAKA WAS ONE OF THE RESPONSIBLE PEOPLE FOR 9 ALLOWING THIS PERSON THE SHERIFF TO BE ON THE STREET THAT WAS INVOLVED IN THE SHOOTING. WE KNOW THAT THIS MAN WHO WAS 10 11 INVOLVED IN THE SHOOTING WAS NOT WELL IN THE HEAD AND SHOULD NOT HAVE BEEN ON THE STREET AND BE ALLOWED TO BE PATROLLING. 12 13

14 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. GRACIAS. NEXT?

15

16 KIM MCGILL: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS KIM MCGILL, I AM AN ORGANIZER WITH YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION AND HOPE THAT THE 17 18 CAMERAS WILL CAPTURE WHAT IS REALLY TRULY HISTORIC ABOUT 19 TODAY. I WANT TO ASK THAT EVERYONE IN THE AUDIENCE STAND WHO SUPPORTS COMMUNITY OVERSIGHT OF THE L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF. I 20 21 COME HERE TODAY AS A WITNESS TO COUNTY JAIL CONDITIONS, AS 22 SOMEONE WHO HAS BEEN DETAINED SEVERAL TIMES IN COUNTY JAIL I 23 HAVE SEEN THE LACK OF HEALTH CARE, THE BRUTALITY AND THE VERBAL LACERATIONS WE TAKE INSIDE. I HAVE STOOD ON THE 24 VISITING LINE NUMEROUS TIMES WITH FAMILIES AND WE FOUGHT FOR 25



YEARS TO GET BATHROOMS ON THE LINE, TO GET WATER FOUNTAINS ON 1 THE LINE, JUST TO GET SHORTER VISITING SO YOU DIDN'T HAVE TO 2 3 STAND IN LINE IN THE HEAT OF THE DAY OR IN RAIN FOR FIVE HOURS. WE HAVE HAD TO FIGHT FOR THERE COULD BE PUBLIC FORUMS 4 5 AFTER FAMILIES HAVE LOST THEIR LOVED ONES TO SHERIFF'S SHOOTINGS AND HAVE STOOD IN FAMILY COURT AS THEY FOUGHT FOR 6 7 MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN COMPENSATION FOR THOSE SHOOTINGS. AND 8 YET THROUGH ALL OF THAT, WE HAVE NEVER HAD TRUE OVERSIGHT OR 9 EVEN A TRUE ABILITY TO TALK REGULARLY TO THE SHERIFFS AND TO OUR COUNTY-ELECTED OFFICIALS ABOUT THE CONDITIONS WE ENDURED. 10 11 AS THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION AND ALL THE OTHER COALITION MEMBERS TODAY. WE ARE ASKING NOT JUST FOR CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT 12 BUT OVERSIGHT OF NINE MEMBERS SO THAT WE ALSO HAVE OUR 13 REPRESENTATIVES ON THE BOARD, A YOUTH REPRESENTATIVE, SOMEONE 14 WHO HAS BEEN LOCKED UP IN THE COUNTY JAILS AND A 15 16 REPRESENTATIVE OF A FAMILY MEMBER WHO BURIED A LOVED ONE. 17

20 KIM MCGILL: FINALLY WE ARE NOT THE PROPERTY OF THE L.A. COUNTY 21 JAILS IN FACT THE COUNTY JAILS ARE OUR PROPERTY THEY BELONG TO 22 US.

 LAEMMLE, IF YOU'D JOIN US. ARYEH COHEN, CHRISTINA RONQUIST,

AND THE BOARD AND OF COURSE THE 10 11 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. THAT'S A HUGE FORM OF AUTHORITY. IT IS NOT MEANINGLESS BY ANY STRETCH OF THE IMAGINATION. I WANT TO 12 ALSO ASK WHETHER THE INSPECTOR GENERAL WHO WAS JUST HERE AND 13 WHO ADMITTED THIS MORNING THAT THE DEPARTMENT ITSELF DOES NOT 14 TAKE HIM VERY SERIOUSLY, THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, IS HE GOING 15 16 TO BE ENGAGING WITH THE COMMUNITY VOICES AND GETTING THAT KIND OF AUTHORITY FOR HIS WORK? ARYEH COHEN: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS ARYEH CHOHEN, I'M A 1 RABBI IN LOS ANGELES AND DISTRICT 2, I TEACH AT THE AMERICAN 2 3 JEWISH UNIVERSITY. I'M HERE TODAY WITH CLUE L.A. AND THE BLACK JEWISH JUSTICE ALLIANCE. AS FAITH LEADERS WE COUNT ON THE 4 5 BOARD OF SUPERVISORS TO VOTE IN SUPPORT OF THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION OF THE LOS ANGELES SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. 6 7 THE JEWISH TRADITION PLAYS A PREMIUM ON THE EOUAL AND FAIR 8 APPLICATION OF JUSTICE TO ALL. RABBIS INTERPRET THER VERSE 9 "YOU SHALL HAVE ONE LAW" TO MEAN A LAW WHICH IS EQUALLY APPLIED TO ALL. ADDITIONALLY JEWISH TRADITION STRESSES THE 10 11 FACT THAT EVEN THE WORST PUNITIVE MEASURES THAT ARE METED OUT BY THE JUDICIAL SYSTEM MUST STILL PROTECT THE DIGNITY OF THE 12 ONE BEING PUNISHED. NEITHER OF THESE CONCERNS ARE ADDRESSED BY 13 THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IN WHICH THE CITIZEN'S COMMISSION 14 DOCUMENTED UNCONTROLLED VIOLENCE TAKES PLACE. LOS ANGELES 15 16 JAILS HAVE BEEN DOCUMENTED AS SOME OF THE WORSE IN THE NATION BECAUSE OF THE CULTURE OF VIOLENCE BETWEEN DEPUTIES AND 17 18 INMATES. WE THE CITIZENS IN WHOSE NAMES THESE INDIVIDUALS ARE 19 INCARCERATED HAVE AN OBLIGATION TO MAKE SURE THAT THERE'S A PATH OF RETURN TO THEIR FAMILIES AND COMMUNITIES. WE ARE UNDER 20 OBLIGATION TO MAKE SURE THAT WE DO NOT DESTROY HUMAN DIGNITY, 21 22 THE IMAGE OF GOD IN WHICH EACH PERSON WAS CREATED THROUGH THE 23 EXPERIENCE OF INCARCERATION. WE CAN ONLY FULFILL THAT OBLIGATION BY WAY OF A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT BOARD. 24



SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 1 2 3 MARC DWORKIN: GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS RABBI MARC DWORKIN, I'M HERE WITH CLUE L.A. AND I'M NOT HERE AS A LAW ENFORCEMENT 4 5 EXPERT. AND I THINK MY COLLEAGUE JUST BASICALLY DESCRIBED WHAT MOTIVATES ME TO BE HERE. AND I WAS OBSERVING IN THE ROOM OF 6 7 WHAT'S LACKING. AND FOR ME WHAT IS LACKING IS THAT SENSE OF 8 TRUST THAT THINGS ARE GOING TO BE MOVING FORWARD. I MEAN, I 9 HEARD THE LEGISLATIVE LOG JAM AND I HEARD THAT AFTER SIX MONTHS THERE'S NOTHING COMING OUT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL'S 10 11 OFFICE. AND I THINK WHAT YOU NEED TO DO IS SOMEHOW COME UP WITH A PLAN AND PERHAPS THIS IS THE ONE. GET TRUST BACK IN THE 12 ROOM TO INVOLVE PEOPLE. BECAUSE THIS IS A COMMUNITY. AND THE 13 COMMUNITY NEEDS TO SPEAK. THANK YOU. 14 15 16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. 17 18 SUSAN LAEMMLEL I'M RABBI SUSAN LAEMMLE AND I'M EMERITUS DEAN 19 OF RELIGIOUS LIFE AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. WHEN I WAS IN THAT POSITION AS, IN EFFECT, THE UNIVERSITY 20 CHAPLAIN AT THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA. WE CREATED 21 22 AN ETHICAL FRAMEWORK FOR RELIGIOUS LIFE THAT ENABLED SOME 50 23 STUDENT RELIGIOUS GROUPS, NOW THERE ARE ABOUT 90, VIRTUALLY EVERY RELIGION ON THE FACE OF THIS EARTH, TO GET ALONG AND TO 24 25 CREATE A CIVIL DISCOURSE AND A MEANINGFUL SPIRITUAL LIFE FOR

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U.S.C. STUDENTS. WE DID THAT BY CREATING A FRAMEWORK THAT HAD 1 2 THE QUALITIES THAT ARE BEING CALLED FOR TODAY TRANSPARENCY, 3 ACCESS, ACCOUNTABILITY AND THIS KIND OF TRUST THAT MY COLLEAGUE RABBI DWORKIN IS CALLING FOR. HEARING ALL THE 4 5 DISCOURSE, I WOULD SAY THAT THAT TRUST VEHICLE IS REALLY LACKING AND THAT IT'S VERY IMPORTANT TO BRING IT TO THE FORE 6 7 NOW. I DON'T NEED TO REMIND EVERYONE HERE OF HILLEL'S TRIPLE 8 MAXIM "IF NOT FOR MYSELF WHO AM I? IF I'M ONLY FOR MYSELF WHAT 9 AM I? IF NOT NOW WHEN?" I THINK IT APPLIES HERE AND THIS SEEMS LIKE THE RIGHT MOMENT TO CREATE THE COMMISSION. THANK YOU. 10 11 >>SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 12 13 KRISTINA RONNQUIST: MY NAME IS KRISTINA RONNQUIST AND I'M A 14 15 WORKING M.S.W. ON MAY 6TH I MADE A PUBLIC COMMENT TO THE BOARD 16 IN WHICH I DESCRIBED GROSS VIOLATIONS OF HUMAN RIGHTS I OBSERVED AS A MENTAL HEALTH SOCIAL WORK INTERN AT C.R.D.F. THE 17 18 FEMALE COUNTY JAIL IN LYNNWOOD. HERE I ALSO WITNESSED 19 ABSOLUTELY NO AVENUES FOR INMATES TO COMPLAIN ABOUT THE CONDITIONS THEMSELVES. DENIED THE REQUEST TO ALL A.C.L.U. NOT 20 21 LET OUT OF THEIR CELL. RETALIATED BY CUSTODY STAFF WHEN 22 REQUESTING COMPLAINT FORMS AND IGNORED BY THEIR JAIL MENTAL 23 HEALTH CLINICIANS WHEN INMATES COMPLIED ABOUT CUSTODY ABUSE. THESE WOMEN ARE NOT HEARD. MY EXPERIENCE ALSO SHOWED NO SAFE 24 25 AVENUES FOR JAIL STAFF TO COMPLAINT, EITHER. EVEN SO, I

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COMMUNICATED MY CONCERNS TO JAIL MENTAL HEALTH PROGRAM HEAD 1 AND TOP C.R.D.F. OFFICIALS AND NOTHING WAS DONE. IT IS FOR 2 3 THESE REASONS THAT I BELIEVE A CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD WITH INDEPENDENT INVESTIGATIVE POWERS IS ESSENTIAL. WITHOUT THIS, 4 5 INMATES AND JAIL STAFF ALIKE ARE FORCED TO COMMUNICATE THEIR CONCERNS TO THE PERPETRATORS THEMSELVES. THIS IS NEITHER SAFE 6 7 NOR IS IT EFFECTIVE. IN CONCLUSION I URGE THE BOARD TO 8 CONSIDER THE D.O.J.'S RECENT FINDINGS AND LONG-STANDING 9 PATTERN OF ABUSES. WITHOUT THIS INMATES WILL CONTINUE TO SUFFER IN JAILS AND STAFF WILL NOT SPEAK OUT. 10 11 SUP. MOLINA: I ASK YOU WHEN YOU SUBMITTED YOUR COMPLAINT TO 12 13 THE C.R.D.F. STAFF? 14 15 KRISTINA RONNOUIST: IN MAY. 16 SUP. MOLINA: OF THIS YEAR? 17 18 19 KRISTINA RONNQUIST: YES. 20 SUP. MOLINA: AND UNDER YOUR THAT. 21 22 23 KRISTINA RONNQUIST: YES. 24 SUP. MOLINA: THANK YOU. 25

