The County of Los Angeles ("County") will be the Lead Agency and will require the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR) for the Earvin "Magic" Johnson Park Master Plan Project (project). The County requests agencies' timely comments as to the scope and content of the DEIR related to the agencies' responsibilities. For all interested agencies, organizations and persons, this scoping notice allows you an early opportunity to consult on the project before preparation of the DEIR. Following preparation of the DEIR, there will be a separate notice for another opportunity to comment on the project and all the information contained in the DEIR.

The project description, the potential environmental effects anticipated to be studied in the DEIR, and the environmental factors not potentially affected that would not be addressed in the DEIR are summarized below.

Also included below is information about the <u>Scoping Meeting</u> that will be held to solicit input regarding the content of the DEIR. <u>The meeting will be held on Saturday, November 1, 2014,</u> from 10 AM to 12 PM at Athens Park Gymnasium. The Scoping Meeting will be in an open house format. No decisions about the project will be made at the Scoping Meeting.

PROJECT LOCATION: The project site is located in Willowbrook, a large urbanized community within unincorporated Los Angeles County, California, south of the Watts community and north of the City of Compton. (See attached Project Location Map)

Regional access to the project site is provided by Interstate 105 (I-105) approximately ¹/₄ mile to the north and Interstate 110 (I-110) approximately 1 ¹/₄ mile to the west. The I-105, which runs in the east-west direction, north of the project site, connects with the I-110, which runs north-south. The project site is generally bound by 120th Street to the north, Avalon Boulevard to the west, El Segundo Boulevard to the south and Clovis Avenue to the east.

The project site includes the existing Earvin "Magic" Johnson Recreation Area and the adjacent area once occupied by the Ujima Village Housing development. The project site includes approximately 104 acres of existing park land with amenities including restrooms, picnic shelters, soccer fields, fitness course, lakes, children's play area, barbecues, drinking fountains, security lighting, and on-site lighted parking. The Ujima Village property adds an approximate 16 acres, for a total proposed project site acreage of approximately 120 acres.

PROPOSED PROJECT DESCRIPTION: Please see the attached Conceptual Site Plan. The proposed project consists of the following primary components:

Water Features

The entire project is proposed to be focused around water and water features. The largest proposed water feature is the lake. The general configuration of the existing north lake would be maintained while the existing south lake would be repurposed into a usable living water feature. The southern portion of the lake would include a linear reflecting pool and children's water play area including a splash pad. The central portion of the lake is proposed to be utilized for model boating and community gatherings. This area would also feature artistic bridges traversing the lake to provide both access and beauty. Moving north, water and landscape would work together to collect and clean the water through a series of filtration ponds and wetlands. The northern portion of the lake is envisioned to be utilized in a more active manner, and could include activities such as fishing and paddle boating. A promenade is also proposed at the north end of the park which would enhance the water edge.

Walking Trails and Exercise Amenities

The walking path network will be enhanced as health and exercise is one of the main focuses of the proposed park master plan. The main path will go around the lake and the extensive path system will bring the user through the different landscapes and experiences from the urban to the natural. Exercise circuit courses are proposed to be located adjacent to the walking trails to provide increased fitness opportunities.

Sports Complex and Gymnasium

In the southeast corner of the park, a sports complex with a gym and 3,000 person stadium with a synthetic multipurpose athletic field and synthetic community walking track is proposed. Adjacent will be 3 synthetic multi-purpose athletic fields. Additionally, three basketball courts and a skate park next to the gym are proposed.

Circulation and Parking

The main access to the park would be off of El Segundo Boulevard. Near this entrance, a grand civic entry and formal reflecting pool are proposed, flanked by an enhanced streetscape plan for the El Segundo Boulevard frontage. Park entrance signs are also proposed off of 120th Street on the north end of the park. A vehicular drive is proposed that would connect the El Segundo Boulevard to East 120th Street on the north end. This drive can be closed off for events and to prevent short cuts and "cruising."

A total of seven parking lots are proposed throughout the park. The main parking lot would be located in the center of the park, along the main vehicular drive. This parking lot is proposed to be an eco-parking lot, with bioswales, permeable paving, and photovoltaic panels that would provide shade and energy to the park.

Equestrian Center and Equestrian Trails

An equestrian center is proposed on the west side of the park, along Avalon Boulevard. The equestrian center would provide programs and events along with connection to the off-site equestrian trail system. An equestrian trail is also proposed along the perimeter of the park.

<u>*Children's Play Areas*</u> Four children's play areas are proposed throughout the park. These play areas would include playground facilities, shade structures, and open play areas.

Security and Safety

A total of five restroom buildings are proposed throughout the park. In addition, new and enhanced lighting would be provided throughout the entire park site to increase visibility and safety. The park would be staffed with security personnel that would monitor the park during operating hours. The security personnel may be located in a separate building within the park.

Community Center

The community center is envisioned to be the center of the park. This area could include amenities such as, a flower conservatory, rose garden, wedding pavilion, and a potential area for farmers markets and craft fairs. In addition, a 1,500 seat outdoor amphitheater is proposed in this area.

