Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT-LA)





About

Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT), also known as Laura's Law, was initiated following the 2001 killing of Laura Wilcox by an individual suffering from severe mental illness.

AOT-LA program serves seriously mentally ill individuals who are at substantial risk of deterioration and/or detention under WIC5150 as a direct result of poor psychiatric treatment compliance. The program outreaches to these individuals in an effort to engage them in voluntary treatment. If the individual continues to decline treatment, the program may elect to petition the individual into court ordered treatment.

Services Provided

- Extensive outreach and engagement for a minimum of 30 days
- Screening and assessment
- Linkage to outpatient psychiatric treatment, primarily Full Service Partnership (FSP) providers
- May petition for court-ordered psychiatric treatment
- Participation in court hearing and follow-up on court mandate

What We Cannot Provide

AOT-LA provides outpatient services and does not have the authority to mandate medication or involuntary long-term hospitalizations or Lanterman Petris Short (LPS) conservatorship; therefore, the program is incapable of initiating long-term, involuntary commitment. LPS conservatorships are initiated by psychiatric hospitals, thus the decision of whether or not to pursue long-term involuntary commitment resides with the treating physician and the facility.

Who Can Refer?

Those who meet any of the following criteria can refer to AOT-LA services:

- Co-habitant aged 18 or older
- Parent, sibling, spouse, or child of client's over the age of 18
- · Director of client's residential care facility
- Hospital Director
- Licensed mental health treatment provider
- Peace Officer/Parole Officer/Probation Officer
- Superior Court Judge

Eligibility Requirements

To qualify for AOT-LA services, candidate must meet <u>all</u> criteria below:

- 18 years of age or older
- Seriously mentally ill
- In view of treatment history and current behavior, at least one of the following is true:
 - Unlikely to survive safely in the community without supervision <u>and</u> is substantially deteriorating or
 - Is in need of AOT in order to prevent a relapse or deterioration that would likely result in gravely disabled or serious harm to self or others
- Have a history of non-compliance with treatment, in that the client's mental illness has resulted in at least one of the following being true:
 - Two or more hospitalizations and/or forensic mental health treatment while incarcerated within the last 36 months or
 - Within the last 48 months, one or more acts of serious and violent behavior, or threat, or attempts to cause serious physical harm to self and/or others
- Failing to engage in available treatment
- AOT would be the least restrictive placement necessary to ensure recovery and stability
- Likely to benefit from AOT services