AND TODAY IS TRYING TO APPROVE 14.5 MILLION MORE DOLLARS TO CONTINUE WITH THIS MASSIVE JAIL PLAN. 6 7 THERE IS NO REASON WHY WE SHOULD CONTINUE BUILDING WHEN WE 8 HEAR HOW VIOLENCE AND TRAUMA IS INCREASING IN OUR JAIL SYSTEM. 9 WHEN MY FATHER AND FAMILY MEMBERS WERE BRUTALIZED BY THE L.A. SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ON THE STREETS AND IN YOUR JAILS, MY 10 11 FAMILY HAD NOWHERE TO TURN. AFTER THESE THREE SPEAKER, I'M GOING TO CALL ON 16 SUPERVISOR RIDLEY-THOMAS. GO AHEAD, SIR. 17 18 BRAD HILLINGER: HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD, MY NAME IS 19 BRAD HILLINGER, FOUNDER OF TOWERS INDUSTRIES. LAST WEEK WHILE OFFERING SUPPORT FOR RIDLEY-THOMAS'S MOTION ON CUSTODY 20 ALTERNATIVES AND DIVERSIONS, I INTRODUCED MYSELF AS A SEVEN-21 22 YEAR FRONTLINE OBSERVER OF WHAT GOES ON IN THE LOS ANGELES 23 COUNTY JAILS. NOT ONLY HAVE I WITNESSED AND INTERACTED WITH PRISONERS AND CUSTODY STAFF, SERVING AS A CHAPLAIN, I HAVE 24 25 ALSO WORKED WITH EXECUTIVE MANAGEMENT OF THE LOS ANGELES



COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. JANUARY OF 2012, SHERIFF BACA AND 1 CHIEF OF CUSTODY MET WITH OUR ORGANIZATION AND THE DEANS OF 2 3 THE UNIVERSITY OF SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK. WE WERE ASKED TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT A FULL YEAR OF 4 5 INCARCERATION REENTRY PROGRAM INTO LOS ANGELES COUNTY JAILS. THE PROGRAM WAS DESIGNED TO REHABILITATE, EDUCATE AND TO TRAIN 6 7 AND ASSIST INMATES AND SECURING JOBS UPON RELEASE. IN AUGUST 8 OF 2013, WE ENTERED INTO A MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT WITH THE 9 COUNTY TO PROVIDE A PILOT PROGRAM TO THE COUNTY FOR THE COUNTY 10 ON A COST-NEUTRAL BASIS. IN OCTOBER OF 2013, U.S.C. SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK CREATED A TEAM OF FACULTY ADMINISTRATORS AND 11 ASSIGNED TO THEIR TELEHEALTH PSYCHOTHERAPY UNIT TO LEAD THEIR 12 EFFORTS. IN DECEMBER ASSISTANT SHERIFF OF CUSTODY AND HER 13 STAFF AND REPRESENTATIVES FROM U.S.C. AND OUR ORGANIZATION 14 ORDERED THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROGRAM. DURING JANUARY 15 2014, STEPS TO FUND TOOK PLACE. IN FEBRUARY OUR TEAM, DEANS 16 17 FROM THE U.S.C., THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR OF TELEHEALTH AND THE 18 NEW STAKEHOLDER GAMEDESK, A LEADING DEVELOPER OF EDUCATIONAL 19 CURRICULUM MET WITH REGGIE JONES SAWYER, THE 59TH DISTRICT WHO SERVES AS COCHAIR ON THE JUSTICE REINVESTMENT COMMITTEE --20

22 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: YOUR TIME'S UP.

24 BRAD HILLINGER: ASSEMBLY JONES SAWYER SAID HE WOULD CHAMPION
25 OUR EFFORTS. I HAVE COPIES OF THIS.



1 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: IF YOU'D LIKE TO SUBMIT. WE WILL MAKE IT 2 3 PART OF THE RECORD. 4 5 WESLEY WALKER: GOOD AFTERNOON, EVERYBODY. MY NAME IS WESLEY WALKER. AND I'M AN ORGANIZER WITH THE LOS ANGELES COMMUNITY 6 7 ACTION NETWORK. AND I WOULD LIKE TO COMMEND MARK RIDLEY-8 THOMAS, GLORIA MOLINA FOR THEIR INPUT ON THIS THING. I ALSO 9 WOULD LIKE TO SAY THAT DEFINITION OF INSANE IS THAT YOU'RE DOING THE SAME THING ALL OVER AGAIN. WE NEED A CIVILIAN 10 11 OVERSIGHT BOARD NOW. WE DON'T NEED IT LATER. WE NEED IT RIGHT NOW. FURTHERMORE, I OPPOSE THE JAIL EXPANSION. BECAUSE YOU CAN 12 USE THAT MONEY FOR DIVERSION. YOU CAN USE THAT MONEY FOR MANY 13 MORE THINGS OTHER THAN TO HOUSE PRISONERS THAT ARE NOT EVEN IN 14 15 THE JUSTICE SYSTEM YET. AND I WANT TO MAKE SOMETHING VERY CLEAR, THAT IT 23 IS NOT THE SHERIFF'S AUTHORITY THAT THE PUBLIC ARE CLAMORING

24 FOR. IT IS THE POWER OF PUBLIC SCRUTINY. SO THE IDEA HERE IS25 THAT INDIVIDUALS LIKE WE'VE HEARD FROM STREET VENDORS TO

AND TALKING TO MAX HUNTSMAN IS NOT SET UP THAT WAY. MAX HUNTSMAN IS A FANCY 4 5 LAWYER WHO HAS BEEN WORKING AT THE D.A. FOR 25 YEARS. HE'S 6 VERY LOYAL TO THIS BOARD WHO HAVE EMPOWERED HIM. WHY DON'T YOU 7 HAVE HIM BE THE ATTORNEY OR THE GENERAL COUNSEL FOR A CITIZENS 8 COMMISSION FOR PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT WORKING FOR THE COUNTY, 9 NOTICEABLY, NOT A PART OF ANY KIND OF BLUE CODE OR ANY OTHER 10 KIND OF CODE OF LOYALTY TO THIS INSTITUTION, BUT IN FACT TO 11 THE PEOPLE WHO HAVE EMPOWERED THIS INSTITUTION AND WHO HAVE BROUGHT FORWARD MANY DIFFERENT PROPOSALS AND HAVE CRITICIZED 12 THE IDEAS THAT THE SHERIFF HAS PUT FORWARD AND HAVE BEEN MET 13 WITH SILENCE AND TOO BUSY AND WE'RE GETTING THERE AND SIX 14 15 MONTHS LATER AND THIS THAT AND THE OTHER. TIME NOW FOR 16 CIVILIANS TO PARTICIPATE.

20 MARITZA GALVEZ: HI, MY NAME IS MARITZA GALVEZ, I'M A YOUTH 21 ORGANIZER WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION. AT THE AGE OF 11 22 YEARS OLD, I SAW MY MOTHER GET INCARCERATED. THIS WAS IN ONE 23 OF THE UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF LOS ANGELES WHERE NOT ONLY DOES 24 L.A.P.D. AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT RUN WILD BUT ALSO THE 25 HIGHWAY PATROL. MY MOTHER WAS TAKEN AWAY WHILE I WAS LEFT, AT



11 YEARS OLD, BY THESE THREE POLICE AGENCIES, PLUS ICE, ON THE 1 STREET. I WAS 11 YEARS OLD AND I WAS LEFT IN THE CARE OF 2 3 ANOTHER TWO-YEAR-OLD. THIS IS WHAT HAPPENS IN OUR COMMUNITIES. AND THE VOICES THAT ARE NOT, THAT DON'T GET HEARD ARE MINE. 4 5 THE YOUNG PEOPLE, THE PEOPLE OF COLOR, THE YOUNG PEOPLE IN OUR COMMUNITIES DON'T GET TO SAY WHAT HAPPENS. I USED TO LIVE IN 6 7 WATTS AND SIT ON MY STEPS AND SEE THE COPS, THE SHERIFF'S 8 DEPARTMENT WALKING YOUNG WOMEN HOME, WALKING AND FLIRTING WITH 9 THEM. AND THESE STORIES DON'T GET TOLD. SO I'M HERE WITH YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION SUPPORTING CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT AND I'M HERE 10 TO SAY THAT YOUNG PEOPLE, PEOPLE WITH SYSTEM EXPERIENCE AND 11 PEOPLE WHO HAVE LOST FAMILY MEMBERS TO POLICE VIOLENCE SHOULD 12 BE ON THAT CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. THANK YOU. 13

15 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.] SUPERVISOR 16 RIDLEY-THOMAS?

IF IT CHOOSES NOT TO, BY VIRTUE OF THE FACT THAT WE DON'T HAVE 4 5 THE APPROPRIATE NUMBER OF VOTES TO CAUSE THAT TO HAPPEN, MR. 6 CHAIRMAN, I'M PREPARED TO TAKE THE ITEM, AND REFER IT BACK TO 7 MY OFFICE FOR CONSIDERATION AT A LATER POINT IN TIME. BUT I 8 THINK THE TIME HAS COME FOR US TO MAKE THAT DETERMINATION AND 9 VOTE. AND I WOULD TRUST THAT THOSE WHO ARE HERE WOULD GIVE THEIR CONSENT FOR US TO DO SO. MR. CHAIRMAN, CAN WE FACILITATE 10 11 THAT OUTCOME BY VIRTUE OF HAVING THOSE WHO ARE REMAINING ON THE LIST TO BE HEARD TO ALLOW THE BOARD TO PROCEED WITH THE 12 VOTE ON THIS MATTER? MY LITTLE BROTHER, BARRY MONTGOMERY, WHO IS 4 5 SPECIAL NEEDS, WHO SUFFERS FROM PARANOID SCHIZOPHRENIC AND TOURETTE SYNDROME, ONLY 102 POUNDS, 5' 2, AND HE IS MENTALLY 6 7 CHALLENGED. AND HE HAS A MENTALITY OF A 10-YEAR-OLD, ALTHOUGH 8 HE'S 29. HE WAS BEATEN UNMERCIFULLY BY -- HE WAS BEATEN BY 9 MORE THAN 20 OFFICERS IN ENTERPRISE PARK IN COMPTON OPERATED BY THE COUNTY OF LOS ANGELES, CALIFORNIA. AND ONLY BECAUSE BY 10 11 THE GRACE OF GOD HE IS ALIVE. AND I BELIEVE IN SITUATIONS SUCH AS THIS THAT THERE HAS TO BE MORE THAN POLICE POLICING. 12 13 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: THANK YOU. WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR 14 15 TESTIMONY. 16 SPEAKER: THIS IS MY LITTLE BROTHER AFTER HE WAS BEATEN. 17 18 19 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: WE THANK YOU FOR YOUR TESTIMONY. 20 21 PATRICE KARST: HI, I'M PATRICE KARST. I'M A BEST-SELLING 22 CHILDREN'S AUTHOR. I'M ALSO A CONVICTED CRIMINAL. WHY? BECAUSE 23 I TOOK PICTURES OF THE WRONG SHERIFF. IN THE LOST HILL SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. I HAVE BROUGHT COPIES OF ALL MY PICTURES 24 25 FOR ALL OF THE BOARD MEMBERS. I HAVE ALSO WRITTEN TO ALL OF

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YOU. THANK YOU, MR. YAROSLAVSKY. YOUR OFFICE WAS THE ONE THAT 1 2 GOT BACK TO ME. I WAS ARRESTED FOR EXERCISING MY FIRST 3 AMENDMENT RIGHT TO TAKE PICTURES OF OUR OFFICERS ON THE STREETS ON PUBLIC LAND ON PACIFIC COAST HIGHWAY. I PULLED OVER 4 5 BECAUSE I SAW WHAT SEEMED TO BE AN AWFUL LOT OF SHERIFFS AROUND ONE CIVILIAN. THAT CIVILIAN ENDED UP BEING GARY BUSEY, 6 7 THE ACTOR BEING GIVEN A D.U.I. INVESTIGATION. I HAD NO IDEA 8 WHEN I PULLED OVER. I TOLD THE OFFICERS THAT I WAS THERE TO 9 SIMPLY TAKE PICTURES. I WAS ARRESTED. MY DOG WAS TAKEN TO THE 10 SHELTER. I WAS MUGGED. FINGERPRINTED. I WAS UNDER THE 11 JURISDICTION OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT FOR SEVEN HOURS. AND IT WAS THE MOST HELLISH SEVEN HOURS OF MY LIFE. THEY REWARDED 12 ME BY RELEASING MY MUG SHOT AND A FALSE STORY TO THE WORLDWIDE 13 PRESS SAYING THAT I HAVE SET UP GARY IN A D.U.I. STING. 14

16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, THANK YOU, MA'AM. NEXT?