South Agency Headquarters

The existing Department of Parks and Recreation-South Agency Headquarters is proposed to be located along the eastern edge of the park, adjacent to the sports complex. The South Agency Headquarters facility would include offices, warehouse storage, and equipment storage uses.

ENVIRONMENTAL FACTORS POTENTIALLY AFFECTED: The County has determined that the proposed project will require the preparation of an EIR. Where potentially significant environmental impacts are identified, the EIR will also discuss mitigation measures that may make it possible to avoid or reduce significant land use impacts, as appropriate. The analysis in the EIR will include the following specific categories of environmental impacts and concerns related to the proposed project:

Aesthetics: The EIR will describe the existing site conditions and surrounding aesthetic resources. The EIR will analyze if implementation of the proposed project will impact existing aesthetic resources during both construction and/or operation of the proposed project.

Air Quality: The EIR will describe the existing air quality conditions in the area and will evaluate the project's potential air quality impacts consistent with SCAQMD methodology. Short-term air quality impacts associated with construction will also be addressed.

Biological Resources: The EIR will describe the existing biological conditions within the project area, and potential impacts of the proposed project on vegetation and wildlife, including special status species. The EIR will evaluate the likelihood of any significant biological impacts.

Cultural Resources: The EIR will address potential impacts to historic structures, archaeological and paleontological resources.

Geology and Soils: The EIR will assess soil and geologic conditions of the project area and address seismic hazards, including the potential for liquefaction, ground-shaking, and soil erosion.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions: The EIR will examine the potential for the project to result in global climate change impacts and will discuss the measures included in the project to minimize impacts and reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

Hazards and Hazardous Materials: The EIR will include a description of the potential hazards on the site and the health and safety effects of development of the proposed project.

Hydrology and Water Quality: The EIR will discuss the drainage conditions in the project area and the potential for flooding on the project site. Water quality impacts and conformance with the Regional Water Quality Control Board requirements will be addressed.

Land Use and Planning: The EIR will discuss the whether the proposed project is consistent with existing land use regulations. Additionally, the EIR will discuss the proposed project changes to the original State Park which was later transferred to the County.

Noise: The EIR will include a discussion of noise impacts on the project resulting from nearby noise sources. A noise analysis will identify the existing setting and the noise levels associated with the project and project traffic. The noise analysis will determine whether the ambient noise levels at the site are compatible with the proposed residential land uses. The EIR will address the project's potential noise impacts on the adjacent land uses as well as noise impacts on the project's future uses from nearby land uses. Conformance to the County's noise guidelines will be analyzed. Potential impacts resulting from construction noise will also be addressed.

Transportation and Traffic: The traffic analysis prepared for the EIR will describe the existing roadway conditions, circulation patterns, and other elements of the transportation system in and around the site, including the local streets and intersections and regional facilities. A transportation modeling analysis will be prepared in order to evaluate the short-term

(construction) and long-term (operational) impacts of the proposed project on the overall transportation network. The project's compliance with adopted policies, plans, and programs supporting alternative modes of transportation will also be discussed.

Public Services and Utilities: The EIR will discuss the ability of existing infrastructure in the project area, such as sanitary sewer, storm drains, water supply, and solid waste, to serve the project site. The EIR will also discuss the availability of the existing water supply to provide for the future development of the site. Additionally, the EIR will discuss impacts to local public services (police, fire and recreation services).

Alternatives to the Project: The EIR will identify and evaluate project alternatives that might reasonably be assumed to reduce project impacts, especially significant impacts. Analysis of a "No Project" alternative is required by law. Other alternatives that may be discussed could include a reduced scale scenario (either reduced development intensities and/or a smaller project area), alternative land uses (development of the site with a land use other than the proposed recreational density. The EIR will identify the degree to which each alternative might reduce one or more of the project's impacts, whether or not the alternative could result in other or increased impacts, the viability of the alternative, and the degree to which the alternative is consistent with the project's goals and objectives.

Cumulative Impacts: The EIR will include a discussion of the potentially significant cumulative impacts of the project when considered with other past, present, and reasonably foreseeable future projects in the area.

Other Required Sections: The EIR will also include other information typically required for an EIR. These other sections include the following: 1) Growth Inducing Impacts; 2) Significant, Unavoidable Impacts; 3) Significant Irreversible Environmental Changes; 4) References; and 5) EIR Authors. Relevant technical reports will be provided in a technical appendix.

SCOPING MEETING DATE AND LOCATION: A Scoping Meeting will be held on Saturday, November 1, 2014 from 10 AM to 12 PM at Athens Park Gymnasium. The purpose of the Scoping Meeting is to solicit agency and other early comments regarding issues to be addressed in the Draft EIR. The Scoping Meeting will provide information regarding the project and anticipated scope of analyses to be contained in the Draft EIR. Attendance at the Scoping Meeting is not required.