17

18 **ISABEL GALVEZ:** HELLO MY NAME IS ISABEL GALVEZ AND I'M HERE AS 19 AN INSTRUCTOR WITH YOUTH BILL CHARTER SKILL OF CALIFORNIA AS A MEMBER OF THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION AND I SIT HERE IN FRONT 20 OF YOU WITH MUCH RESPECT TO ALL OF OUR COMMUNITY MEMBERS 21 22 BECAUSE I KNOW AS A TEACHER I HAVE WORKED WITH OVER 500 YOUTH 23 ACROSS LOS ANGELES COUNTY AND MANY OF THEM DO NOT HAVE THE 24 COURAGE BECAUSE OF FEAR THAT SHERIFFS HAVE INSTILLED IN EACH ONE OF US AS CITIZENS. I'M ALSO SITTING HERE AS A CHICANA 25



FIRST GENERATION GRADUATE AND MY FAMILY HAS SUFFERED BY OUR 1 SHERIFFS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. I'M SITTING HERE BECAUSE WE 2 3 NEED CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OVER THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. IT IS NOT RIGHT AS AN INSTRUCTOR I HAVE TO RESTORE FAITH IN OUR 4 5 SYSTEM BECAUSE IT IS FAILING. AND YOU ARE NOT LISTENING TO CITIZENS. HERE WE HAVE 100-PLUS PEOPLE STANDING READY TO SPEAK 6 7 AND WE'RE TRYING TO MOVE OUR VOICES SO THAT YOU DO NOT FORGET 8 THAT WE DO WANT CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. YOU SAY THAT YOU WANT 9 TEETH? WELL WE HAVE PLENTY OF THEM. AND SPEAKING IN FRONT OF 10 YOU, WE CAN SHINE THEM. ALL RIGHT? AND I WANT YOU TO KNOW THAT 11 REGARDLESS OF THE POWER THAT YOU PROVIDE US, RIGHT NOW WE'RE GOING TO CONTINUE TO MOVE FORWARD TO INSTILL LAW. I REPEAT WE 12 NEED CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. WE NEED YOUTH TO BE PRESENT. WE NEED 13 PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN AFFECTED BY THE SYSTEM WHO HAVE BEEN HURT 14 15 AND HARMED BY THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT.

17 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. VICTOR ABRUNZO, AND MICHELLE
18 ARCE, AND JESSICA FARRIS. GO AHEAD.

19

20 PASTOR Q: HELLO MY NAME IS PASTOR Q. I AM WITH THE S.C.L.C., 21 THAT'S THE SOUTHERN CHRISTIAN LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE, MARTIN 22 LUTHER KING'S ORGANIZATION, AS WELL AS C.L.U. CLERGY AND LAITY 23 UNITED FOR ECONOMIC JUSTICE. I WOULD LIKE TO REMIND US THAT 24 POWER CORRUPTS AND ABSOLUTE POWER CORRUPTS ABSOLUTELY IF THERE 25 IS NO MEANINGFUL ACCOUNTABILITY. WHY CITIZEN'S OVERSIGHT



COMMITTEE? WE NEED RESULTS NOW. BECAUSE IT'S BEEN A LONG TIME 1 COMING, BUT IT SEEMS LIKE IT NEVER GETS HERE. AS A PASTOR OF A 2 3 CHURCH WITHOUT WALLS IN SKID ROW COMMUNITY, WE SEE THE RESIDUAL EFFECTS OF ABUSE OF POWER AS WE INTERACT WITH MANY OF 4 5 OUR LOVED ONES WHO ARE RETURNING HOME TO OUR COMMUNITY SUFFERING WITH THE AFTERMATH OF ABUSE AT THE HANDS OF THE 6 7 SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. MANY ARE LEFT MENTALLY ILL AND AS A 8 RESULT OF THESE ABUSES SKID ROW HAS BECOME AN OUTDOOR ASYLUM. 9 CLERGY AND COMMUNITY LEADERS AND FAMILIES ARE LEFT TO PICK UP THESE PIECES OF THESE TRAUMATIC EXPERIENCES. OUR COMMUNITY 10 11 SHOULD NOT BE LEFT IN A STATE OF HOPELESSNESS BECAUSE OF THE SHERIFF DEPARTMENT ABUSERS. THEREFORE WE MUST HAVE A CITIZENS 12 OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE. IT'S BEEN LONG OVERDUE. 13

14

15 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. GO AHEAD. WHOEVER'S NEXT.

16

SHANNON SOPER: HI MY NAME IS SHANNON SOPER AND MY EXPERIENCE 17 18 AT LYNWOOD WAS MODEST COMPARED TO THE PEOPLE HERE WHO HAVE HAD 19 FAMILY MEMBERS KILLED BY SHERIFFS. BUT WHEN I WAS THERE, I WAS IN A HOLDING CELL WITH OVER 30 WOMEN. AT LEAST ONE WHO WAS 20 PREGNANT. AND WE WERE DENIED WATER. WE WERE THREATENED WHEN WE 21 22 ASKED FOR WATER. WHILE I WAS THERE I ALSO HEARD SHERIFF'S 23 DEPUTIES CONSTANTLY MAKING FUN OF INMATES. IT'S THIS TYPE OF UNABASHED BEHAVIOR THAT LED ME TO BELIEVE PEOPLE NEED TO KNOW 24 ABOUT THIS. PEOPLE NEED TO HAVE A VOICE IN THIS. IT DIDN'T 25



LEAD ME TO BELIEVE THAT WE NEED ANOTHER GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL TO 1 HAVE A VOICE IN THIS. AND IT'S THE KIND OF UNABASHED BEHAVIOR 2 3 THAT LED MAX HUNTSMAN TO SIT HERE TO SAY HE COULDN'T DO HIS JOB BECAUSE HE DIDN'T HAVE ACCESS TO RECORDS OR THAT HE NEEDED 4 5 THEM BECAUSE SOMEBODY WAS SHOT ON FRIDAY. SOMEBODY WAS SHOT. A MAN WAS SHOT AND KILLED IN HIS OWN HOME BY A SHERIFF'S DEPUTY 6 7 WHEN HE WAS THOUGHT TO BE A SUSPECT WHO WAS 30 YEARS YOUNGER 8 THAN HIM. AND HE SITS HERE AND TALKS ABOUT IT IN THAT 9 SHAMELESS WAY. WE DON'T NEED ANOTHER PERSON LIKE THAT. WE NEED 10 A CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD NOW.

11

12 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

13

JIM: MY NAME IS JIM. THEY CALL ME JIM THE HAT. OPEN 14 15 TRANSFORMATION. IN THIS CASE HOPE AND TRANSFORMATION OVER THIS 16 DISEASE IN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WHICH I CONSIDER A CANCER FOR THE REASON THAT I OVERCAME CANCER TWO YEARS AGO. I WAS 17 18 DYING. DYING BECAUSE OF BEING RELEASED OUT OF JAIL MYSELF. 19 BEING ABLE TO OVERCOME THE CANCER HELPED ME BE ABLE TO SEE THAT THERE IS ANSWERS. IN THIS WAY, I DEVELOPED THIS ANSWER 20 21 FROM CIVILIAN ACCOUNTABILITY PROGRAM FROM OUT OF JOHNS HOPKINS 22 UNIVERSITY. NOW THIS IS A FORMAT NOT TO HAVE TEETH BUT TO 23 ASSIST THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT TO HAVE DIGNITY THEMSELVES. HOW CAN THEY GIVE DIGNITY TO US IF THEY DON'T HAVE IT 24 25 THEMSELVES? BUT THIS IS A PROGRAM THAT WE'D BE ABLE TO SEE



WHERE WHAT WE NEED FROM THEM AND THEM GET THE HELP THEY NEED 1 2 TO HELP US. THAT WILL BE AN ANSWER TO THIS CANCER. 3 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 4 5 JESSICA FARRIS: GOOD MORNING, MY NAME IS JESSICA FARRIS, I'M A 6 7 POLICY AND ADVOCACY COUNCIL AT THE A.C.L.U. OF SOUTHERN 8 CALIFORNIA. WE URGE THE BOARD TO SUPPORT THIS ORGANIZATION. 9 WHILE WE RECOGNIZE THE LIMITATIONS THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION WOULD HAVE BECAUSE THE SHERIFF IS AN ELECTED 10 11 OFFICIAL, WE BELIEVE IT WOULD NONETHELESS TO ALLOW PUBLIC AIRING OF L.A.S.D. MISCONDUCT AND ENABLING COMMUNITY MEMBERS 12 TO HOLD THE DEPARTMENT ACCOUNTABLE FOR ITS ACTIONS BY AMONG 13 OTHER THINGS PROVIDING A FORUM FOR THE I.G. TO MAKE REPORTS ON 14 HIS FINDINGS AND RECOMENDATIONS IN PUBLIC MEETINGS. THIS 15 16 FUNCTION IS PARTICULARLY VITAL GIVEN THAT THE BOARD HAS A TREMENDOUS AMOUNT TO DEAL WITH AND THIS AMOUNT HAS LED TO 17 18 REPEATED FAILURE TO HOLD PUBLIC HEARINGS TO DISCUSS THE 19 FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE OF THE SPECIAL COUNSEL, THE A.C.L.U. AND OTHERS WHO HAVE REPORTED ON DEPARTMENT ABUSE 20 21 FOR YEARS. OVERSIGHT CAN BE A SINGLE MINDEDLY FOCUSED ENTITY 22 THAT ALLOWS PUBLIC MEETINGS ABOUT THESE ISSUES WHICH IN THE 23 PAST WERE UNFORTUNATELY SWEPT UNDER THE RUG. THAT'S VALUABLE EVEN IF IT'S NOT EVERY SINGLE THING ONE MIGHT WANT IN CIVILIAN 24 OVERSIGHT IT'S STILL VALUABLE. THANK YOU. 25

2 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, NEXT? 3 VICTOR ABRUNZO: GOOD MORNING. MY NAME IS VICTOR ABRUNZO, I 4 5 COME HERE TO TRY TO PROVIDE FOR YOU SOME COMPARISONS WITH THE STATE PRISON SYSTEM. THE STATE PRISON SYSTEM HAS AN INSPECTOR 6 7 GENERAL. AND THEY ALSO HAVE ADVISORY COMMITTEES IN THE FORM OF 8 CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEES, INMATE FAMILY COUNCILS AND 9 INMATE COUNCILS, ADVISORY COUNCILS AT EACH INSTITUTION. I WOULD GIVE MY RIGHT ARM TO HAVE A COMMISSION THAT HAD 10 11 AUTHORITY TO PASS OUR CONCERNS TO A LEGISLATIVE BODY TO ACT. MORE IMPORTANTLY, I WOULD RESPECTFULLY SUGGEST THAT THERE IS 12 PROBABLY NO FUNDING PLANNED BY YOUR INSPECTOR GENERAL FOR EYES 13 IN THE INSTITUTION. AND FUNCTIONS LIKE INMATE FAMILY COUNCILS 14 15 DO EXACTLY THAT. TO THE EXTENT YOU HAVE ANY INTEREST IN THAT 16 ISSUE, YOU ARE EACH PROVIDED A SHORT DOCUMENT FROM ME WITH A WAY TO CONTACT ME. I THANK YOU KINDLY. 17

19 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

20

MICHELE ARCE: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS MICHELLE ARCE AND I AM A COMMUNITY ADVOCATE. I'M HERE IN SUPPORT OF THE CITIZENS OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. BY DELAYING THE PROCESS WILL ONLY --IT'S REALLY SENDING THE WRONG MESSAGE TO THE TAXPAYERS. WHAT IT IS IS PLAYING WITH PEOPLE'S LIVES. THE CORRUPTION IS SO



DEEPLY ROOTED WITHIN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT, IT HAS FILTERED 1 OVER TO THE COMMUNITY. WE NEED TO EMBRACE COMMUNITY POLICING. 2 3 WE NEED TO START BUILDING PEOPLE'S TRUST. THIS IS NOT ABOUT DELAYING OR TACTICS OR PROCEDURES. THIS IS ABOUT PUBLIC SAFETY 4 5 ISSUES. THIS IS CLEARLY A PUBLIC SAFETY ISSUE. WE NEED TO ACT NOW AND ACCORDINGLY. WE NEED TO START REBUILDING THE TRUST OF 6 7 THE TAXPAYERS AND REBUILDING THE TRUST OF THE SHERIFF'S 8 DEPARTMENT. THANK YOU. 9 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 10 11 AMANDA WERNER: MY NAME IS AMANDA WERNER. I'M ONE OF THE 12 U.C.L.A. LAW STUDENTS THAT WORKED WITH THE COALITION TO END 13 SHERIFF VIOLENCE AND DRAFTING THE CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD 14 PROPOSAL. THE SERIOUS ABUSES OF POWER WITHIN THE SHERIFF'S 15 16 DEPARTMENT AND SPECIFICALLY ITS OPERATION WITHIN OUR JAILS HAS MADE LOS ANGELES COUNTY NOTORIOUS FOR UNCHECKED STATE VIOLENCE 17 18 AND CORRUPTION. TODAY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS HAS THE 19 OPPORTUNITY TO TURN THIS NARRATIVE ON ITS HEAD AND ALLOW LOS ANGELES COUNTY TO BECOME THE NATIONAL LEADER IN REFORM AND 20 CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. WE UNDERSTAND TO FULFILL THIS VISION A 21 22 STATE LAW OR CHARTER AMENDMENT WILL BE NECESSARY. BUT TAKING 23 THESE STEPS SHOULD BE OUR PLAN A, NOT OUR PLAN B. THERE ARE SURELY ALTERNATIVES THAT MIGHT SEEM MORE POLITICALLY EXPEDIENT 24 25 BUT AFTER DECADES OF INCREMENTAL REFORM AND PARTIAL SOLUTIONS,



NOW IS NOT THE TIME FOR MORE HALF-HEARTED ATTEMPTS OR FURTHER 1 DELAY. IT IS THE TIME TO ACT BOLDLY. MAJOR PROBLEMS REQUIRE 2 3 MAJOR SOLUTIONS. AND I URGE THE BOARD NOT TO SHOW AWAY FROM THE ONLY REAL REFORM THAT CAN RECTIFY CULTURE OF ABUSE THAT 4 5 HAS BECOME SO PERVASIVE. AS A COUNTY WE MUST FINALLY END THIS CORRUPTION AND PUT THE POWER BACK IN THE HANDS OF THE CITIZENS 6 7 THAT THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS DESIGNED TO SERVE. THE 8 CITIZENS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY NEED A POWERFUL AND INDEPENDENT 9 CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION ACCESSIBLE AND ACCOUNTABLE TO THE COMMUNITY DIRECTLY AND WE NEED IT NOW. THANK YOU. PLEASE 10 11 VOTE YES.

13 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

14

15 PATRICIA RUSSELL: MY NAME IS PATRICIA RUSSELL AND I'M A MEMBER 16 OF N.A.M.I., NATIONAL ALLIANCE FOR THE MENTALLY ILL. I'M ALSO DISTRICT 3 AND I REMEMBER WHEN ZEV YAROSLAVSKY SAID RIGHT HERE 17 18 THAT THERE'S TWO THINGS HE WOULD NEVER DO: NEVER WANT TO DO 19 FOR THE REST OF HIS LIFE. ONE WAS TO JUMP OUT OF AN AIRPLANE AND NUMBER 2 IS TO GO BACK TO TWIN TOWERS. MY SON IS IN TWIN 20 TOWERS AS WE SPEAK. I HAVE NO ONE TO GO TO THE SOMETHING IS 21 22 REALLY DRASTICALLY WRONG. AT ONE TIME HE WAS RUSHED TO THE 23 HOSPITAL BECAUSE HE GOT SO SICK THERE WITH NOTHING TO DO ALL DAY LONG HE WAS TAKEN UP TO 7 AND BANGED HIS HEAD AGAINST THE 24 25 WALL. THEY TOOK HIM TO AN OUTSIDE HOSPITAL, L.A.U.S.C. AND



1 THEY TOOK A BLOOD TEST AND FOUND HIS KIDNEYS WERE FAILING. IF 2 HE HADN'T BEEN BANGING HIS HEAD AGAINST THE WALL HE WOULD HAVE 3 DIED IN JAIL AND I NEVER WOULD HAVE KNOWN WHAT HAPPENED. WE 4 DESPERATELY NEED THIS COMMISSION SO PEOPLE LIKE MYSELF AND 5 OTHER MEMBERS WHO HAVE LOVED ONES INCARCERATED HAVE SOMEWHERE 6 TO GO TO EVEN SAVE THEIR LIVES.

7

8 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

9

ALONI BONILLA: MY NAME IS ALANI BONILLA, I'M REPRESENTING THE 10 11 YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION AND DIGNITY AND POWER NOW. ON MARCH 21, 2012, I WAS BEATEN INSIDE OF A HOSPITAL BY A 240-POUND 6' 12 TALL MALE LATINO OFFICER. I HAD FIVE SLIPPED DISKS IN MY BACK. 13 EYE AND FACE CONTUSIONS. THE BEATING WAS ALL CAPTURED ON 14 15 CAMERAS AND THE OFFICER'S REPORT AND TESTIMONY SHOWS NOTHING BUT LIES, LIES, LIES. ONCE THE VIDEO WAS RELEASED TO ME, I 16 FILED A CITIZENS COMPLAINT TO THE SAME ORGANIZATION THAT 17 18 ABUSED ME IN HOPES THAT MAYBE A FAIR TRIAL, I MEAN A FAIR 19 INTERNAL INVESTIGATION WOULD BE DONE. NOT TO MY SURPRISE, THE OFFICER WAS EXONERATED OF ALL MY ALLEGATIONS. I THEN ESCALATED 20 21 MY CONCERN TO A LEVEL HIGHER IN THE SAME CHAIN OF COMMAND. AND 22 GOT THE SAME UNFAIR RESULTS AND WAS INCARCERATED FOR 17 DAYS. 23 I NOW HAVE A FEDERAL LAWSUIT. THE LACK OF ACCOUNTABILITY ALLOWS FOR OFFICERS' BEHAVIOR TO ESCALATE FROM BAD TO WORSE. 24 25 AND THESE PEACE OFFICERS WHO BEAT AND HARASS -- END UP



SHOOTING AND KILLING AND GETTING AWAY AND DOING THE EXACT SAME
 THINGS.

SPEAKER: FIRST OF ALL GLORIA MOLINA I'D LIKE TO THANK YOU FOR 6 7 WHAT YOU SAID HERE IN THIS MEETING. THIS IS NOT ONLY FOR ALANI 8 BONILLA WHO IS MY DAUGHTER AND ALL PEOPLE WHO HAVE COME TO ME 9 AND CRIED ON MY SHOULDER BUT IT'S FOR ALL THE POLICE OFFICERS 10 WHO BECAME POLICE OFFICERS BECAUSE WHEN THEY WERE CHILDREN, 11 THEY HAD A DREAM, TO PROTECT AND BE HONORABLE. THEY NEVER DREAMED THAT THEY WOULD BE IN THIS POSITION TO WATCH OTHER 12 MEMBERS WHO HAD THE SAME DREAM VICIOUSLY ATTACK HUMAN PEOPLE. 13 MY DAUGHTER AT THE VERY END, AFTER TELLING ME WHAT HAPPENED TO 14 HER, SHE TELLS ME, "MOM, I WANT THIS POLICE OFFICER TO BE A 15 16 GOOD POLICE OFFICER". NOW I TELL YOU OFFICER RAMIREZ AND TO ALL POLICE OFFICERS, I PRAY FOR YOU. THE JUDGE. THE D.A. AND 17 18 EVERYONE YOU LIED TO. I PRAY FOR YOU 'CUZ GOD'S LIGHT SHINES 19 RIGHT THROUGH.

21 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? ALL RIGHT. NEXT?
22
23 DWAYNE DICKENSON:: MY NAME IS DWAYNE DICKENSON. I JUST SPENT

24 THE LAST THREE YEARS IN L.A. COUNTY JAIL. IN ALL THE

25 ACCUSATIONS ABOUT EXCESSIVE FORCE, BAD MEDICAL AND



MISAPPROPRIATION OF FUNDS IS DEFINITELY HAPPENING. SO I 1 BELIEVE THE NEW CITIZENS COALITION IS DEFINITELY IN ORDER. I 2 3 JUST HOPE THIS THEY DO A BETTER JOB THAN THE CURRENT COMMITTEES WATCHING OVER THE JAIL. AND I SAY THIS BECAUSE WHEN 4 5 YOU MAKE A COMPLAINT TO THE A.C.L.U., THEY SEND A DEPUTY SHERIFF TO CONDUCT THE FIRST INTERVIEW. THE ONLY WAY TO GET TO 6 7 THE TRUTH IS THAT THE NEW COALITION BE ALLOWED TO INTERVIEW 8 THE INMATE POPULATION AT WILL. THEN YOU WILL GET TO THE TRUTH 9 BECAUSE THEY KNOW THE TRUTH. THANK YOU.

11 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: NEXT?

12

13 ABRAHAM COLUNGA: MY NAME IS ABRAHAM COLUNGA. IN 2006 I WAS BRUTALLY BEATEN BY THE 2,000 BOYS IN L.A.C.J. I WAS TUCKED 14 AWAY AND HIDDEN. NO WAY TO CONTACT. I WAS THE AGGRESSOR, FIVE 15 16 VERSUS ONE. THERE WAS NO WAY TO GET AHOLD OF MY PEOPLE. I WAS JUST TUCKED AWAY. I WENT FROM SP4 TO SP1. WHICH MEANS I NEVER 17 18 GOT SENT TO PRISON IN MY TIME. I HAD TO WAIT TWO MORE MONTHS 19 UNTIL I HEAL UP. THAT BEING SAID THE COMMISSION IS WAY OVERDUE AND I BELIEVE IN IT AND HOPEFULLY YOU FIND JUSTICE IN THIS. 20 21 THANKS.