- 1. Traffic impacts on State Routes 110 and 105, and all affected on-ramps and off-ramps, all significantly impacted streets, crossroads and controlling intersections, as well as analysis of existing condition and construction periods.
- 2. Traffic volume counts to include anticipated AM and PM peak-hour volumes.
- 3. Level of service (LOS) before and during the construction.
- 4. A brief construction traffic discussion showing ingress/egress, turning movements, and a directional flow for construction vehicle trips.
- 5. Discussion of mitigation measures appropriate to alleviate anticipated traffic impacts, including sharing of mitigation costs.
- 6. A truck/traffic construction management plan is needed for this project.

Any work to be performed within the State Right-of-way will need an Encroachment Permit and any transportation of heavy construction equipment and/or materials which requires the use of oversized-transport vehicles on State highways will require a Caltrans transportation permit. We recommend that large size truck trips be limited to off-peak commute periods.

Storm water run-off is a sensitive issue for Los Angeles and Ventura Counties. Please be mindful of your need to discharge clean run-off water and it is not permitted to discharge onto State highway facilities.

The Department of Public Health-Environmental Health (EH) Division has reviewed the information provided for the project identified above. The NOP is for a draft Environmental Impact Report for the Park extension development focused around water and water features. We offer the following comments:

Cross Connection Program

To mitigate any potential cross connections between non potable and potable water, the Cross Connection Program shall be notified if the project is proposing the use of water other than for domestic potable use. Construction plans shall be submitted to the Program if alternative water systems like storm water catchment or greywater will be used for landscape irrigation.

Land Use Program

The Program shall be contacted if the project proposes utilizing greywater.

Recreational Waters Program

The Program is required to review and approve plans for spray ground interactive water features. Information regarding plan submittal and the application are available on the Environmental Health website at <u>http://www.publichealth.lacounty.gov/eh/AreasofInterest/recreationalwater.htm</u>.

Toxics-Epidemiology Program

Staff from the Toxics-Epidemiology Program has reviewed the NOP, and offers the following comments:

Air quality:

The EIR as noted in the NOP will evaluate existing air quality and potential air quality impacts associated with the project following SCAQMD methodologies. The air quality section should include an evaluation of hazardous or hazardous materials if identified and the potential air quality impacts associated with (i.e. removal of contaminated soils/ construction) the handling of such materials. Hazardous materials are covered in a separate category but air quality impacts should be included as necessary.

Noise Impacts:

We have no comments to add to the NOP at this time. As indicated in the NOP the noise impacts associated with the project will be evaluated. Our department will review the completed DEIR and provide comments at that time.

Hazardous Materials:

The EIR as noted in the NOP, the EIR will include a description of the potential hazards on the site and the health and safety effects of the development of the proposed project. A part of the evaluation should include an environmental risk assessment (phase 1/phase 11) of the property consistent with DTSC and or industry guidelines (i.e. ASTM standards) to evaluate potential environmental conditions on the site and surrounding properties.

The Program shall be contacted for the issuance of an animal keeper license if the project proposes fifty or more horses for the equestrian center. I have listed a few concerns regarding this matter. Entertaining the idea of placing a bridle trail in the park would not be unacceptable and create a negative environmental impact.

The most severe problem was that caused by horses defecating and urinating also produced serious annoyances and even health problems. The normal city horse produces between fifteen and thirty-five pounds of manure a day and about a quart of urine, usually distributed along the course of its route or deposited in the stable.

Manure will be everywhere, along the roadway, heaped in piles or next to stables, or ground up by the traffic and blown about by the wind. Horses produce nutrient-rich waste that can cause problems within the community if chemicals and microorganisms leach into the soil and groundwater or run off into water courses.

Inadequate management practices of horse keepers may pose a significant threat to land and water resource quality and the environment and community amenity particularly from animal wastes. Horses also can cause land degradation (compaction, erosion), weed spread, dust and odor problems if not managed properly. The breeding of pests such as rodents and flies can also cause concern.

Who's to maintain the care of horses?

1. Manure is to be gathered to undergo a process of "rotting to expose it to weathering

2. The stench arising from these accumulations of filth is intolerable.

3. Manure piles also produced huge numbers of flies,

4. Horses need a pasture where they can graze.

5. The sounds of traffic on the busy streets along with, the horses' iron shoes" on the pavement torments ones ear.

6. Urban life was extremely hard on the horse.

7. Care of horses requires a lot of water and we are in a drought state.

Bridle trails can have a significant impact on vegetation communities by increasing the levels of soil compaction, causing soil break-up, erosion, weed distribution, loss of native plant species through trampling and cropping of plants, spread of dieback as well as other fungi, fouling problems and litter release.

I am hoping these thoughts will not fall on deaf ears. This area has had so many environment issues in the past and do not wish to exacerbate the situation.

We urge you hold this matter abay until key documents and plans are available for review by the public. These include a business plan, site remediation and management plans, long-term traffic mitigation measures, and detailed construction plans. Without this information neither the public nor the County can form a complete picture of the environmental impacts of this project or weigh them against the project's social and economic benefits, as required by the State Environmental Quality and Review Act

The people have not provided with a business plan for the project or even a simple analysis of market demand in terms of musicians looking for venues or fans looking for concerts.