23 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?



JOSE BORJA: MY NAME IS JOSE BORJA, WE ARE HERE AS A COMMUNITY 1 TO HOLD THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ACCOUNTABLE FOR THEIR 2 3 OVERPOWER AND HASSLE THEY PUT US THROUGH. AT THE END OF THE DAY WE ARE HUMAN BEINGS AND DO NOT DESERVE TO BE HARASSED AND 4 5 MADE TO FEEL UNCOMFORTABLE DURING OUR INCARCERATION, MISTREATED AND BEATEN. THIS HARASSMENT NEEDS TO STOP. JUST 6 7 BECAUSE YOU HAVE A PAST DOESN'T MAKE US BAD PEOPLE. PEOPLE 8 SLIP AND GET BACK UP. PEOPLE GETTING BEATEN AND CARE FOR MY 9 FAMILIES UNTIL WE ARE ALL HELD UP. THAT'S JUST REALLY CRAZY. WE NEED JUSTICE BECAUSE WITHIN THEIR DEPARTMENT IT WILL JUST 10 11 GET SWEPT UNDER THE RUG BECAUSE WE HAVE BEEN CONVICTED OR CHARGED WITH A CRIME. THANK YOU. 12

MICHAEL MARTINEZ: YES. GOOD AFTERNOON. PEOPLE OF LOS ANGELES. 14 15 MY NAME IS MICHAEL MARTINEZ. FROM PICO RIVERA, CALIFORNIA. I 16 HOPE EVERYONE IS DOING WELL. I WAS GOING TO SAY THERE'S GOOD AND BAD AND EVERYTHING IN THIS WORLD INCLUDING THIS AGENCY 17 18 THAT WE'RE DISCUSSING. BUT HERE WE GO AGAIN. WE HAVE MORE 19 MONEY TO FUEL THE CAROUSEL CORRUPTION WE CALL THE L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF. MORE BEDS TO FILL TO CONTINUE THE WAVE OF VIOLENCE IN 20 21 THE SEA OF THE L.A. COUNTY JAIL. MORE PETTY ARRESTS OF SMALL 22 AMOUNTS OF ILLEGAL SUBSTANCES RESIDUE ON DRUG PIPES, ET 23 CETERA. \$42,000 A YEAR TO HOUSE THESE NONVIOLENT PEOPLE. HAVE THEIR WAY AGAIN L.A. COUNTY JAILS WILL STAY VIOLENT BUT WE THE 24



PEOPLE WILL NEVER STAY SILENT ON THESE ISSUES. MAY GOD BLESS
 AMERICA.

JUAN PENA:: HELLO MY NAME IS JUAN PENA. I'M A YOUTH ORGANIZER 4 5 WITH THE YOUTH JUSTICE COALITION. THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT WILL NOT ONLY HELP ME MY COMMUNITY BUT IT WILL ALSO HELP YOUTH AND 6 7 FAMILY MEMBERS THAT HAVE BEEN LOCKED UP. WE DON'T LIKE BEING 8 HARASSED BY LAW ENFORCEMENT AS FAR AS L.A. SHERIFF'S OFFICERS. 9 TAKE TO IT JUVENILE HALL CAMPS, PROBATION JUST FOR SAYING A COUPLE OF WORDS AND GETTING BEATEN UP. OR EVEN TAKEN TO PRISON 10 11 FOR NO LITTLE REASON INSTEAD OF BEING ABUSED BY LAW ENFORCEMENT. ON MY WAY TO SCHOOL I WAS STOPPED SEVEN TIMES BY 12 SHERIFFS ON THE TRAIN AND TAKEN OFF THE TRAIN AS WELL AS 13 SEARCHED MANY TIMES. IS THAT POLICING OR IS THAT HARASSMENT? 14 AND THERE SHOULD ALSO IT SHOULD BE NINE MEMBERS TO THE PANEL. 15 16 NOT ONLY FIVE. FOUR SPOTS SHOULD GO TO PEOPLE IN THE COMMUNITY, COMMUNITY ORGANIZERS, STUDENTS, YOUTH AND JUVENILE 17 18 HALL CAMPS, PROBATION, EVEN FORMERLY INCARCERATED INDIVIDUALS. 19 THANK YOU.

21 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

22

23 RANESHA MATTHEWS: HI MY NAME IS RANESHA MATTHEWS AND I'M HERE
24 AS A YOUTH FROM SOUTH CENTRAL LOS ANGELES AND ME MYSELF I HAVE
25 ENCOUNTERED THE L.A. CORRUPTION WITH THE SHERIFF. I'VE BEEN TO



LYNWOOD FOR ONLY FIVE DAYS. IT JUST SO HAPPENED WHEN I WENT 1 THAT I WAS SICK. BY THE SECOND DAY THERE I WAS DENIED MY 2 3 MEDICINE. THE THIRD DAY THEY GAVE ME SOME MEDICINE AND THEN I WAS SICK. DUE TO BEING SICK, I WAS THROWING UP IN THE TRASH 4 5 CAN AND WITH THAT BEING SAID, I WAS HARASSED BY THE SHERIFFS, "WHY ARE YOU THROWING UP IN THE TRASH CAN?" THEN PUSHED 6 7 AGAINST THE WALL. HAD MY HEAD BANGED AGAINST THE WALL. AND ON 8 TOP OF THAT TO BE PUT IN SOLITARY CONFINEMENT FOR 24 HOURS, 9 WHICH IT DOESN'T MAKE ANY SENSE ALL BECAUSE I WAS SICK. I HEARD THE INSPECTOR GENERAL EARLIER SAY TODAY THAT IT TAKES AN 10 EXPERT, AN EXPERT, EXPERT. YOU KEPT SAYING AN EXPERT. EXPERT 11 IS SOMEBODY WHO HAS EXPERIENCE IN THIS. AND WHAT I CAN SEE, WE 12 ARE THE EXPERTS BECAUSE WE'RE THE ONES GOING THROUGH THIS. NOT 13 14 THEIR ATTORNEY GENERAL. SO TO GET ON OUR GOOD SIDE, YOU GUYS NEED TO GIVE US THE COMMUNITY. 15

17 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU, NEXT.

19 MONIQUE LUKENS: I HAVE PETITION HANDOUTS FOR YOU. MY NAME IS 20 MONIQUE LUKENS IN FAVOR OF A CITIZEN REVIEW COMMITTEE FOR A 21 NUMBER OF YEARS. WE NEED THE SHERIFFS TO HAVE INPUT, SUPPORT 22 AND FEEDBACK FROM THE PEOPLE THEY PROTECT. I ASK FOR MANDATED 23 VIDEO CAMERAS DURING ALL LAW ENFORCEMENT TRANSACTIONS. I ASK 24 SHERIFFS ARE MANDATED TO FOLLOW GOVERNMENT SAFETY TIPS. ON 25 THEIR WEBSITE AND THE D.M.V. DRIVER'S MANUAL TO NOT PUNISH



DRIVERS FOR STOPPING AT WELL LIT POPULATED AREAS DURING 1 TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT DUE TO AWARENESS OF KNOWN ABUSE INCLUDING 2 3 THE SPIRITUAL CRIME OF RAPE. YES, SHERIFFS NEED TO SPEAK UP AND OUT AGAINST THE ABUSERS WHO HAVE BROUGHT THE FORCE DOWN 4 5 AND A CITIZEN OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE CAN ASSIST WITH THIS. 6 STORIES SUCH AS WHAT HAPPENED TO MYSELF, PATRICE KARST AND THE 7 LATE MATRICE RICHARDSON BEING REPRESENTED BY DR. RHONDA 8 HAMPTON TODAY SHOULD NEVER HAVE OCCURRED BUT BECAUSE THEY DID, 9 AN OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE CAN HELP RIGHT THE WRONGS. AND ONE LAST REQUEST. MATRICE'S REMAINS WERE FOUND ON THE BORDER OF A PORN 10 11 RANCH. COULD YOU PLEASE INVESTIGATE IF THERE'S ANY VALIDITY TO ANONYMOUS SOURCES SAYING OFF DUTY MALIBU SHERIFFS ARE PAID 12 SECURITY FOR THIS VIOLENT HARDCORE PORN RANCH A CONFLICT OF 13 14 INTEREST.

16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

17

18 JANET FAVELA: MY NAME JANET FAVELA. GOOD AFTERNOON, I'M A LEAD 19 ORGANIZER AT EAST L.A. OMMUNITY CORPORATION WITH THE LOS ANGELES STREET VENDOR CAMPAIGN. I'M HERE TO SUPPORT A CIVILIAN 20 OVERSIGHT OF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. AS WE REPRESENT OVER 21 22 TENS OF THOUSANDS OF STREET VENDORS IN THE COUNTY OF LOS 23 ANGELES WHO DEPEND UPON STREET VENDING TO SUPPORT THEIR FAMILIES. VENDORS UNDERSTAND THAT STREET VENDING ON THE 24 SIDEWALKS IS A BIT OF A CRIME. HOWEVER WHAT IS MORE OF A CRIME 25



IS REALLY TAKING AWAY THEIR ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES OF THESE 1 PEOPLE WHO HAVE NO OTHER OPPORTUNITIES TO PROVIDE FOR THEIR 2 FAMILIES. WHAT'S MORE OF A CRIME IS THAT EVERY DAY THERE'S 3 CRIMINALIZATION OF THESE HARD WORKING FOLKS THAT INCREASES 4 5 EVERY DAY. THIS GOES BEYOND WARNING VENDORS ISSUING CITATIONS AND ARRESTING FOLKS. THIS GOES INTO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT 6 7 HAVING REALLY A CULTURE OF "WE'RE NOT ACCOUNTABLE TO ANYBODY". 8 THIS GOES REALLY INTO THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT CREATING A 9 SYSTEM OF INTIMIDATION AND THREATS ON STREET VENDORS AND THE 10 GENERAL POPULATION. AND IT'S NOT OKAY TO TELL PEOPLE, "HEY, 11 WHERE IS YOUR CALIFORNIA I.D.? CAN I GET YOUR CALIFORNIA I.D.? IS IT THAT YOU COULDN'T GET ONE? YOU'RE GOING TO GO INTO 12 DEPORTATION." THANK YOU. 13

15 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

16

RHONDA HAMPTON: MY NAME IS DR. RHONDA HAMPTON AND I'M A 17 18 LICENSED CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST AND MORE IMPORTANTLY, I'M AN 19 ADVOCATE FOR MY FORMER INTERN, MATRICE RICHARDSON. MATRICE RICHARDSON WAS ARRESTED BY THE MALIBU LOST HILL SHERIFF'S 20 DEPARTMENT IN 2009. YOU ALL MAY KNOW THE STORY THAT NOW HER 21 22 NAKED SKELETAL REMAINS WERE FOUND IN THE REMOTE CANYONS OF 23 MALIBU. I AM HERE TODAY BECAUSE IF WE HAD A CITIZENS COMMISSION I DON'T THINK I WOULD NEED TO BE HERE. I AM AN 24 ORDINARY PERSON WHO WAS THROWN INTO AN EXTRAORDINARY 25



SITUATION. I BELIEVE THAT IF WE HAD A CITIZENS OVERSIGHT 1 2 COMMISSION, PEOPLE LIKE ME WOULD HAVE A PLACE TO GO, THAT WE 3 WOULD NOT HAVE TO BOMBARD THE BOARD WITH LETTERS DRIVING THEM CRAZY, I'M SURE. REOUESTING FOR YOUR ASSISTANCE. THAT WE WOULD 4 5 NOT HAVE TO RELY ON THE OFFICE OF INDEPENDENT REVIEW WHO DISMISS US AND WHO STATE VERY CLEARLY THAT THEY SAW THERE WAS 6 7 NO WRONGDOING IN THE CASE AND THAT THE L.A.S.D. VIOLATED NO 8 POLICIES AND NO PROCEDURES. I'M HERE TODAY BECAUSE MATRICE 9 NEEDS A VOICE.

11 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: NEXT?

12

BRYAN TRAYNOR: BRYAN TRAYNOR, I'M HERE TO SPEAK IN FAVOR OF 13 THIS CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. I MEAN I'VE ONLY BEEN HERE 14 15 ABOUT A YEAR BUT I WAS ALREADY ATTACKED, FALSELY ARRESTED, 16 FALSELY IMPRISONED, KIDNAPPED BY AGENTS OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. I COMMITTED NO CRIME. AND THEY 17 18 THINK THEY CAN GET AWAY WITH IT. THEY'RE ATTACKING AMERICAN 19 CITIZENS ON AMERICAN SOIL. AND YOU GUYS HAVE LIKE THIS GOOD BOY CLUB THAT YOU'RE COVERING FOR THEM AND LETTING THEM GET 20 21 AWAY WITH IT AND THERE'S NO ACCOUNTABILITY. WE NEED THE PEOPLE 22 TO HAVE TEETH TO HOLD THESE PEOPLE ACCOUNTABLE. I'M A CITIZEN 23 OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA. THE MOST POWERFUL NATION ON EARTH. AND I HAVE FUNDAMENTAL RIGHTS AND LIBERTIES THAT YOU 24 PEOPLE ARE BOUND UNDER FEDERAL LAW TO HONOR AND RESPECT. AND 25



YOU'RE NOT DOING IT. YOU'RE DOING WHATEVER YOU WANT AND
 GETTING AWAY WITH IT. AND I'M GOING TO APPEAL TO THE FEDERAL
 GOVERNMENT TO COME IN HERE, THE JUSTICE DEPARTMENT, THE U.S.
 ATTORNEY AND CLEAN HOUSE. FIX THIS MESS WE HAVE GOING BECAUSE
 YOU GUYS ARE KILLING PEOPLE, BEATING PEOPLE UP, PUTTING FALSE
 CHARGES ON THEIR RECORD AND GETTING AWAY WITH IT.

8 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU.

YVONNE CRUZ: HI. GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS YVONNE CRUZ, AND I 10 11 REPRESENT THE EAST L.A. CORPORATION CAMPAIGN TO LEGALIZE STREET VENDING. WE ARE FIGHTING TO LEGALIZE STREET VENDING. 12 AND I AM IN FAVOR OF THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT COMMISSION. TO END 13 THE L.A. COUNTY SHERIFF'S CONTINUED INTIMIDATION, HARASSMENT, 14 15 PSYCHOLOGICAL TERRORISM AND INCARCERATION. AS A VICTIM MYSELF 16 OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE, I HAVE BEEN FALSELY ARRESTED, IGNORED. AND I AM AT A LOSS AS TO WHY THE ANSWER TO THE SHERIFF'S JOB 17 18 IS TO OPEN AND BUILD MORE JAILS. IS THIS SENSIBLE? WELL IS IT? 19 NO, I DON'T BELIEVE SO. I BELIEVE THAT WHAT WE NEED IS TRANSPARENCY, ACCOUNTABILITY. NOT BUILDING MORE JAILS AND 20 21 THROWING THE WHOLE L.A. COUNTY AND POSSIBLY EVEN IN WHOLE U.S. 22 OF A AS AN ANSWER TO THE PROBLEMS IN THIS COMMUNITY. THANK 23 YOU.

25 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

ESONAY: HI, MY NAME IS ESONAY, I'M A STUDENT ORGANIZER WITH 2 3 THE LABOR COMMUNITY STRATEGY CENTER AND THE COMMUNITY RIGHTS CAMPAIGN. A LOT OF THE WORK THAT OTHER STUDENTS AND MYSELF DO 4 5 IS ON THE GROUND BUS ORGANIZING IN ORDER TO STOP THE CRIMINALIZATION OF BLACK AND BROWN YOUTH. WE GO INTO OUR 6 7 COMMUNITIES TO FIND WHAT IT IS THAT THEY REALLY WANT AND HOW 8 THEY ARE THINKING ABOUT THESE ISSUES. BASED ON THE TESTIMONY 9 THAT WE'VE HEARD TODAY, IT IS CLEAR WHO THE EXPERTS ARE. THE COMMUNITY HAS A FIRSTHAND EXPERIENCE WITH THESE INJUSTICES. SO 10 11 WE ARE HERE TODAY IN SUPPORT OF THIS CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD BECAUSE WE KNOW WHAT OUR COMMUNITIES WANT AND YOUR OFFICERS 12 NEED TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE FOR THEIR ACTIONS TOWARD OUR 13 PEOPLE THAT ARE IN JAILS. THE SYSTEM AS IT STANDS NOW IS VERY 14 ONE-SIDED. THE U.S. PRISON SYSTEM IS LOCKING UP A LOT OF 15 16 PEOPLE, 2.3 MILLION TO BE EXACT, BUT WHEN THE COMMUNITY HERE IN L.A. DECIDES THAT IT WANTS TO GET INSIDE AND SEE WHAT'S 17 18 HAPPENING WITHIN THE JAILS, THAT IS WHEN THE DOORS START TO 19 CLOSE. WE NEED TO HAVE THE DOORS OPEN AND HAVE THE VOICES OF OUR COMMUNITIES BE HEARD WITH THE CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD SO 20 THAT OUR OVERSIGHT AND ACCOUNTABILITY CAN HAPPEN NOW. 21 22

23 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU.



ASHELY FRANKLIN: HI, MY NAME IS ASHELY FRANKLIN, I'M AN 1 2 ORGANIZER WITH THE LABOR COMMUNITY, STRATEGY CENTERS, 3 COMMUNITY RIGHTS CAMPAIGN. WE ARE A CIVIL RIGHTS ORGANIZATION THAT ORGANIZED YOUNG PEOPLE THROUGHOUT SOUTH LOS ANGELES, 4 5 BOYLE HEIGHTS AND THE VALLEY. AND WE FIGHT TO END THE MASS INCARCERATION OF BLACK AND LATINO COMMUNITIES, PARTICULARLY 6 7 INSIDE OF THE HIGH SCHOOLS TO END THE CRIMINALIZATION OF 8 STUDENT DISCIPLINE. THIS SUMMER WE ARE CELEBRATING THE 50TH 9 ANNIVERSARY OF FREEDOM SUMMER. THAT'S WHEN THE LIVES OF MANY YOUNG PEOPLE WENT TO MISSISSIPPI TO FIGHT FOR DEMOCRACY. 10 11 DEMOCRACY TODAY LOOKS LIKE ACCOUNTABILITY. DEMOCRACY LOOKS LIKE TRANSPARENCY. DEMOCRACY LOOKS LIKE A CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT 12 BOARD. AND I'VE HEARD A LOT OF CONVERSATION ABOUT WAIT, WAIT, 13 14 WAIT, WE NEED TO SEE. WE CAN'T WAIT ANY LONGER. THE CIVIL 15 RIGHTS AND THE HUMAN RIGHTS OF OUR COMMUNITY CANNOT WAIT. WE 16 NEED THE CIVILIAN REVIEW BOARD NOW, TODAY. SO VOTE YES IF YOU WANT TO SIDE WITH CIVIL RIGHTS. VOTE YES IF YOU WANT TO SIDE 17 18 WITH HUMAN RIGHTS. VOTE YES IF YOU WANT TO SIDE WITH THE 19 COMMUNITY. THANK YOU. [APPLAUSE.]

23 TIMOTHY MURPHY: GOOD AFTERNOON. I'M THE REMEMBER REND DR. TIMOTHY MURPHY REPRESENTING PROGRESSIVE CHRISTIANS UNITING AND 24 JUSTICE NOT JAILS. WE STRONGLY SUPPORT CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OF



THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. IT WAS ONCE SAID THAT IF MEN WERE 1 ANGELS, NO GOVERNMENT WOULD BE NECESSARY. WE COULD SAY THE 2 3 SAME THING ABOUT CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. OUR COUNTRY'S FUNDING HAS RESTED ON THE INSIGHT OF THE NEED FOR CORRECTIVE CHECKS AND 4 5 BALANCES. GOOD PEOPLE WITHOUT RESTRAINT WILL HABITUALLY ABUSE THEIR AUTHORITY. CONSIDERING THE HISTORY OF MISUSE OF SHERIFF 6 7 POWER, THIS IS NOT A THEORETICAL MATTER REGARDING OUR JAILS. 8 IT IS ONE THAT WILL ASSUREDLY CONTINUE WITHOUT SYSTEMIC 9 CORRECTIVE. STRONG CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT OF L.A. COUNTY SHERIFFS RECOGNIZES THE MOST FAITHFUL RESPONSE TO MISUSES OF POWER ARE 10 11 COUNTERWEIGHTS WITH EFFECTIVE INDEPENDENCE. I NOTICE IT'S GETTING A BIT LATE. SOME PEOPLE ARE HAVING SOME SNACKS, 12 GETTING A BIT HUNGRY. I HOPE WE'RE ALL HUNGRY FOR TRUE JUSTICE 13 AND OVERSIGHT TO HAPPEN HERE IN L.A. COUNTY. THANK YOU. 14

16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

18 CHRISTOPHER POOL: MY NAME IS CHRISTOPHER POOL AND I'M HERE 19 REPRESENTING JUSTICE COALITION AND AMITY FOUNDATION. I'M IN SUPPORT OF THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT BECAUSE OF THE FACT THAT THE 20 21 WORDS WE'RE HEARING TONIGHT, ACCOUNTABILITY, ACCOUNTABILITY, 22 ACCOUNTABILITY. IF ACCOUNTABILITY DOESN'T EQUAL UP TO 23 CREDIBILITY, THEN THERE IS A PROBLEM. WHEN YOU HAVE A PROBLEM YOU MUST COME UP WITH A SOLUTION TO FIX THE PROBLEM. BECAUSE 24 25 YOU EXPECT ALL OF US TO BE ACCOUNTABLE FOR OUR ACTIONS OUT



HERE IN SOCIETY, YOU HAVE TO DO THE SAME WITH YOUR JOB. AND
 IMPOSE THE CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

4 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

5

SIDNEY HAMMONS: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS SIDNEY HAMMONS AND 6 7 I'M WITH THE AMITY FOUNDATION ALSO REPRESENTING YOUTH JUSTICE 8 COALITION. AND I'M HERE TO SUPPORT A COMMUNITY OVERSIGHT 9 BECAUSE ON THE SIDE OF THOSE CARDS IT SAYS TO PROTECT AND 10 SERVE. AND IF THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT IS A SERVICE AGENCY, 11 THEN THEY SHOULD BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE BY THE PEOPLE THAT THEY ARE HERE TO SERVE. RATHER THAN RIDING AROUND IN THE 12 COMMUNITIES AND VICTIMIZING THE PEOPLE THAT THEY'RE SUPPOSED 13 TO BE SERVING. AND I KNOW NOT ALL DEPUTIES ARE CORRUPT. AND 14 15 THEY'RE NOT THE ONLY ONES NEEDING TO BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE. 16 BECAUSE THOSE GOOD DEPUTIES WHO ARE DOING THE JOB THE WAY THEY ARE SUPPOSED TO ALSO MUST BE HELD ACCOUNTABLE FOR HOLDING 17 18 THEIR SILENCE. BECAUSE NOT A LEAF FALLS FROM THE TREE WITHOUT 19 THE SILENT KNOWLEDGE OF THE ENTIRE TREE.