Will the amphitheater rely on local patronage or is it intended to draw visitors from around the area? What is the likelihood that people would travel here for concerts? Although one of three goals for the project is "sparking economic revitalization in Willowbrook," the County provides no evidence to support the claim that there will be economic benefits to neighboring communities. We are located three miles from the Home Depot stadium in Carson. Would it be cost effective to consider a task of this magnitude? Parking has always been an issue in this area. Now you are wanting to accommodate 3000 people with parking for 1200. Go figure. The streets are already

congested with the tenants parking from the apts. on 120th, along with the motor homes with the homeless. The Social security office and residents are parked on Avalon. El Segundo is a main thoroughfare constantly being traveled by the ambulances, fire engines, police and regular high speed street traffic. Not to mention the constant overhead helicopter activity.

Definite mitigation plans for noise and traffic are needed.

Loss of open space on wildlife that live, visit, or breed in the area are of major concern.

Need to evaluate the potential impacts of fertilizers, herbicides or other chemicals used to maintain facility greenspace on water quality or wildlife.





- 2. The Fire Department requirements for access, fire flows and hydrants are addressed during the building permit stage.
- 3. The development of this project must comply with all applicable code and ordinance requirements for construction, access, water mains, fire flows, and fire hydrants.
- 4. The proposed development may necessitate multiple ingress/egress access for the circulation of traffic and emergency response issues.
- 5. Every building constructed shall be accessible to the Fire Department's apparatus by way of access roadways with an all-weather surface of not less than the prescribed width. The roadway shall be extended to within 150 feet of all portions of the exterior walls when measured by an unobstructed route around the exterior of the building.
- 6. All on-site driveways/roadways shall provide a minimum unobstructed width of 26 feet clear-to-sky. The on-site driveway is to be within 150 feet of all portions of the exterior walls of the first story of any building.
- 7. Driveway width for non-residential developments shall be increased when any of the following conditions will exist:
 - a) Provide 34 feet in-width, when parallel parking is allowed on one side of the access roadway/driveway. Preference is that such parking is not adjacent to the structure.
 - b) Provide 26 feet in-width, when parallel parking is allowed on each side of the access roadway/driveway.
 - c) Any access way less than 34 feet in-width shall be labeled "Fire Lane" on the final building plans.
 - d) For streets or driveways with parking restrictions: the entrance to the street/driveway and intermittent spacing distances of 150 feet shall be posted with the Fire Department approved signs stating "NO PARKING FIRE LANE" in three-inch high letters. Driveway labeling is necessary to ensure access for the Fire Department's use.
- 8. Turning radii shall not be less than 32 feet. This measurement shall be determined at the centerline of the road. The Fire Department approved turning

area shall be provided for all driveways exceeding 150 feet in-length and at the end of all cul-de-sacs.

- 9. All access devices and gates shall comply with California Code of Regulations, Title 19, Articles 3.05 and 3.16.
- 10. All access devices and gates shall meet the following requirements:

a) Any single gated opening used for ingress and egress shall be a minimum of 26 feet in-width clear-to-sky.

b) Any divided gate opening (when each gate is used for a single direction of travel i.e., ingress or egress) shall be a minimum width of 20 feet clear-to-sky.

c) Gates and/or control devices shall be positioned a minimum of 50 feet from a public right-of-way and shall be provided with a turnaround having a minimum of 32 feet of turning radius. If an intercom system is used, the 50 feet shall be measured from the right-of-way to the intercom control device.

d) All limited access devices shall be of a type approved by the Fire Department.

e) Gate plans shall be submitted to the Fire Department prior to installation. These plans shall show all locations, widths and details of the proposed gates.

- 11. All proposals for traffic calming measures (speed humps/bumps/cushions, traffic circles, roundabouts, etc.) shall be submitted to the Fire Department for review prior to implementation.
- 12. The development may require fire flows up to 5,000 gallons per minute at 20 per square inch residual pressure for up to a five-hour duration. Final fire flows will be based on the size of buildings, the installation of an automatic fire sprinkler system, and types of construction used.
- 13. Fire hydrant spacing shall be 300 feet and shall meet the following requirements:
 - a) No portion of lot frontage shall be more than 200 feet via vehicular access from a public fire hydrant.
 - b) No portion of a building shall exceed 400 feet via vehicular access from a properly spaced public fire hydrant.

- c) Additional hydrants will be required if hydrant spacing exceeds specified distances.
- d) When cul-de-sac depth exceeds 200 feet on a commercial street, hydrants shall be required at the corner and mid-block.
- e) A cul-de-sac shall not be more than 500 feet in length, when serving land zoned for commercial use.
- 14. An automatic fire sprinkler system may be required in any future buildings.
- 15. The statutory responsibilities of the County of Los Angeles Fire Department's Land Development Unit are to review of and comment on all projects within the unincorporated areas of the County of Los Angeles. Our emphasis is on the availability of sufficient water supplies for firefighting operations and local/regional access issues. However, we review all projects for issues that may have a significant impact on the County of Los Angeles Fire Department. We are responsible for all County facilities located within non-contract Cities. The Land Development Unit may also comment on conditions that may be imposed on a project by the Fire Prevention Division, which may create a potentially significant impact to the environment.

FORESTRY DIVISION - OTHER ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS:

The wastewater flow originating from the proposed project will discharge to local sewer lines, which are not maintained by the Districts, for conveyance to either or both the Districts' Compton Creek Extension Trunk Sewer Section 1, located in Kalsman Avenue just north of 133rd Street, or the Stanford Avenue Trunk Sewer, located in 120th Street at Stanford Avenue. The 18–inch diameter Compton Creek Extension Trunk Sewer Section 1 has a design capacity of 3.4 million gallons per day (mgd) and conveyed a peak flow of 2.2 mgd when last measured in 2013. The 15–inch diameter Stanford Avenue Trunk Sewer has a design capacity of 2.0 mgd and conveyed a peak flow of 0.9 mgd when last measured in 2013.
- 2. The wastewater generated by the proposed project will be treated at the Joint Water Pollution Control Plant located in the City of Carson, which has a design capacity of 400 mgd and currently processes an average flow of 263.1 mgd.
- In order to estimate the volume of wastewater the project will generate, go to <u>www.lacsd.org</u>, Wastewater & Sewer Systems, click on Will Serve Program, and click on the <u>Table 1, Loadings</u> for Each Class of Land Use link for a copy of the Districts' average wastewater generation factors.
- 4. The Districts are empowered by the California Health and Safety Code to charge a fee for the privilege of connecting (directly or indirectly) to the Districts' Sewerage System for increasing the strength or quantity of wastewater attributable to a particular parcel or operation already connected. This connection fee is a capital facilities fee that is imposed in an amount sufficient to construct an incremental expansion of the Sewerage System to accommodate the proposed project. Payment of a connection fee will be required before a permit to connect to the sewer is

issued. For more information and a copy of the Connection Fee Information Sheet, go to <u>www.lacsd.org</u>, Wastewater & Sewer Systems, click on Will Serve Program, and search for the appropriate link. For more specific information regarding the connection fee application procedure and fees, please contact the Connection Fee Counter at extension 2727.

5. In order for the Districts to conform to the requirements of the Federal Clean Air Act (CAA), the design capacities of the Districts' wastewater treatment facilities are based on the regional growth forecast adopted by the Southern California Association of Governments (SCAG). Specific policies included in the development of the SCAG regional growth forecast are incorporated into clean air plans, which are prepared by the South Coast and Antelope Valley Air Quality Management Districts in order to improve air quality in the South Coast and Mojave Desert Air Basins as mandated by the CCA. All expansions of Districts' facilities must be sized and service phased in a manner that will be consistent with the SCAG regional growth forecast for the counties of Los Angeles, Orange, San Bernardino, Riverside, Ventura, and Imperial. The available capacity of the Districts' treatment facilities will, therefore, be limited to levels associated with the approved growth identified by SCAG. As such, this letter does not constitute a guarantee of wastewater service, but is to advise you that the Districts intend to provide this service up to the levels that are legally permitted and to inform you of the currently existing capacity and any proposed expansion of the Districts' facilities.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the proposed Earvin "Magic" Johnson Park Master Plan Project. This letter conveys recommendations from the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA) concerning issues that are germane to our agency's statutory responsibility in relation to our facilities and services that may be affected by the proposed project.

Metro bus lines operate on 120th Street and Avalon Boulevard, adjacent to the proposed project. Several Metro bus stops are directly adjacent to the proposed project. The following comments relate to bus operations and the bus stop:

- 1. Although the project is not expected to result in any long-term impacts on transit, the developer should be aware of the bus facilities and services that are present. The existing Metro bus stop must be maintained as part of the final project.
- 2. During construction, the stop must be maintained or relocated consistent with the needs of Metro Bus Operations. Metro Bus Operations Control Special Events Coordinator should be contacted at 213-922-4632 regarding construction activities that may Impact Metro bus lines. (For closures that last more than six months, Metro's Stops and Zones Department will also need to be notified at 213-922-5188). Other municipal bus may also be impacted and should be included in construction outreach efforts.
- 3. LACMTA encourages the installation of bus shelters, benches and other amenities that improve the transit rider experience. The City should consider requesting the installation of such amenities as part of the development of the site.
- 4. Final design of the bus stop and surrounding sidewalk area must be Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant and allow passengers with disabilities a clear path of travel to the bus stop from the proposed development.