21 FREDRICK GIVHAN: MY NAME IS FREDERICK GIVHAN. I'M WITH AMITY, 22 ALSO. BASICALLY I'M GOING TO SHOOT FROM THE HIP. I DIDN'T HAVE 23 ANYTHING WRITTEN DOWN. AS FAR AS THE COMMUNITY, THE COMMITTEE 24 THING OR WHATEVER, I THINK WE NEED THAT. THAT'S LONG OVERDUE 25 BY ALL MEANS NECESSARY LIKE MALCOLM X SAID I THINK THAT WILL



FIX WHAT'S GOING ON? YOU KNOW WHAT I'M SAYING? THAT'S ALL I 1 GOT RIGHT NOW. THANK YOU FOR LETTING ME SPEAK. 2 3 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 4 5 WILLIAM TAYLOR III: YEAH, MY NAME WILLIAM TAYLOR III. AND I'M 6 7 SPEAKING ON BEHALF OF ALL CITIZENS OF LOS ANGELES COUNTY. 8 FIRST OF ALL, I'D LIKE TO AGREE WITH WHAT WAS MENTION EARLIER 9 ABOUT THIS IS NOT A LAUGHING MATTER. THIS IS REAL SERIOUS. PEOPLE ARE TIRED OF BEING ABUSED. PEOPLE ARE TIRED OF HAVING 10 11 ASSAULTS OR MISCONDUCT BEING THE VICTIMS OF THAT, YOU KNOW. THIS CITIZENS OVERSIGHT COMMISSION IS VERY MUCH NEEDED AND 12 PEOPLE THAT ARE GETTING ELECTED IN OFFICE AND THE ATTORNEY 13 GENERAL AND THE SUPERVISORS THEY CAN'T FAKE THE PEOPLE OUT IN 14 THE CITY ANYMORE AND IN THE COMMUNITIES. PEOPLE ARE AWARE. 15 16 THEY HAVE BEEN VICTIMS. 17 18 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: SIR, YOUR TIME IS UP. DO YOU WANT TO 19 WRAP IT UP, THANK YOU? 20 WILLIAM TAYLOR III: AND WHAT I'M SAYING IS WE NEED THIS NOW. 21 22 THERE'S NO TIME TO WAIT. THERE IS GREAT SORROW FOR THOSE WHO 23 THINK IT'S A JOKE. 24



STACY RICHARDS: HI, MY NAME IS STACEY AND I'M WITH THE YOUTH 1 2 JUSTICE COALITION. AND I'M IN FAVOR OF CIVILIAN OVERSIGHT. AS 3 A LITTLE GIRL I WAS TAUGHT TO RESPECT MY ELDERS, NOT TALK BACK OR OUESTION THEM. I WAS ALSO TAUGHT TO TRUST, RESPECT AND TO 4 5 LOOK UP TO LAW ENFORCEMENT. HOWEVER, WHEN CHILDREN ARE BEING 6 ABUSED, THEY CANNOT REMAIN RESPECTFUL OR SILENT WITH THEIR 7 ABUSERS. NEITHER CAN PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN ABUSED BY LAW 8 ENFORCEMENT CONTINUE TO BE SILENT. SLAVERY WAS ONCE LEGAL. IT 9 WAS ABUSIVE, IT WAS INHUMANE AND YET AMERICANS FOUND 10 JUSTIFICATION FOR AN UNSPEAKABLE CRUELTY. ABUSIVE LAW 11 ENFORCEMENT CANNOT BE JUSTIFIED FOR ITS UNSPEAKABLE CRUELTY. PEOPLE WHO ARE ABUSED NEED REPRESENTATION. AND THIS IS AN 12 ABUSIVE SITUATION THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT. WE DON'T EXPECT 13 14 CHILDREN TO GO TO THEIR ABUSERS FOR HELP. WE NEED THE CITIZEN 15 OVERSIGHT SO PEOPLE HAVE SOMEWHERE THEY CAN GO TO THAT RELATES 16 TO THEM. THANK YOU.

18 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

19

ALEX SALAZAR: MY NAME IS ALEX SALAZAR, I'M REPRESENTING HERE
WITH DIGNITY NOW. I'M ALSO A FORMER POLICE OFFICER. AND SO I
HAVE INSIGHT HAVING WORKED ONCE FOR THE CITY OF LOS ANGELES
LIKE OUR SUPERVISORS HERE THAT THEY KNOW WHAT'S BEEN GOING ON
HERE. THIS HAS BEEN GOING ON FOR A VERY LONG TIME. WE DON'T
NEED TO KEEP ON PLAYING GAMES. MATTERS OF PUBLIC CONCERN ARE



NOT FRIVOLOUS ISSUES BUT ARE PUBLIC INTEREST SUBJECTS. LAW 1 ENFORCEMENT ARE TRAINED TO FOLLOW THE CHAIN OF COMMAND. BUT 2 3 WHAT HAPPENS WHEN THE CHAIN OF COMMAND IS BROKEN WITH HIGHER UPS THAT ARE CORRUPT, RETALIATORY AND PROVEN THEMSELVES 4 5 UNTRUSTWORTHY. THE NEXT THING IS INSIDERS THE POLICE THEMSELVES WHO ARE TRAINED TO GO THROUGH THE CHAIN OF COMMAND 6 7 BUT BECAUSE BY NOT GOING PUBLIC, IT IS ACTUALLY BENEFITED THE 8 INSTITUTION AND A DISADVANTAGE TO A WHISTLE BLOWER. THE 9 INSTITUTION GETS TO ARGUE IN COURTS THE WHISTLE BLOWER DID NOT APPROACH THE PUBLIC WITH THE MATTER OF PUBLIC CONCERN AS A 10 11 CITIZEN AND THAT REPORTING UNLAWFUL ACTIVITY INTERNALLY IS THEIR JOB. BUT WE NEED TO DO SOMETHING NOW. I WAS HAVING A 12 CONVERSATION WITH MR. HUNTSMAN. AND WE STAND BEHIND HIM TO BE 13 ABLE TO PUSH FORTH WHAT NEEDS TO BE DONE HERE TO FINALLY BREAK 14 15 THE CODE OF SILENCE.

16

17 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

18

19 CHARLES JOHNSON: HELLO, MY NAME IS CHARLES JOHNSON. YOU KNOW, 20 WE HEAR A LOT OF STRONG STATEMENTS HERE. AND IF THIS DON'T 21 TOUCH YOU, I DON'T KNOW WHAT WILL. IT GOES BACK FOR ME IN 22 CHILDHOOD RAISED IN COMPTON TO BE ACCUSED BY A SHERIFF NOT 23 REPORTING, GETTING A GUN STUCK IN YOUR HEAD AND FEELING THE 24 PRESSURE OF IT. IT'S HORROR STORIES ALL THROUGH THESE 25 STATEMENTS WHICH WE NEED TO RECOGNIZE UNTIL IT HAPPEN TO YOU



1 TO FEEL THE INTENSITY OF IT YOU REALLY WON'T SEE IT. SEE IT 2 FROM A DISTANCE. AND IT NEEDS TO BE PULLED IN A LITTLE BIT 3 CLOSER TO YOU. THIS MATTER OF REAL STRONG POINT RIGHT HERE. I 4 MEAN, YOU KNOW. TAKE A LOOK OF ALL THINGS THAT HAPPEN IN THE 5 LOS ANGELES COUNTY SHERIFFS AND LET THE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE 6 TAKE JUDGMENT ON THAT.

7

8 MARK KARMATZ: I AM MARK KARMATZ FROM LOS ANGELES COUNTY CLIENT 9 COALITION AND PROJECT RETURN PEER SUPPORT NETWORK. I WANT THE SUPPORT THE FORMULATOIN OF THIS NEW COMMISSION. I ALSO WANT TO 10 11 URGE THAT THERE BE SEVERAL PROGRAMS, THAT'S THE INTENTIONAL PEER SUPPORT, PEER RECOVERY SPECIALIST TRAINING IN THE JAILS, 12 WELLNESS RECOVERY ACTION PLAN IN THE JAILS. I THINK THIS NEEDS 13 TO TAKE PLACE BECAUSE IF THIS TAKES PLACE IT WOULDN'T HAVE AS 14 MUCH ABUSE WITHIN THE JAILS AS THERE IS. THAT'S MY FEELING AND 15 16 I THANK YOU VERY MUCH.

17

18 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

19

20 RICARDO VELAZQUEZ: HELLO MY NAME IS RICARDO VELASQUEZ AND I 21 WOULD LIKE TO ADDRESS A COUPLE OF COMPLICATIONS WITH THE LAW 22 SO I COULD LET GO OF SOME GRUDGES AND RESENTMENTS. 1995 I WAS 23 ARRESTED FOR NOT BEING ABLE TO GIVE UP SOMEBODY WHO HAD DONE A 24 CRIME AND SO THE BOOK WAS THROWN ON ME. WHILE IN PRISON, I GOT 25 (INAUDIBLE) OF THE LARGE INTESTINE. IT TOOK THEM SIX WEEKS TO



SEE ME AND WHILE I WAS GOING OUT TO THE PODIUM TO GET TOILET 1 2 PAPER THEY WOULD CALL ME S-H-I-T BOY. IN I WAS (INAUDIBLE) I 3 WAS INCARCERATED BECAUSE I WAS HANDCUFFED BEING KICKED IN THE BACK AND DURING THAT TIME I KIND OF LIKE WRAPPED MY LEG AROUND 4 5 THE OFFICER AND HE FELL DOWN ON TOP OF ME AND HE PUNCHED ME A COUPLE OF TIMES AND I WAS GETTING A CHARGE FOR RESISTING AN 6 7 OFFICER WITH FORCE AND I DON'T THINK THAT WAS OF FORCE 8 INVOLVED IN THAT MATTER AND JUST A LOT OF WASTED TIME AND 9 BEING ON PAROLE FOR EIGHT YEARS AND I HOLD RESENTMENT. BUT NOW 10 I THINK THERE'S THINGS THAT I COULD DO TO HEAR MY VOICE. THANK 11 YOU.