Beyond impacts to Metro facilities and operations, LACMTA must also notify the applicant of state requirements. A Transportation Impact Analysis (TIA), with roadway and transit components, is required under the State of California Congestion Management Program (CMP) statute. The CMP TIA Guidelines are published in the "2010 Congestion Management Program for Los Angeles County", Appendix D (attached). The geographic area examined in the TIA must include the following, at a minimum:

- 1. All CMP arterial monitoring intersections, including monitored freeway on/off-ramp intersections, where the proposed project will add 50 or more trips during either the a.m. or p.m. weekday peak hour (of adjacent street traffic).
- 2. If CMP arterial segments are being analyzed rather than intersections, the study area must include all segments where the proposed project will add 50 or more peak hour trips (total of both directions). Within the study area, the TIA must analyze at least one segment between monitored CMP intersections.
- 3. Mainline freeway-monitoring locations where the project will add 150 or more trips, in either direction, during either the a.m. or p.m. weekday peak hour.
- 4. Caltrans must also be consulted through the NOP process to identify other specific locations to be analyzed on the state highway system.

The CMP TIA requirement also contains two separate impact studies covering roadways and transit, as outlined in Sections D.8.1 – D.9.4. If the TIA identifies no facilities for study based on the criteria above, no further traffic analysis is required. However, projects must still consider transit impacts. For all CMP TIA requirements please see the attached guidelines.



GUIDELINES FOR CMP TRANSPORTATION IMPACT ANALYSIS

Important Notice to User: This section provides detailed travel statistics for the Los Angeles area which will be updated on an ongoing basis. Updates will be distributed to all local jurisdictions when available. In order to ensure that impact analyses reflect the best available information, lead agencies may also contact MTA at the time of study initiation. Please contact MTA staff to request the most recent release of "Baseline Travel Data for CMP TIAs."

D.1 OBJECTIVE OF GUIDELINES

The following guidelines are intended to assist local agencies in evaluating impacts of land use decisions on the Congestion Management Program (CMP) system, through preparation of a regional transportation impact analysis (TIA). The following are the basic objectives of these guidelines:

- □ Promote consistency in the studies conducted by different jurisdictions, while maintaining flexibility for the variety of project types which could be affected by these guidelines.
- □ Establish procedures which can be implemented within existing project review processes and without ongoing review by MTA.
- □ Provide guidelines which can be implemented immediately, with the full intention of subsequent review and possible revision.

These guidelines are based on specific requirements of the Congestion Management Program, and travel data sources available specifically for Los Angeles County. References are listed in Section D.10 which provide additional information on possible methodologies and available resources for conducting TIAs.

D.2 GENERAL PROVISIONS

Exhibit D-7 provides the model resolution that local jurisdictions adopted containing CMP TIA procedures in 1993. TIA requirements should be fulfilled within the existing environmental review process, extending local traffic impact studies to include impacts to the regional system. In order to monitor activities affected by these requirements, Notices of Preparation (NOPs) must be submitted to MTA as a responsible agency. Formal MTA approval of individual TIAs is not required.

The following sections describe CMP TIA requirements in detail. In general, the competing objectives of consistency & flexibility have been addressed by specifying standard, or minimum, requirements and requiring documentation when a TIA varies from these standards.

D.3 PROJECTS SUBJECT TO ANALYSIS

In general a CMP TIA is required for all projects required to prepare an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) based on local determination. A TIA is not required if the lead agency for the EIR finds that traffic is not a significant issue, and does not require local or regional traffic impact analysis in the EIR. Please refer to Chapter 5 for more detailed information.

CMP TIA guidelines, particularly intersection analyses, are largely geared toward analysis of projects where land use types and design details are known. Where likely land uses are not defined (such as where project descriptions are limited to zoning designation and parcel size with no information on access location), the level of detail in the TIA may be adjusted accordingly. This may apply, for example, to some redevelopment areas and citywide general plans, or community level specific plans. In such cases, where project definition is insufficient for meaningful intersection level of service analysis, CMP arterial segment analysis may substitute for intersection analysis.

D.4 STUDY AREA

The geographic area examined in the TIA must include the following, at a minimum:

- □ All CMP arterial monitoring intersections, including monitored freeway on- or off-ramp intersections, where the proposed project will add 50 or more trips during either the AM or PM weekday peak hours (of adjacent street traffic).
- □ If CMP arterial segments are being analyzed rather than intersections (see Section D.3), the study area must include all segments where the proposed project will add 50 or more peak hour trips (total of both directions). Within the study area, the TIA must analyze at least one segment between monitored CMP intersections.
- □ Mainline freeway monitoring locations where the project will add 150 or more trips, in either direction, during either the AM or PM weekday peak hours.
- □ Caltrans must also be consulted through the Notice of Preparation (NOP) process to identify other specific locations to be analyzed on the state highway system.

If the TIA identifies no facilities for study based on these criteria, no further traffic analysis is required. However, projects must still consider transit impacts (Section D.8.4).

D.5 BACKGROUND TRAFFIC CONDITIONS

The following sections describe the procedures for documenting and estimating background, or non-project related traffic conditions. Note that for the purpose of a TIA, these background estimates must include traffic from all sources without regard to the exemptions specified in CMP statute (e.g., traffic generated by the provision of low and very low income housing, or trips originating outside Los Angeles County. Refer to Chapter 5, Section 5.2.3 for a complete list of exempted projects).

D.5.1 Existing Traffic Conditions. Existing traffic volumes and levels of service (LOS) on the CMP highway system within the study area must be documented. Traffic counts must

be less than one year old at the time the study is initiated, and collected in accordance with CMP highway monitoring requirements (see Appendix A). Section D.8.1 describes TIA LOS calculation requirements in greater detail. Freeway traffic volume and LOS data provided by Caltrans is also provided in Appendix A.

D.5.2 Selection of Horizon Year and Background Traffic Growth. Horizon year(s) selection is left to the lead agency, based on individual characteristics of the project being analyzed. In general, the horizon year should reflect a realistic estimate of the project completion date. For large developments phased over several years, review of intermediate milestones prior to buildout should also be considered.

At a minimum, horizon year background traffic growth estimates must use the generalized growth factors shown in Exhibit D-1. These growth factors are based on regional modeling efforts, and estimate the general effect of cumulative development and other socioeconomic changes on traffic throughout the region. Beyond this minimum, selection among the various methodologies available to estimate horizon year background traffic in greater detail is left to the lead agency. Suggested approaches include consultation with the jurisdiction in which the intersection under study is located, in order to obtain more detailed traffic estimates based on ongoing development in the vicinity.

D.6 PROPOSED PROJECT TRAFFIC GENERATION

Traffic generation estimates must conform to the procedures of the current edition of <u>Trip</u> <u>Generation</u>, by the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE). If an alternative methodology is used, the basis for this methodology must be fully documented.

Increases in site traffic generation may be reduced for existing land uses to be removed, if the existing use was operating during the year the traffic counts were collected. Current traffic generation should be substantiated by actual driveway counts; however, if infeasible, traffic may be estimated based on a methodology consistent with that used for the proposed use.

Regional transportation impact analysis also requires consideration of trip lengths. Total site traffic generation must therefore be divided into work and non-work-related trip purposes in order to reflect observed trip length differences. Exhibit D-2 provides factors which indicate trip purpose breakdowns for various land use types.

For lead agencies who also participate in CMP highway monitoring, it is recommended that any traffic counts on CMP facilities needed to prepare the TIA should be done in the manner outlined in Chapter 2 and Appendix A. If the TIA traffic counts are taken within one year of the deadline for submittal of CMP highway monitoring data, the local jurisdiction would save the cost of having to conduct the traffic counts twice.

D.7 TRIP DISTRIBUTION

For trip distribution by direct/manual assignment, generalized trip distribution factors are provided in Exhibit D-3, based on regional modeling efforts. These factors indicate Regional Statistical Area (RSA)-level tripmaking for work and non-work trip purposes.

APPENDIX D - GUIDELINES FOR CMP TRANSPORTATION IMPACT ANALYSIS PAGE D-4

(These RSAs are illustrated in Exhibit D-4.) For locations where it is difficult to determine the project site RSA, census tract/RSA correspondence tables are available from MTA.

Exhibit D-5 describes a general approach to applying the preceding factors. Project trip distribution must be consistent with these trip distribution and purpose factors; the basis for variation must be documented.

Local agency travel demand models disaggregated from the SCAG regional model are presumed to conform to this requirement, as long as the trip distribution functions are consistent with the regional distribution patterns. For retail commercial developments, alternative trip distribution factors may be appropriate based on the market area for the specific planned use. Such market area analysis must clearly identify the basis for the trip distribution pattern expected.

D.8 IMPACT ANALYSIS

CMP Transportation Impact Analyses contain two separate impact studies covering roadways and transit. Section Nos. D.8.1-D.8.3 cover required roadway analysis while Section No. D.8.4 covers the required transit impact analysis. Section Nos. D.9.1-D.9.4 define the requirement for discussion and evaluation of alternative mitigation measures.

D.8.1 Intersection Level of Service Analysis. The LA County CMP recognizes that individual jurisdictions have wide ranging experience with LOS analysis, reflecting the variety of community characteristics, traffic controls and street standards throughout the county. As a result, the CMP acknowledges the possibility that no single set of assumptions should be mandated for all TIAs within the county.

However, in order to promote consistency in the TIAs prepared by different jurisdictions, CMP TIAs must conduct intersection LOS calculations using either of the following methods:

- □ The Intersection Capacity Utilization (ICU) method as specified for CMP highway monitoring (see Appendix A); or
- □ The Critical Movement Analysis (CMA) / Circular 212 method.

Variation from the standard assumptions under either of these methods for circumstances at particular intersections must be fully documented.

TIAs using the 1985 or 1994 Highway Capacity Manual (HCM) operational analysis must provide converted volume-to-capacity based LOS values, as specified for CMP highway monitoring in Appendix A.