13 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

14

ARNOLD SACHS: YES, THANK YOU, GOOD AFTERNOON. ARNOLD SACHS. 15 16 SOMEBODY MENTIONED EARLIER THAT THEY HAD BEEN ARRESTED BACK ON JANUARY 15TH. THIS IS THE STORY FROM THE DAILY BREEZE JANUARY 17 18 9TH. MAX HUNTSMAN TALKS ABOUT AN ORDINANCE THAT WILL BE CLOSED 19 THAT WILL ALLOW HIM TO HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO GET INFORMATION FROM WITHIN THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT ON THESE CASES. WHATEVER 20 HAPPENED TO THAT ORDINANCE? WHERE ARE YOU AT WITH AN ORDINANCE 21 22 THAT MAX HUNTSMAN WAS TALKING ABOUT? BECAUSE PEOPLE TALK ABOUT 23 A LEGISLATIVE LOG JAM. WITHOUT AN ORDINANCE THAT HE'S TALKING ABOUT, HE'S GOT NO TOOLS. HE IS A TOOL. SOMEBODY MENTIONED 24 OBSERVING WHATEVER GOES ON IN COUNTY JAILS. YOU NEED TO 25

ARE THE PEOPLE NEGOTIATING WITH THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. 2 3 THESE ARE THE PEOPLE THAT ENABLE THEM. TODAY'S MOTION IS CONSISTENT WITH EXISTING LAW. TELL YOU WHAT, START OF THE 4 5 MEETING, CLAP ON, CLAP OFF. REMEMBER HOW THAT WENT. THAT'S THE 6 LANGUAGE. 7 8 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. MR. SACHS, JUST SO YOUR 9 INFORMATION, THE ORDINANCE IS ON THE AGENDA TODAY. SO READ THE AGENDA. THANK YOU. 10 11 ARNOLD SACHS: I READ THE AGENDA. THAT ENABLES THEM TO GET THE 12 INFORMATION THEY NEED. (CONTINUED OFF MIC). 13 14 15 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. 16 MIKE CHATTOM: MY NAME IS MIKE CHATTOM, I'M FROM THE CITY OF 17 18 COMPTON, COMMUNITY LEGAL RESEARCH CENTER. WE WANT YOU TO KNOW 19 THAT WE STRONGLY URGE FOR A COMMITTEE THAT HAS OVERSIGHT AS WELL AS TO WATCH THESE OFFICERS WHO COME OUT OF THE JAILS AND 20 THEN CONTROL OUR STREETS OUR "PATROL" SO THEY SAY. BUT WE KNOW 21 22 THAT THEY HAVE BEEN SHOOTING AND HAS BEEN A LOT OF LITIGATION 23 AND HAS BEEN A LOT OF MURDERS UNNECESSARILY. JUST THE LAST FIVE WEEKS GO I WAS ABLE TO SEE SOME OF THIS GO DOWN IN THE 24 CITY OF COMPTON. A YOUNG MAN WAS SHOT ALMOST 31 TIMES. SO HE'S 25

OBSERVE WHAT GOES ON HERE. THIS IS WHERE THE FIRE IS. THESE

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MURDERED BUT THE OTHER ONE THEY TRIED TO KILL IN ORDER SO THAT 1 HE WOULD NOT BE A WITNESS. SO WE ARE MONITORING THESE ISSUES 2 3 AND CONCERNS. SO WE HAVE TO REALIZE THAT WHEN OFFICERS PERHAPS UNDER A LOT OF PRESSURE, THEY PERHAPS ARE TAKING DRUGS. AND 4 5 THEY NEED TO BE TESTED. THEY NEED TO HAVE A TOXICOLOGY REPORT. AND THAT'S ANOTHER THING THAT YOU NEED TO IMPLEMENT IN YOUR 6 7 POLICY TO MAKE SURE THAT THEY'RE TESTED FOR WHAT THEY'RE 8 DOING. THANK YOU. 9 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT? 10 11 HUGH KENNY: HI, MY NAME IS HUGH KENNY. WHEN I WAS 18 I DID A 12 13 YEAR IN RIKERS ISLAND PENITENTIARY IN NEW YORK. AND I DID OKAY. BUT MOSTLY I WAS LIVING IN FEAR. THEN I JUST HAD TO BE 14 AFRAID OF THE OTHER INMATES. AND I GOT THROUGH THAT. THE THING 15 16 I WANT TO STRESS BECAUSE YOU TALK ABOUT TIME AND WE'LL DO THINGS IN SIX MONTHS OR A YEAR, YOU NEED TO TAKE THE POINT OF 17 VIEW OF SOMEBODY WHO IS IN JAIL, IN PRISON WHERE TIME IS 18 19 REALLY LONG AND VERY PAINFUL AND VERY EMOTIONAL. IT'S A DIFFERENT TIME FRAME THAN DOING THINGS IN SIX MONTHS OR A 20 YEAR. AND I WOULD APPRECIATE IF YOU COULD PUT THAT INTO YOUR 21 22 EQUATIONS. THANK YOU.

24 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: OKAY, NEXT?



ROSE HUGH: GOOD AFTERNOON. MY NAME IS ROSE. I'M WITH THE LOS 1 2 ANGELES COUNTY CLIENT COALITION AND I AM ALSO PART OF VETERANS 3 ARE US NEWS. AND I JUST WANTED TO OFFER A POSSIBLE SOLUTION FOR EVERYBODY'S VOICE TO BE HEARD FURTHER. BOTH SIDES OF THE 4 5 FENCE: SHERIFFS, BOARD, PEOPLE WHO HAVE BEEN ABUSED. I WORK WITH THOSE WHO ARE DISABLED. I AM ALSO WORKING AGAIN WITH MY 6 7 FRIEND WHO IS A RETIRED U.S. MARINE WHO WANTS TO HELP THE 8 HOMELESS VETERANS. PLEASE TAKE DOWN HIS NUMBER. AREA CODE 310-9 266-9465. HIS NAME IS SERGEANT BUDDY WILLIS CLARK. HE HAS AN INTERNET NEWS RADIO SHOW EVERY TUESDAY NIGHT FROM 8 TO 9 P.M. 10 TAKE THIS NAME DOWN, PLEASE. SKIDROWRADIO.NET. AND THE TITLE 11 OF HIS SHOW IS "OCCUPY SKID ROW." WE'D LOVE TO HAVE EVERYBODY 12 ON THIS SHOW TALKING AND COMING TOGETHER BECAUSE I DO BELIEVE 13 THERE ARE SOLUTIONS. THANK YOU. 14

16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. NEXT?

17

18 ROBERT LUCAS: MY NAME IS ROBERT ALLEN LUCAS. I'M HERE ON A 19 LITTLE ABOUT IT DIFFERENT SUBJECT BUT IT RUNS PARALLEL WITH A LOT OF THIS. I WAS BORN AND RAISED IN SOUTH CENTRAL L.A. IN 20 21 THE '60S. I SEEN WHAT RACISM WAS. I'VE LIVED WHAT HATRED IS. 22 YOU WANT TO TALK ABOUT P.T.S.D., IT'S TAKEN ME 25 YEARS TO GET 23 OUT OF THE PRISON SYSTEM BEFORE I REALIZED THAT. I HAVE A LITTLE PIECE OF A SOLUTION FOR SOME OF THE ISSUES WE DEAL WITH 24 25 DOWNTOWN. THE P.T.S.D., SUBSTANCE ABUSE, THE MENTALLY ILL. THE



PROBLEM IS WE DON'T KNOW WHAT TO DO WITH THEM. WE CAN'T 1 2 MEDICATE THEM AND PUTTING THEM ON THE STREETS, THEY END UP IN 3 PRISON. THEN IT TAKES MORE OF A MAN TO TRY AND GET OUT FROM UNDERNEATH THAT. THE FACT OF THE MATTER IS I WILL BE BACK. I 4 5 HAVE A PASSION. SANDY HOOK CHANGED THE COURSE OF MY LIFE. THIS IS THE CITY OF ANGELS. REMEMBER, THOSE ARE THE PEOPLE THAT PUT 6 7 YOU IN POWER. AND YOU'RE WITNESSING ALL OF THEM HERE TODAY. 8 9 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THANK YOU. I BELIEVE THAT CONCLUDES THE 10 PUBLIC TESTIMONY. 11 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: MR. CHAIRMAN MAY I SIMPLY MOVE S-1 AND ASK 12 THAT WE DO A ROLL CALL ON THAT? 13 14 SACHI HAMAI, EXEC. OFFICER: WE HAVE 57-A THAT'S ON THE TABLE. 15 16 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THAT DIED FOR LACK OF A SECOND I 17 18 BELIEVE. 19 SUP. RIDLEY-THOMAS: SO I WOULD MOVE S-1. 20 21 22 SUP. KNABE, CHAIRMAN: THE ITEM IS BEFORE US. I THINK IT'S 23 APPROPRIATE, A NUMBER OF FOLKS HAVE MADE SOME COMMENT AND I REALLY BELIEVE AND LISTEN TO THE TESTIMONY. OBVIOUSLY THERE 24 CONTINUES TO BE SIGNIFICANT ISSUES. I THINK EVERYONE UP HERE 25

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HAS THE SAME GOAL THE MOTIVATION TO MAKE SURE THAT OUR SHERIFF 1 DEPARTMENT OPERATES WITH RESPONSIBILITY AND INTEGRITY. I THINK 2 3 RICHARD DROOYAN PUT IT THE BEST. AFTER VERY SIGNIFICANT FRUSTRATION BY ALL OF US, WE TOOK A VERY AGGRESSIVE STANCE ON 4 5 THE ISSUES CONFRONTING THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. WE CREATED A CITIZEN'S JAIL COMMISSION WHICH DID AN OUTSTANDING JOB THUS 6 7 FAR AND THERE'S STILL WORK TO DO. IT HAD AN INCREDIBLE IMPACT 8 UNDER OUR INTERIM SHERIFF SCOTT. THEY RECOMMENDED AN INSPECTOR 9 GENERAL. WHICH WE AGREED TO MOVE AHEAD WITH NOW AND WE AGREED TO DO THAT UNANIMOUSLY. AS WE MOVE FORWARD ON THE PATH OF 10 11 REFORM. ADDING ANOTHER COMMISSION AT THIS POINT OR COMMITTEE WITH NO CONTROL OR POWER, I REALLY BELIEVE WILL GET US NOWHERE 12 AT THIS PARTICULAR POINT IN TIME. WE NEED TO LOOK AND OPERATE. 13 IN FACT LAYING OVERSIGHT ON TOP OF OVERSIGHT LEADS TO MORE 14 15 MEETINGS AND MORE MEETINGS AND MORE REPORTS. WE SEEM TO HAVE A 16 HABIT OF CREATING A COMMISSION EVERY TIME THERE IS AN ISSUE WITH THE COUNTY. AND IT REALLY SLOWS US DOWN. I REALLY THINK 17 18 FROM MY PERSPECTIVE. I'VE BEEN VERY CLEAR ABOUT THIS UP FRONT, 19 I AM NOT IN OPPOSITION TO A COMMITTEE OR COMMISSION AT SOME POINT IN TIME. I REALLY THINK WE NEED TO ACT AND MOVE FORWARD 20 21 WITH THE OFFICE OF INSPECTOR GENERAL AND GET THAT UP AND 22 RUNNING AND SEE WHAT SIGNIFICANT RESPONSE WE GET. THE 23 RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE INSPECTOR GENERAL AND THE SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT. AND AT SOME POINT IF IT IS NOT WORKING, THEN WE 24 CAN MOVE FORWARD WITH THE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE AND COMMISSION. 25



BECAUSE I'M COMMITTED TO REALLY HELP THE VAST MAJORITY. THE 1 2 THOUSANDS OF MEN AND WOMEN OF OUR LAW ENFORCEMENT, OUR SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT WHO HAD BEEN MENTIONED HERE TODAY PUT 3 THEIR LIVES ON THE LINE EACH AND EVERY DAY OPERATE UNDER CLEAR 4 5 LINES OF RESPONSIBILITY AND ACCOUNTABILITY AND BE PROUD OF THE WORK THAT THEY DO AND THE COMMUNITY THEY SERVE. IN PARTICULAR, 6 7 THE PARK IS HEAVILY USED BY SENIORS OF RUSSIAN DESCENT WHO 8 LIVE ON THE EAST SIDE MANY OF WHOM HAVE INCOME BELOW THE 9 POVERTY LINE AND DO NOT SPEAK ENGLISH. THE COMMUNITY CENTER IN THE PARK PROVIDES VITAL SERVICES TO THESE RESIDENTS AS WELL AS 10 11 MANY OTHER GROUPS. AS PART OF THE RENOVATIONS THEY WOULD RECEIVE A NEW PERMANENT BUILDING REPLACING THE MODULAR ONE IT 12 IS LOCATED IN. THE PLANNING PROCESS OF PLUMMER PARK RENOVATION 13 BEGAN IN 1993 AND CONTINUED UNTIL THE BONDS WERE ISSUED IN 14 15 2011.

AND WE NEED TO FIGURE THAT 6 7 OUT. NOW, IF I CAN JUST TAKE A MINUTE, MR. CHAIRMAN. I 8 UNDERSTAND THE DEPARTMENT OF FINANCE IS OPPOSED TO THIS BILL? 9