D.8.2 Arterial Segment Analysis. For TIAs involving arterial segment analysis, volume-tocapacity ratios must be calculated for each segment and LOS values assigned using the V/ C-LOS equivalency specified for arterial intersections. A capacity of 800 vehicles per hour per through traffic lane must be used, unless localized conditions necessitate alternative values to approximate current intersection congestion levels. APPENDIX D - GUIDELINES FOR CMP TRANSPORTATION IMPACT ANALYSIS PAGE D-5

D.8.3 Freeway Segment (Mainline) Analysis. For the purpose of CMP TIAs, a simplified analysis of freeway impacts is required. This analysis consists of a demand-to-capacity calculation for the affected segments, and is indicated in Exhibit D-6.

D.8.4 Transit Impact Review. CMP transit analysis requirements are met by completing and incorporating into an EIR the following transit impact analysis:

- **□** Evidence that affected transit operators received the Notice of Preparation.
- □ A summary of existing transit services in the project area. Include local fixed-route services within a ¼ mile radius of the project; express bus routes within a 2 mile radius of the project, and; rail service within a 2 mile radius of the project.
- □ Information on trip generation and mode assignment for both AM and PM peak hour periods as well as for daily periods. Trips assigned to transit will also need to be calculated for the same peak hour and daily periods. Peak hours are defined as 7:30-8:30 AM and 4:30-5:30 PM. Both "peak hour" and "daily" refer to average weekdays, unless special seasonal variations are expected. If expected, seasonal variations should be described.
- □ Documentation of the assumption and analyses that were used to determine the number and percent of trips assigned to transit. Trips assigned to transit may be calculated along the following guidelines:
 - Multiply the total trips generated by 1.4 to convert vehicle trips to person trips;
 - > For each time period, multiply the result by one of the following factors:

3.5% of Total Person Trips Generated for most cases, except:

- 10% primarily Residential within 1/4 mile of a CMP transit center
- 15% primarily Commercial within 1/4 mile of a CMP transit center
- 7% primarily Residential within 1/4 mile of a CMP multi-modal transportation center
- 9% primarily Commercial within 1/4 mile of a CMP multi-modal transportation center
- 5% primarily Residential within 1/4 mile of a CMP transit corridor
- 7% primarily Commercial within 1/4 mile of a CMP transit corridor
- 0% if no fixed route transit services operate within one mile of the project

To determine whether a project is primarily residential or commercial in nature, please refer to the CMP land use categories listed and defined in Appendix E, *Guidelines for New Development Activity Tracking and Self Certification*. For projects that are only partially within the above one-quarter mile radius, the base rate (3.5% of total trips generated) should be applied to all of the project buildings that touch the radius perimeter.

□ Information on facilities and/or programs that will be incorporated in the development plan that will encourage public transit use. Include not only the jurisdiction's TDM Ordinance measures, but other project specific measures.

- □ Analysis of expected project impacts on current and future transit services and proposed project mitigation measures, and;
- □ Selection of final mitigation measures remains at the discretion of the local jurisdiction/lead agency. Once a mitigation program is selected, the jurisdiction self-monitors implementation through the existing mitigation monitoring requirements of CEQA.

D.9 IDENTIFICATION AND EVALUATION OF MITIGATION

D.9.1 Criteria for Determining a Significant Impact. For purposes of the CMP, a significant impact occurs when the proposed project increases traffic demand on a CMP facility by 2% of capacity (V/C \ge 0.02), causing LOS F (V/C > 1.00); if the facility is already at LOS F, a significant impact occurs when the proposed project increases traffic demand on a CMP facility by 2% of capacity (V/C \ge 0.02). The lead agency may apply a more stringent criteria if desired.

D.9.2 Identification of Mitigation. Once the project has been determined to cause a significant impact, the lead agency must investigate measures which will mitigate the impact of the project. Mitigation measures proposed must clearly indicate the following:

- □ Cost estimates, indicating the fair share costs to mitigate the impact of the proposed project. If the improvement from a proposed mitigation measure will exceed the impact of the project, the TIA must indicate the proportion of total mitigation costs which is attributable to the project. This fulfills the statutory requirement to exclude the costs of mitigating inter-regional trips.
- □ Implementation responsibilities. Where the agency responsible for implementing mitigation is not the lead agency, the TIA must document consultation with the implementing agency regarding project impacts, mitigation feasibility and responsibility.

Final selection of mitigation measures remains at the discretion of the lead agency. The TIA must, however, provide a summary of impacts and mitigation measures. Once a mitigation program is selected, the jurisdiction self-monitors implementation through the mitigation monitoring requirements contained in CEQA.

D.9.3 Project Contribution to Planned Regional Improvements. If the TIA concludes that project impacts will be mitigated by anticipated regional transportation improvements, such as rail transit or high occupancy vehicle facilities, the TIA must document:

- Any project contribution to the improvement, and
- □ The means by which trips generated at the site will access the regional facility.

D.9.4 Transportation Demand Management (TDM). If the TIA concludes or assumes that project impacts will be reduced through the implementation of TDM measures, the TIA must document specific actions to be implemented by the project which substantiate these conclusions.
